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## WEEK 2: BROWNS (0-1) VS. RAVENS (0-1)

SUNDAY, SEPT. 15, 2013 • 1 P.M. ET • M&T BANK STADIUM (71,008)



### JUST THE FACTS

- The Baltimore Ravens, now 0-1, play their 2013 home opener when they host the Cleveland Browns (0-1) this Sunday, Sept. 15, at M&T Bank Stadium. Game time is 1 p.m. ET. Prior to player introductions, the Ravens will salute last season's Super Bowl XLVII Champions with a brief video and the unveiling of permanent banners.
- The Ravens opened the NFL season last Thursday (9/5) with a 49-27 loss at Denver in a game that was delayed 34 minutes because of lightning in the area. The Broncos' 49 points are the most ever scored against the Ravens, as were the 7 TD passes thrown by QB Peyton Manning. (Those TD throws also tied an NFL single-game record.) After taking a 17-14 halftime lead, the Ravens gave up 3 TD passes in a six-minute span of the third quarter, with Manning hitting WR Andre Caldwell (28 yards) and WR Wes Welker (5 and 2 yards) to take a 35-17 lead. The closest the Ravens got in the second half was at 42-27 after QB Joe Flacco found rookie WR Marlon Brown with a 13-yard TD with 10:28 left in the game. Flacco finished 34-of-62 for 362 yards with 2 TDs and 2 INTs. Manning was spectacular, completing 27 of 42 for 462 yards. Cleveland lost, 23-10, to visiting Miami last Sunday.
- The improved Browns, now under first-year head coach Rob Chudzinski, have lost 10 in a row to their AFC North rival Ravens, including two in 2012: 23-16 in Baltimore (9/27) and 25-15 in Cleveland (11/4). Cleveland's last victory (33-30 OT) over Baltimore came on 11/18/07 at M&T Bank Stadium.
- The Ravens have won back-to-back AFC North titles and are attempting to earn the playoffs for an NFL-best sixth season in a row. Under John Harbaugh, Baltimore has won at least one playoff game in each of the last five seasons, appeared in three AFC Championship games and won Super Bowl XLVII in February.

#### Home Quick Hits:

- The Ravens averaged 31.8 points per game at home in 2012, ranking as the NFL's fourth-best mark.
- Baltimore has allowed just 15.1 points per game at M&T Bank Stadium during the John Harbaugh Era (since 2008), ranking as the NFL's second-best figure (Pittsburgh, 14.9 ppg).

### HARBS SAYS

"A team is a living organism. Change is inevitable. So, you keep moving forward, handle what is put in front of you, have each other's backs, keep fighting. You build, and it comes together. We are a different team than we were last February, than we were in training camp, than we were in Denver, for that matter. We'll be very different by November and December. Teams evolve. Our plan is always to be better."

### INJURY REPORT

Four Ravens missed last Thursday's game at Denver because of injury: G/C Ryan Jensen (foot), DT Arthur Jones (illness), WR/RS Deonte Thompson (foot) and DT Brandon Williams (toe). WR/RS Jacoby Jones (knee) and T Michael Oher (ankle) left that contest and did not return. TE Dennis Pitta (hip), OLB D.J. Bryant (knee) and OLB Adrian Hamilton (wrist) are on Injured Reserve. (Pitta is designated for return.) Former starting ILB Jameel McClain (spine) is on the Physically Unable to Perform list, and rookie (6th round) DE Kapron Lewis-Moore (knee) is on the Non-Football Injury list.

#### JOE FLACCO ON PREPARING FOR CLEVELAND

"It was just one of those nights in Denver. It was a pretty good game for a while; we had the halftime lead, and then it got away from us. We've all been through this before. If you've been in the NFL for some time, you're going to be involved in these types of games no matter how good you are, or how good you think you are. You put it behind you, regroup and get ready for the next one. For us, that's Cleveland at home this weekend."

