PRESEASON GAME 1: RAVENS AT FALCONS

JUST THE FACTS

Let the games begin... football, that is.

• The Baltimore Ravens, the NFL's only team to go to the playoffs in each of the last four seasons – winning at least one playoff game every year – open the 2012 preseason with an Aug. 9 game at the Atlanta Falcons. The Falcons also have competed very well the past four seasons, earning the playoffs three times (2008, '10 and '11), including last year when the eventual Super Bowl champion Giants knocked Atlanta out of the postseason during Wild Card weekend (24-2). The Ravens advanced to the AFC Championship, where they lost a heartbreaker (23-20) at the Patriots.

• **John Harbaugh**, the only head coach in NFL history to take his team to and win at least one playoff game in each of his first four seasons, begins his fifth year as the Ravens' head coach. There are a number of changes on Baltimore's coaching staff, including the promotion of **Dean Pees** to defensive coordinator. Pees replaces Chuck Pagano, the Colts' new head coach. **Jim Caldwell**, the former Indianapolis head coach, is now the QBs coach in Baltimore. Other new assistants are ILBs coach **Don Martindale**, assistant special teams coach **Chris Hewitt** and assistant strength and conditioning coach **Juney Barnett**.

• The Ravens are currently conducting training camp at their year-round facility, the Under Armour Performance Center. The Ravens have three practices free and open to the public: this Saturday, Aug. 4 at M&T Bank Stadium (5 p.m.), Sunday, Aug. 12 at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium (5 p.m.) and at Stevenson University on Sunday, Aug. 19 (3:30 p.m.).

• Following the game at Atlanta, the Ravens meet the Lions in a nationally-televised game (FOX) on Aug. 17 at M&T Bank Stadium. Baltimore is home again on Aug. 23 against the Jaguars and completes the preseason at St. Louis on Aug. 30.

HARBS SAYS

"Our team is in great shape, and we're practicing at a fast pace. We have rough edges that we're grinding off, but we're pleased with where we are so far. Our mindset is that we're starting from scratch. We're building a keel to the ship. We're sinking the pilings deep. We're going to make the foundation rock solid, built on bedrock. These are our principles. That's where we are right now."

INJURY REPORT

OLB Terrell Suggs (Achilles), the 2011 NFL Defensive Player of the Year, **DT Haloti Ngata** (leg) and **LT Bryant McKinnie** (back) are on the Physically Unable to Perform list. As of Wednesday, Aug. 1, the following player had not practiced in training camp: **WR David Reed** (knee). **TE Dennis Pitta** has a broken hand, sustained on July 30.

NOTE THE QUOTE

MATT BIRK ON THE IMPORTANCE OF TRAINING CAMP



"As much as you try to deceive yourself and say you don't need it, you do [need training camp]. And, it's important from a team standpoint to be out here and doing the hard stuff and putting your body through it to get ready to endure the physical rigors of the season. If you're honest with yourself, you embrace the process. If you listen, your biological clock ticks at this time of the year – late July, August – and as a football player, you're supposed to be sweating on the football field."

WHAT'S GOING ON?

RAVENS DEFENSE IS STOUT

The Ravens have earned a reputation for playing outstanding defense. For the four seasons under John Harbaugh, the team tied an NFL record for finishing in the Top 3 in the league for fewest points allowed for four-straight years. For nine seasons in a row, Baltimore's defense has ranked in the Top 10 for total defense, finishing 2011 third in both points and yards allowed. Below are the NFL's Top 5 defenses from 2011:

How did this past offseason program prepare you?

"It helped a lot. There were a lot of things that I didn't get to go over when I first came in, and I was just thrown into the fire. This year, I got to sit back and learn it at a slower pace, look at it on the board, look at it on tape, go walk through it, and then run it full speed. I really got a good grasp of the offense during the offseason program."

How does facing the Ravens' "D" every day help you? "We're going against the best defense in the world. It has some of the most influential, motivational and best defensive players in the world. It definitely gets us ready for other teams, because other teams are not moving as fast or hitting as hard as they are. They are fast and physical, but they are also smarter than everybody else."

When did you start practicing Taekwondo, and how does it help?