## SPOTLIGHT: JUSTIN TUCKER

**What's it like kicking at M&T Bank Stadium?** "Playing at M&T Bank Stadium is awesome because 70,000 fans sound like 170,000."

**What was it like to see the Justin Tucker bobblehead that was a give-away at a Bowie Baysox game?** "It's a little surreal. They got it pretty spot on. They gave my bobblehead some pretty big ears and a big ol' smile – seems about right. What I thought was really cool was that they put a little bobble-leg on there that if you flick it around, it'll shake and kick. [Whether] it's a bobblehead or a kid wearing my jersey – for anybody who experiences that in here – it's definitely humbling. It's cool to see that we're appreciated outside of this building and in the community."

**What's your favorite tourist spot in Baltimore?** "I'd say going to The Aquarium and playing with the dolphins and the puffins. Playing with the dolphins and puffins is pretty cool. I'm actually a season pass holder at The Aquarium now. I'll stop on in every now and again just to see how my aquatic friends are doing."

**What first pops into your mind when you hear the following names?** **John Harbaugh:** "Leader and friend." **Ozzie Newsome:** "The mastermind." **Morgan Cox and Sam Koch:** "The obvious collective answer is 'The Wolfpack.'" **Joe Flacco:** "That's my quarterback." (*Terrell Owens impression*)

**What was your favorite field goal from last year?** "The 39-yard field goal at Heinz Field after I had just missed one from 41 [yards]."

**Why that one, since you kicked multiple game-winning field goals and kicked in the Super Bowl?** "It was just a hard kick to make. It was in pretty much the same spot – give or take a couple of yards. The PAT to tie the Denver [Divisional Playoff] game up was also special. I don't think I was ever more nervous for a kick in my life."

**How was it getting a rushing attempt on a fake FG in the Super Bowl?** "Well, it would have been a lot cooler if I had scored. I would have had the sickest touchdown celebration for a kicker ever. It would never have been topped. [But,] maybe next time – maybe the next Super Bowl if we're fortunate enough again."

## NOTE OF THE WEEK

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“Ozzie Newsome has headed up personnel for 18 years, the last 12 as GM, and he retains final say over all personnel matters, including the 53-man roster. But this behemoth is built on the strength of more than just one guy. Pat Moriarty, Eric DeCosta, Vince Newsome and George Kokinis were all part of the original Ravens staff with Ozzie in 1996, and Joe Hortic came aboard in 1998. In few other places does that kind of continuity exist, and the benefit is a tried-and-true system that is inclusive across the board.”

- *NFL.com's* Albert Breer on the Ravens' front office:

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**Hall of Fame QB and ESPN's Steve Young on QB Joe Flacco:**

“We still have not seen the best of Joe Flacco. Last year was the fourth inning of what Joe can really be. Joe is going to handle these complications – the big stage, the trade of Anquan Boldin, Dennis Pitta's season-ending injury – in a unique way, because he's so mellow. Half of it is just an innate confidence of, ‘Yeah, I've been there, done that on the biggest stage.’ As a quarterback, there's nothing more valuable. That's why he was worth the money.”

**CBS analyst Bill Cowher on Ravens head coach John Harbaugh:**

“I think it's one of those things again [where] he surrounds himself with good coaches, which is a big part of the success of any organization. He's a good manager of people. He understands the game, and he respects the game. He's a leader. I think he obviously inspires people around him.”

**SI.com's Peter King on the Ravens following Week 1:**

“It's only one game. The Ravens shouldn't throw their hands in the air. They're a smart team, and [John] Harbaugh's one of the smartest coaches in football – and one who knows which buttons to press, too. Remember these results from Week 1 last year: The Jets scored 48 points. Indianapolis lost by 20. Russell Wilson was poor in a 20-16 loss at Arizona. It's a long year.”

**NBC's Scott Pioli on the Ravens organization and leadership:**

“If you're smart and humble, you realize that you have to work harder than you did the year before. I think it takes a great deal of humility throughout the organization, and that's why they have a chance. The leadership group in terms of Steve [Bisciotti], Ozzie [Newsome] and John [Harbaugh], they are all strong men with tremendous humility. They don't think they have it all figured out.”

**OLB Terrell Suggs on his desire to win another Super Bowl:**

“Last year's team achieved some great things. But why settle for that when you have the opportunity to do it again? As long as I've got air in my lungs, I'm going to try and win another one. The first one is great, but I guarantee you the second feels better.”

**WR Torrey Smith on rookie WR Marlon Brown's skill set:** “Marlon is a big playmaker. He can do a little bit of everything. He has deceptive speed with his stride. He gets in and out of his breaks fast, and he's explosive for a guy his size.”

**CBSsports.com's Jason LaCanfora on the Ravens' reputation:**

“They are first-class from the owner on down. People want to work for them, and players want to play for them. They are an elite franchise in every sense of the word in any way you want to evaluate it.”

**ESPN.com's Matt Williamson on DE Chris Canty's impact:**

“A key to the [Chris] Canty signing is his pass-rush skills from the interior. On throwing downs, the Ravens could feature [Terrell] Suggs and [Elvis] Dumervil as ends on a four-man line, with Canty and [Haloti] Ngata or Pernell McPhee, a very underrated pass-rusher in his own right, as the defensive tackles with five or six defensive backs on the field. Canty gives the Ravens all sorts of possibilities and should excel in his new home.”

**Newly-acquired S Michael Huff on M&T Bank Stadium:**

“As soon as you walk into the building, you sense the winning tradition, a winning legacy, and that's what they expect of you. You just breed success and winning here. ... It's definitely the loudest stadium I've played in. Every time the defense was out there, you couldn't hear anything. I'm glad I'll be on their side now. We work on our communication every day at practice to get ready for home games.”

**The NFL Network's Mike Mayock on what makes Baltimore one of the best drafting teams in the NFL:**

“I think Baltimore, historically, has been one of the best and most consistent drafting teams out there, and it starts with Ozzie Newsome and his philosophy, and it extends to Eric [DeCosta] and his staff. I think they are one of the best staffs that I've seen in this league, and part of the reason is they have been together for so long. That's the first piece. I think there's a lot of talent on the personnel side led by Ozzie.”

**RB Ray Rice on being ready to lead the Ravens:**

“A leadership role is something I definitely don't mind taking on now, because I was mentored by one of the greatest leaders probably ever to play the game in Ray Lewis. A lot of his leading was by example, and when he spoke, everybody listened, because they had that respect for him. So, I think being a leader comes with how much respect people have for you. These guys look at the way I work, and they understand that my actions are going to show on the field.”

## LAST WEEK AT DENVER

### Denver Broncos 49, Baltimore Ravens 27

Sports Authority Field at Mile High • Denver, CO • Week 1: Sept. 5

Allowing a team-record points against (49) and touchdown passes (7, tying an NFL record), the Ravens lost the NFL season opener in Denver, 49-27, on Thursday, Sept. 5. The start of the game was delayed 34 minutes because of lightning storms in the area. Baltimore led 17-14 at the half after **FB Vonta Leach** caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from **QB Joe Flacco**, **RB Ray Rice** scored on a 1-yard run, and **K Justin Tucker** hit a 25-yard field goal. But behind QB Peyton Manning, who tied an NFL record with 7 TD passes in the game, Denver exploded for 35 second-half points to secure the victory. In one six-minute span in the third quarter, Manning threw 3 TD passes (28 yards to WR Andre Caldwell and 2 to WR Wes Welker – 5 and 2 yards). That gave the Broncos a 35-17 lead they extended to 42-17 when Manning hit WR Demaryius Thomas with a 26-yard beauty early in the fourth quarter. Baltimore closed the gap to 42-24 after Flacco hit rookie **WR Marlon Brown** with a 13-yard scoring strike. Flacco completed 34 of 62 passes for 362 yards with 2 TDs and 2 INTs. Rice and newly-signed **TE Dallas Clark** caught 8 (35 yards) and 7 (87 yards) passes, respectively. Manning was spectacular in leading an offense that amassed 510 yards, completing 27 of 42 for 462 yards with 7 TDs. Welker caught 9 for 67 yards, while Thomas grabbed 5 for 161 yards and 2 TDs.