"I was four years old when I started doing Taekwondo. I stopped doing it regularly around 16, but I still do it off and on. I was a first-degree black belt, and my dad was my instructor. He learned in Korea. It helped me with my self-discipline, my stretching and my balance. The thing that it helped me the most with is my hand-eye coordination, because of the way I can now pluck the ball out of the air or punch when I am pass-protecting and punt-blocking."

Do you feel like your running style fits the AFC North's physical nature? "I think that's why I got drafted here. I really enjoy that style of play, and it suits me well."

Which running back did you look up to as a kid? "I liked Emmitt Smith, and I watched Barry Sanders. But one guy who I really liked was Terrell Davis – just the way he hit the hole. It was just like our offense. Even on an outside run, he would just put one foot in the ground and go up field. It's the same blocking scheme we run."

How did Georgia Tech's triple-option prepare you for the NFL? "The triple-option is so physical. It was a different style, but the physicality and having to read the defense and make quick decisions is really helping me here."

COACHING UPDATES

- Dean Pees**, a nine-year NFL coaching veteran, was promoted from the Ravens' LBs coach to defensive coordinator after the departure of Chuck Pagano, who was hired to be the Indianapolis Colts' head coach. Now entering his third season in Baltimore, Pees was New England's defensive coordinator from 2006-09.

- The Ravens hired **Jim Caldwell** as their quarterbacks coach. Caldwell, an 11-year NFL coaching veteran, spent the past 10 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts. From 2009-11, he was the franchise's head coach. Under his leadership, Indy won two AFC South titles (2009-10) and earned a spot in Super Bowl XLIV. Prior to his time as head coach, he helped guide QB Peyton Manning to three of his four NFL MVP awards, serving as QBs coach from 2002-08.

- Don Martindale** was hired to coach the team's ILBs, while **Ted Monachino** was promoted to LBs coach and will oversee the entire unit, while continuing his specialized work with the outside linebackers. Martindale, a seven-year NFL-coaching veteran, last spent the 2010 season as the Denver Broncos' "D" coordinator. Monachino, who joined the Ravens in 2010, helped guide **OLB Terrell Suggs** to the 2011 AP Defensive Player of the Year award.

“Somehow, last year, and now, this year, more so than ever, I feel in my element as the head coach. It looks the way I always wanted it to look. I remember I told the team in some of the tough moments back [in my first season of 2008], ‘I know what it’s going to look like, the picture is as clear as can be in my mind, and we’re not even close to being there yet. But we will be, no matter how long it takes, we will get there, I promise you that.’ And right now, it looks as close as it’s ever looked.”

- Head Coach John Harbaugh on his original “vision” for the Ravens and his team entering 2012

The Sporting News’ Clifton Brown on John Harbaugh:

“He hasn’t missed the playoffs in his first four seasons in Baltimore and has established a culture of playing ‘Ravens football’ – physical and efficient. Despite some heartbreaking playoff losses, Harbaugh’s teams have returned with resolve the following season. They have a strong locker room, but Harbaugh’s strong leadership helps set that tone.”

NFL analyst Joe Theismann on the Ravens’ 2012 outlook:

“I like the Ravens. They’re getting better with Torrey Smith. Joe Flacco has played in a tough division for four seasons and is used to facing great defenses like the Pittsburgh Steelers twice a year. They’ve put together a darn good offensive line that got old and got better again. They’ve got one of the best running backs in football in Ray Rice. They’ve got a wide receiving corps that can threaten down the field. With a defense like the Ravens, they’ll make somebody pay the price.”

CBS analyst Phil Simms on new Ravens QBs coach Jim Caldwell:

“Jim Caldwell is a good man, and probably his greatest strength is he strikes me as a guy where I sure wouldn’t want to disappoint him. There’s a lot of clichés thrown out there, but he’s a man among men. He treats people with dignity and respect. That will absolutely tie him to Joe Flacco. I just can’t imagine as a player having a coach like him and not take it personally and want to succeed.”