## LAST GAME VS. CLEVELAND



### Baltimore Ravens 25, Cleveland Browns 15

Cleveland Browns Stadium • Cleveland, OH • Nov. 4, 2012

Starting fast and finishing strong, the Ravens stopped the Browns, 25-15, at Cleveland Browns Stadium. It was Baltimore's 10th-consecutive victory over the Browns and 11th-consecutive AFC North win. The Ravens jumped to a 14-0, first-quarter lead after rushing touchdowns by **RB Ray Rice** (8 yards) and **RB Bernard Pierce** (12 yards). The Browns then shut out Baltimore over the next two quarters, while Cleveland K Phil Dawson made 4 field goals (32, 28, 29 and 33.) Dawson then converted a 41-yard FG with 8:48 left in the game to give the Browns a 15-14 lead. The Ravens bounced right back with a nine-play, 81-yard TD drive that concluded when **QB Joe Flacco** hit **WR Torrey Smith** (pictured) with a 19-yard score. The two-point conversion from Flacco to WR Anquan Boldin gave the Ravens a 22-15 lead with 4:26 left in the contest. Baltimore extended the lead to 10 with 2:49 remaining on a 43-yard **K Justin Tucker** FG. Flacco completed 15 of 24 for 153 yards and a 94.6 rating. Boldin caught 5 passes for 57 yards, including a key 21-yard catch during the fourth-quarter TD drive. Rice rushed for 98 yards on 25 carries. Browns rookie **RB Trent Richardson** gained 105 yards on 25 tries and caught 6 passes for 31 more. ## BROWNS SNAPSHOT

**Overview:** After finishing fourth (5-11) in the AFC North last season, Cleveland is tied with all four teams in the division after each fell to 0-1 to open 2013. The Browns, who have dropped 14 of their last 15 season openers since returning to Cleveland in 1999, lost to Miami, 23-10, last Sunday. Cleveland is in search of its first winning season since the 2007 campaign and its first playoff berth since 2002. The Browns have fallen to the Ravens 10-straight times dating back to 2008.

**Rob Chudzinski:** Chudzinski is in first season as head coach of the Browns and embarks on his ninth season in the NFL. Prior to joining the Browns, he most recently spent two seasons as offensive coordinator for the Carolina Panthers (2011-12), where in 2011 the club set franchise marks in total yards (6,237) and first downs (345). He also held top NFL assistant posts as assistant head coach/tight ends with San Diego (2009-10) and as offensive coordinator with Cleveland (2007-08). Before joining the NFL ranks, Chudzinski spent 10 years (1994-2003) as an assistant at the University of Miami.

**Offense:** In Week 1, second-year **QB Brandon Weeden** threw 3 INTs and was sacked a 6 times, completing 26 of 53 passes for 289 yards and 1 TD. **RB Trent Richardson** ran 13 times for 47 yards (3.6 avg.), while former Ravens **RB/RS Bobby Rainey** posted an impressive 103 KOR yards. **TE Jordan Cameron** led the Browns' aerial attack, hauling in 9 receptions (most by an NFL TE in Week 1) for 108 yards and 1 TD.

**Defense:** The Browns' defense finished Week 1 with the NFL's top run stop (20.0 ypg). Against the Dolphins, former Ravens **LB Paul Kruger** posted his first sack with Cleveland, which recorded 4 total QB drops. Second-year undrafted **S Tashuan Gipson** recorded an INT for the Browns, while **LB D'Qwell Jackson**, who has led Cleveland in tackles each of the last two seasons, had a team-best 9 stops.

• Ravens general manager/executive vice president and Hall of Fame TE **Ozzie Newsome** played 13 seasons in Cleveland, recording 662 catches and 7,980 yards – the most in Browns history. He then held positions as a scout, assistant to the head coach/offense/pro personnel, and director of pro personnel before moving to Baltimore with the franchise as VP of player personnel in 1996.

• The Ravens staff is comprised of many people who were invited to join the franchise when it moved from Cleveland: senior VP of public and community relations **Kevin Byrne**, director of football video operations **Jon Dube'**, VP of operations **Bob Eller**, VP of IT **Bill Jankowski**, senior VP of football administration **Pat Moriarty** and head certified athletic trainer **Mark Smith**.

• Ravens senior personnel assistant **George Kokinis** was the Browns' general manager for part of 2008. Kokinis originally began his NFL career as an operations intern with the Browns in 1991 before moving to Baltimore with the franchise in 1996.

## SPECIAL FORCES



Assistant head coach/special teams coordinator **Jerry Rosburg**, a 35-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. In 2012, the Ravens' special teams units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones**, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD in Super Bowl XLVII.

Rosburg's kickers were special in 2012, too: **P Sam Koch** set Ravens single-season punting records with a 47.1 gross average and a 40.8 net average, shattering career bests. **K Justin Tucker** made 30 of 33 FGAs (90.9%), producing the second-best success rate in Ravens single-season history and also the second-best mark by a rookie kicker in NFL history.

Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume both with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

## SPECIAL TEAMS STANDOUTS

In 2012, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 2 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that's based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. The Vikings finished first in Gosselin's special teams rankings, followed by the Ravens and the Bengals.

## A STRONG RETURN

Dating back to the 2008 season when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore has produced the NFL's second-best kickoff return average (24.8).

# COORDINATORS NOTES

## CALDWELL'S ATTACK



**Jim Caldwell**, a 36-year coaching veteran, joined the Ravens as the team's QBs coach in February 2012 and was elevated to offensive coordinator on Dec. 10, replacing Cam Cameron. Caldwell arrived in Baltimore after coaching 10 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, including the three (2009-11) as head coach. In his first year at the helm, he led the Colts to the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLIV. Caldwell, who earned a Super Bowl ring (2006) with Indy, spent six seasons tutoring one of the NFL's all-time greats in QB Peyton Manning. During the course of Caldwell's time in Indianapolis, the Colts achieved much success, tying an NFL record with nine-straight playoff appearances and winning six AFC South division titles.

## CALDWELL FIRES UP "O"

Under the direction of **Jim Caldwell**, who was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to the Ravens' Dec. 16, 2012 game vs. Denver, Baltimore averaged 400.6 yards of offense per contest (146.4 rushing and 254.1 passing) and 27.3 points per game.

## PEES LEADS THE "D"



**Dean Pees**, a 10-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2012, after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, leads a Baltimore unit that finished as the NFL's third-best scoring defense four-consecutive years (2008-11) and tied (NYG) for 12th in 2012, allowing 21.5 points per game.

- Clark (481 receptions) needs 19 more catches to reach 500, which would make him the ninth TE in NFL history to accomplish the feat.
- With 91 receiving yards, Clark can hit the 5,550-yard milestone, becoming the 17th TE in history to achieve the feat. Clark (50) also needs just 1 receiving TD to own the seventh most all time by a TE (currently tied with Ben Coates).

### QB JOE FLACCO

- Flacco (17,995) needs 5 passing yards to reach the 18,000-yard milestone in his career.
- With 1 more 300-yard passing game, Flacco (14) will have 15 such games in his career.

### OLB ELVIS DUMERVIL

- Dumervil (64.5) needs a half sack to reach 65 for his career. He is also 5.5 sacks yards short of 400.

### RB RAY RICE

- Rice (40 career TDs) needs 1 more to tie Todd Heap (41) for the second most in team history. (Jamal Lewis is first with 47.)