John Harbaugh on the Ravens’ “aging” defense and players stepping in for injured OLB Terrell Suggs:

“The point is, you never replace a Terrell Suggs. You go with the next player, and then you play defense. And I think we’ll be really good. The good thing is that we still have a lot of veteran anchors out there. People want to talk about this ‘aging defense,’ but I just don’t see it. We’ve got a lot of good, young players rolling in there. Yeah, there are some great players who are older, but they have to play at a high level to stay ahead of the young guys. So, I don’t think we’re an aging defense. I think we have some star players – two guys, basically [Ray Lewis and Ed Reed] – who are older guys who can still play at a high level. But the rest of them are young guys.”

CBS Sports’ Jason La Canfora on the Ravens’ deep secondary:

“If there is one constant with the Ravens, it’s the ability to shut people down. A few years back, the vulnerability was on the back end, but now with youthful Lardarius Webb and Jimmy Smith at corner, and Ed Reed still making game-changing plays, Baltimore has one of the best secondaries in the NFL. It’s a tall, physical group, with no shortage of individuals with elite ball skills.”

ESPN.com’s Jamison Hensley on LB Ray Lewis:

“Ray Lewis is more than the best defensive player of his generation. The Baltimore Ravens middle linebacker is the toughest and the meanest. He is both the most feared and the most respected. Lewis’ passion for pain – to inflict it as well as absorb it – has defined his unrelenting will. He’s exuded this with every tackle, sack and forced fumble on game days that have spanned three decades. And in the eyes of the game’s previous greats, Lewis would dominate running backs and harass quarterbacks in any period of football.”

Ravens owner Steve Bisciotti on GM Ozzie Newsome:

“In a highly-charged, competitive business, I tend to want answers right away, and Ozzie has to sleep on it. I have learned that Ozzie’s insistence that we talk about it tomorrow has been beneficial to both John [Harbaugh] and myself. I like his skill set, and I think it works in our favor that he does tend to like to think things over, and we usually come up with better decisions because of it.”

GM Ozzie Newsome on rookie OLB Courtney Upshaw:

“He plays with a sense of nastiness about him. At some point, our players have got to win the one-on-one battles, and he wins the one-on-one battles when he’s up against tackles or tight ends. He can win that one-on-one battle like [Haloti] Ngata can, like [Terrell] Suggs can, and eventually, it’s going to come down to you versus him. We want more guys that can win more of the battles.”

NFL.com’s Gregg Rosenthal on the success of the Ravens’ draft:

“If the NFL was a fantasy football league, the Baltimore Ravens are that guy who always makes the rest of the room say, ‘Nice pick.’ The Ravens take value. Year after year, they see a blue-chip talent fall for some bogus reason or another. And then they snap them up, coach them up and make them into Pro Bowlers.”

RB Ray Rice on FB Vonta Leach:

“He’s a bruiser. He wants to do one thing – he wants to destroy linebackers, and that’s all he thinks about doing. He’s like my armed security guard. I feel like I can go anywhere with Vonta, even if it wasn’t playing football.”

C Matt Birk on the Ravens’ commitment to their community:

“Most guys realize how lucky we are to be doing what we do for a living and also recognize the unique platform that we have. We’re lucky in that regard. But it starts with ownership and our coaches. They preach about getting out there and doing great things. When I came here three years ago, it was evident that this town loves the Ravens, so we’re happy to give people an opportunity to get behind us and support our causes.”

FALCONS SNAPSHOT

2011 Review: With a 10-6 record, the Falcons posted back-to-back double-digit-win seasons for the first time in franchise history. Atlanta finished second in the NFC South and earned its second-consecutive playoff berth (another franchise first), before falling in the Wild Card round to the eventual Super Bowl champion NY Giants.

Mike Smith: Entering his fifth season as head coach, the Falcons have compiled a 43-21 regular season mark under Smith. With four-consecutive winning campaigns, Atlanta is the NFC's only team to produce a winning record in each of the last four seasons. Smith became the first coach in franchise history to post back-to-back winning seasons (2008-09), and in 2011, became the first coach in team history to lead his team to consecutive playoff berths.

Offense: QB **Matt Ryan** set a franchise single-season record with 4,177 passing yards, adding 29 TDs and a 92.9 passer rating. WR **Roddy White** became the team's all-time leading receiver with his 7,364 career receiving yards, tallying his second-consecutive 100-reception season (100 in 2011) and fifth-straight 1,000-yard campaign (1,296 in 2011). RB **Michael Turner** led the NFC with 1,340 rushing yards, adding 11 TDs.