### Rice Continued...

- Rice needs 252 receiving yards to hit the 3,000 milestone. He also needs 72 receiving yards to move into fourth on the Ravens' all-time list, passing Qadry Ismail (2,819). Rice needs 11 receiving yards to surpass Travis Taylor (2,758) for fifth on Baltimore's career chart.
- With 196 total yards from scrimmage, Rice can hit the 8,500 milestone for his career. If Rice gains 863 yards from scrimmage, he'll pass Jamal Lewis (9,166) for the most yards from scrimmage in Ravens history.

### WR TORREY SMITH

- With 1,788 receiving yards during his career, Smith needs 212 more to reach the 2,000-yard milestone.

### OLB TERRELL SUGGS

- Suggs (85.5) needs 4.5 more sacks to reach 90 for his career. Suggs (29) is also just 1 FF shy of 30.

## IMPRESSIVE STREAKS FROM '12

• In 2012's Week 13 division battle against the Steelers, Baltimore's home winning streak was snapped. The Ravens entered the game having won 15-consecutive games at M&T Bank Stadium (16 including playoffs), the NFL's longest active home streak at the time.

• The defeat marked the Ravens' first loss at home since 12/5/10, which also came against the Steelers (13-10).

• Pittsburgh's win in Week 13 (2012) snapped another streak: The Ravens had won 12-straight AFC North games, tying Indianapolis for the longest division winning streak since 2002 division realignment.

• With 2012's Week 15 loss to Denver, the Ravens dropped back-to-back home games for the first time under **John Harbaugh**. The last time Baltimore lost consecutive home games was in 2007 (12/3 and 12/9), a stretch that spanned 39 home games leading into Week 15's defeat.

## TORREY'S COURAGEOUS NIGHT

**WR Torrey Smith** played in the 2012 Week 3 Sunday night victory over New England after his brother, 19-year-old Tevin Jones, passed away in a motorcycle accident that morning. Smith posted 6 catches for 127 yards and 2 TDs in the come-from-behind win, producing the third 100-yard game of his young career. Additionally, he eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving milestone for his career.

## SMITH BIG IN '12 PLAYOFFS

In the 2012 thrilling, double-overtime Divisional Playoff win at Denver (38-35 on 1/12/13), **WR Torrey Smith** caught 59-yard and 32-yard TD passes, helping mark the first game in NFL playoff history that a QB (**Joe Flacco**) threw 2 TDs of 59-plus yards (the other being to **WR Jacoby Jones** on a 70-yarder). In the 2012 postseason, Smith recorded a 21.2 yards-per-catch average, reeling in 11 passes for 233 yards.

## 2011 ROOKIE SENSATION

In 2011's Week 11 game vs. Cincinnati, **WR Torrey Smith** set a Ravens' single-season and single-game record for receiving yards by a rookie, totaling a career-high 165 yards on 6 catches (27.5 avg.). In 2011, he had 50 catches for 841 yards and a Ravens' rookie-record 7 TDs. Impressively, the 2011 second-round pick owns two of the Top 5 receiving days in team history.

### Smith Quick Hits:

- During the '11 campaign, Smith ranked 13th in the NFL with a stout 16.8 yards-per-catch avg.
- Smith's 26-yard TD catch with 8 seconds remaining in Week 9 at Pit. capped a 92-yard drive and sealed the Ravens' 23-20 win.
- Impressively, 5 of his 7 TD receptions in 2011 covered at least 25 yards (74, 41, 38, 36, 26, 18 and 8 yards), and he averaged a sensational 34.4 yards-per-TD catch.
- Never before has a Ravens' wideout registered dual 150-yard receiving games in a season (165 vs. Cin. and 152 at STL). Smith also posted the Top 2 receiving yards outputs by a rookie in the NFL in 2011.
- In 2011's Week 11, Smith joined Ken Burrow (2 in 1971) and Randy Moss (3 in 1998) as the only rookies in NFL history to have multiple games with at least 150 receiving yards and a TD catch.