Defense: LB **Sean Weatherspoon** had a strong campaign, posting a career-high 127 tackles and 4 sacks. LB **Curtis Lofton** led the team in tackles for the third-consecutive season (167) and added 2 INTs. DE **John Abraham** was stout along the line, recording a team-high 9.5 sacks and a team-best 4 FFs.

PRESEASON QUICK HITS

- The Ravens are 38-25 all time in preseason play. Under head coach John Harbaugh (since 2008), Baltimore has compiled an 11-5 mark in the preseason.
- Baltimore has won 10 of its last 12 preseason games.
- The Ravens are 18-13 in preseason road games, producing victories in four of their last six contests.
- Among NFC South teams, Baltimore has faced Atlanta the most during preseason play. The Ravens have battled the Falcons eight times, Carolina five times, New Orleans once and never Tampa Bay.

Professional Connections

- Falcons head coach **Mike Smith** was the Ravens' defensive assistant/D-line and LBs coach from 1999-2002, serving as a member of the team's Super Bowl XXXV championship staff (2000). Smith is also the brother-in-law of former Ravens head coach Brian Billick.
- Ravens assistant head coach/special teams coordinator **Jerry Rosenberg** was the Falcons' special teams coordinator in 2007.
- Falcons "D" coordinator **Mike Nolan** served in the same role for Baltimore from 2001-04. Under Nolan's tutelage, **LB Ray Lewis** (2003) and **S Ed Reed** (2004) were each named NFL Defensive Player of the Year.
- Atlanta QB **Chris Redman** spent his first four NFL seasons (2000-03) in Baltimore. The Ravens' former third-round pick made six starts for Baltimore in 2002, completing 97 of 182 for 1,034 yards and 7 TDs.
- Falcons associate director of player personnel **Lionel Vital** worked two stints (1996, 2005-07) in the Ravens' personnel department – first as a college scout and then as a national scout.

College Connections

- Ravens vice president of football administration **Pat Moriarty** graduated from Georgia Tech University with a degree in industrial management, where Pat was a three-year starter at RB for the Yellow Jackets.
 - Ravens **T Michael Oher** and Falcons **DT Peria Jerry** spent their entire collegiate careers together at Mississippi from 2005-08. They were both selected in the first round of the 2009 NFL Draft, just one spot apart. Oher went 23rd overall to the Ravens, and the Falcons chose Jerry with the 24th-overall selection.
 - Ravens rookie **OLB Courtney Upshaw** and Falcons rookie **LB Jerrell Harris** played on Alabama's 2011 BCS National Championship team.
 - Ravens **NT Terrence Cody** and **OLB Chavis Williams** played the 2008 season at Alabama with Falcons **WR Julio Jones**, **G Mike Johnson** and **QB John Parker Wilson**.
 - Ravens **RB Anthony Allen** and Falcons **FB Kevin Cone** played together two years at Georgia Tech in 2009-10.
 - Falcons **LB Akeem Dent** and Ravens **DE DeAngelo Tyson** and **TE Bruce Figgins** played three years together at Georgia.

2011 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

UNDEFEATED AT HOME

For the first time in team history, the Ravens went undefeated at home (8-0) and became just one of three NFL teams (GB and NO) to accomplish the feat in 2011. Under head coach **John Harbaugh** (since 2008), the Ravens have won 18 of their last 19 regular season home games and are 27-5 in games played in Baltimore.

- The Ravens totaled an NFL-high 33 sacks and forced 18 turnovers at home in 2011, allowing 12 sacks and turning the ball over just 11 times (registering a +7 turnover margin).
- During the John Harbaugh Era (since 2008), the Ravens have outscored opponents 817-426 at M&T Bank Stadium. The Ravens have yielded 17 points or fewer in 27 of 32 home games under Harbaugh.

Entering his fifth year as head coach, **John Harbaugh** has led Baltimore to a playoff berth in each of his first four seasons (marking a franchise first with four-consecutive postseason berths). **“Harbs” is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four seasons.** He has led the Ravens to 44 regular season wins during this span, ranking fourth in the NFL, and he has guided the Ravens to two AFC Championship games (2008 & 2011). Harbs owns a 5-4 playoff record.

In his 2008 rookie campaign, the Ravens advanced to the AFC Championship game after winning at Miami (27-9) and at top-seeded Tennessee, 13-10. Pittsburgh, the eventual Super Bowl champion, stopped the Ravens, 23-14, in the AFC title matchup. In 2009, Baltimore dominated at New England, 33-14, in the Wild Card game before dropping a 20-3 contest at Super

Bowl-bound Indianapolis in the Divisional Round. After earning a 12-4 mark in 2010, the Ravens topped Kansas City (30-7) in the Wild Card playoff, becoming the only team to win at least one playoff game in each of the last three seasons. The Ravens then dropped a 31-24 Divisional Round contest at Pittsburgh, which advanced to the Super Bowl.

During the Harbaugh Era (since 2008)...

- Baltimore is the only NFL team to advance to the playoffs each of the last four years and the only team to have won at least one playoff game in each of those postseasons.
- The Ravens own a 44-20 regular season record. Including playoffs (5-4), they are 49-24 in the Harbaugh Era, tying for third in the NFL in total wins since his Baltimore arrival.

COORDINATORS NOTES

CAM'S ATTACK



Entering his fifth season as the Ravens' offensive coordinator, **Cam Cameron's** impact has been significant. In 2011, QB Joe Flacco produced his third-straight 3,500-yard/20-touchdown passing season, while RB Ray Rice led the NFL with 2,068 yards from scrimmage. In 2009, the Ravens were the NFL's ninth best in scoring (24.4 ppg), up from 24th in 2007, while setting team records for most total TDs (47) and most rushing TDs (22). In his first season in Baltimore (2008), Cameron built a creative offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in rushing (148.5 ypg), first in time of possession (33:10) and 11th in points per game (24.1 ppg).

Cameron brought his unique offensive mind to Baltimore after one year as the Miami Dolphins' head coach. His successful stints with the NFL's Chargers and Redskins and the NCAA's Indiana Hoosiers and Michigan Wolverines have been celebrated.

Under Cameron's guidance the past four seasons (2008-11)...

- The Ravens have rushed for 131.3 yards per game, fourth most in the NFL. Baltimore also has 68 rushing TDs, tying for fourth most.
- Baltimore has committed only 87 turnovers during this span, the NFL's fourth fewest. (Ravens set a team record with just 20 giveaways in 2010 and posted a +2 turnover ratio in 2011.)
- The Ravens' 23.6 points per game during this span rank ninth.

PRODUCTION UNDER CAM

The Ravens' "O" has been consistently effective since **Cam Cameron** took the reins in 2008. Over the past four seasons, Baltimore has ranked in the top half of the NFL in scoring each year, while in 2009, the Ravens posted the second-most yards in team history.

PEES PROMOTED



Dean Pees, a nine-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27 after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, now leads the vaunted Baltimore unit, which has finished as the NFL's third-best scoring defense four-consecutive years (16.6 ppg in 2011). The four-straight years ties an NFL record for consecutive seasons of being in the Top 3 for points allowed.

Pees inherits a unit that during the John Harbaugh Era (2008-11)...

- Has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (16.3) and the second-fewest net yards (292.3) per game during this span.

Lewis, who has played in 222 career contests, is Baltimore's all-time tackle king (2,586 stops). He also has the most FRs (19), second-most INTs (31) and second-most FFs (19) in team history, leading a Ravens' "D" that has ranked in the top 10 (yards allowed) for nine straight seasons.

THE DOMINANT DT



One of the NFL's most disruptive forces, **DT Haloti Ngata** was named to his third Pro Bowl (as a starter) in 2011. Perhaps the NFL's most athletic DT, Ngata stops the run (393 career tackles), rushes the passer (17 career sacks) and even drops into coverage (3 career INTs). In 2011, he had 64 tackles, 5 sacks (-21 yards), 3 FRs (1 returned for TD) and 2 FFs.

Baltimore has a history of strong run defense, and with Ngata's help the past several seasons, has upheld its stout legacy on the ground.