## LONG BALL LOVE

**WR Torrey Smith** ranks first in Ravens franchise history in yards-per-catch average, posting a 17.4 mark over the three seasons in which he's caught 103 passes for 1,788 yards and 15 TDs. In 2012, Smith tallied a 17.4 yards-per-catch mark, which ranks fourth best in franchise single-season annals.

**K Justin Tucker** earned the Ravens' 2012 kicking job as a rookie after a training camp battle with veteran Billy Cundiff, and he excelled in his first season as a pro. Tucker connected on 30 of his 33 FGAs, hitting 4 50+ FGs, which rank as a Ravens' single-season record. Producing 132 points (third most in team history and eighth in the NFL), his 90.9% success rate stands as the second-best mark in Ravens single-season history and also second by a rookie kicker in NFL history.

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**HEAD COACH JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE**

**Opening statement:** “Good to see everybody. Thanks for coming over. [We] just finished some preparations for the Browns. Obviously, we’ll be moving through that throughout the course of the week. We’re excited to do so, and we’re ready to move on.”

**Any further clarification on the replay “snafu?” [What happened] on the [Wes] Welker drop? What [did] your upstairs people [see] when they saw it? (Joe Platania)** “We could have done a better job with that, looking back on it, to get that information communicated. We could have been better with that.”

**With Tandon [Doss] back, how much does it help to have a guy that knows the offense, that has that background [with Baltimore] without having to go outside? (Aaron Wilson)** “It helps to have a guy that’s been here, certainly. When you can bring someone back like Tandon [Doss], who knows the offense and is ready to plug right in and play for us, [it helps]. There’s no teaching we have to do; he knows what to do. It’s a big plus for us, and we’re very fortunate that he was available for us.”

**Without harping too much on the whole replay situation, could you clarify the communication process that went down? (Jerry Coleman)** “We’ve been all through that communication process on replays. I think everybody understands how that works. We just have to do a better job with it. We’ve got to see it.”

**Was there a quality coach that you speak with? (Jerry Coleman)** “I’m not going to get in to all of that. We just have to do a better job with it, and that’s on me. We’ve got to do a better job of it.”

**With Jacoby [Jones], do you expect him back in October most likely? (Aaron Wilson)** “We’ll see how it goes with Jacoby [Jones]. He’s got a sprain. It’s not what you’d call a serious-type thing. We just have to see how it goes. [It’s] day-to-day, week-to-week. [We’ll] see how fast he can come back.”

**Is the prognosis better for Michael Oher? (Aaron Wilson)** “Prognosis is the same for Michael Oher – day-to-day, week-to-week.”

**Any update for Arthur Jones? He tweeted out that things have progressed, but from a football standpoint, where does he stand? (Jamison Hensley)** “We had good news on that. Arthur [Jones] went and saw a specialist, and without getting into the details of it – I’ll leave that to Arthur – it was very positive. Good news, it seems to have cleared up. He should be good, and we’ll just have to see how ready he is to play this week. That will obviously be the issue football-wise. We’ll just see how ready he is to play. I can’t make a prediction on that right now.”

**After you watched the tape, did it look like a lot of the secondary troubles were tackling? Is that something you’re going to focus on this week and stress to the players? (Ryan Mink)** “Yes, it was fundamentals, and there were some scheme issues. No. 1, [there are] scheme issues that we have to do a better job of as coaches – making sure that we’re running things that are being taught in such a way as that they can be executed quickly, especially against an offense like that that makes you operate quickly. We need to do better with that. We need to do a better job of the fundamentals and the basics of playing the game under pressure, under stress against a good offense. We can do much better with that, and I’m really excited about that. We can really improve back there going forward. Obviously, we have to. That kind of performance – in the end – is never going to be acceptable. We’re capable of playing far better than that, and we have to.”

**With [Wes] Welker’s touchdown, was that just a miscommunication there with Corey [Graham] and Lardarius [Webb]? (Matt Vensel)** “Yes, that’s exactly what it was. Two guys played different techniques.”

**Joe [Flacco] had a couple of [interceptions and] in the preseason he had a few. Is it just coincidence or something to be concerned about? (Clifton Brown)** “It’s obviously something to be concerned about. I would say those are more technique issues. Again, fundamentals [like] the routes and Joe [Flacco] being on the same page in terms of the way the route is going to be run – angles of the route – things like that. [They’re] things that we have to keep working on. We’re not there yet 100 percent on those things. The other thing in the passing game is just catching the ball. We just have to catch the ball. We have 87 plays in that game; we have 50 plays in the first half without getting more than four plays in any one series in the third quarter. We’re up 17-14 at halftime, and I don’t think we played very well in the first half. [Then] we have all the mistakes in the third quarter that put us out of the game, basically. Guys keep fighting. We have to execute better with the simple things, the basic things that we’re fully capable of doing.”



**Would you like to find a clear-cut kick returner or that could be a by committee? (Garrett Downing)** “We’ll just go with the best guys we have. As a coach, what you do is that you play with the guys you’ve got. We’ll put the guy out there that gives us the best chance to hold on to the football and get us some yards. That’s what you have to do; that’s what we did during the game. Obviously, the punt returner we were forced to put out there was Lardarius [Webb]. You deal with the guys you have and you get ready to play the game. We’ve got some guys that are fully capable of doing it that we’ll have a lot of confidence in.”

**Michael Huff was pretty disappointed after the game with his tackling. Was there anything fundamentally that popped up from the film that you guys were able to see? (Aaron Wilson)** “Anybody that knows football can see that – what it was fundamentally. That’s exactly what it was; it was fundamental issues that he’s definitely able to play better and he will. He worked very hard, and personally, I feel good about him as a player. I’m just looking forward to seeing how he bounces back. I think he’ll do well.”

**The story came out right before kickoff on Thursday that you’ve gotten a contract extension. Can you address that? How gratifying is it for Ozzie [Newsome] and Steve [Bisciotti] to show that support and reward you for how much success you’ve had? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “Thanks for bringing that up. First of all, it’s an honor to be coaching here. It’s an honor to be a head coach. It’s an honor to be a coach in the National Football League. Then to be able to do it with the Baltimore Ravens – it’s a dream come true. It’s beyond what you would even hope for. I’m just so grateful to Steve [Bisciotti] and Ozzie [Newsome] and Dick [Cass] and Kevin [Byrne] and everybody in this organization – top to bottom and sideways – that makes coming to work every day such a treasured thing for us. I think we all feel that way as coaches. Something like this is a team thing. Anytime a player has an opportunity to sign an extended contract or come here, it’s because it’s a team effort. Coaches have done a great job; players have done a great job. I’d like to think it benefits everybody here that’s part of our team. I’m just very excited about it and ready to move on to try to prove that decision to be the right one.”

**It’s my understanding that this was done a couple months ago. Was this something that was done early in the offseason and you just didn’t feel the need to put it out there? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “It was done before it was announced, without getting into any of the specifics about it, and it’s much appreciated.”

**Did the timing of the announcement catch you off guard? (Jerry Coleman)** “Well, the timing of what the media does oftentimes catches me off guard, so I’d have to say that’s probably true.” *(laughter)*

**The perception of the media was that Ryan Jensen was an IR candidate. Is this a procedural move, or do you really think he’s going to be a player for you guys sooner than most people think? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “Yes, the latter. We feel like he’s going to be a player for us sooner rather than later, and that’s why we held on to him on the 53- [man roster]. We’ve got high hopes for him for this year, and he’s not too far out. He had a broken foot early in training camp, but it was early in training camp. He’s worked really hard. He’s in very good shape. He’s going to have to get in football shape, but he’s getting closer to being back, so we’re excited about him.”

**Does Deonte Thompson fall into that category, too? (Aaron Wilson)** “Yes, Deonte [Thompson] would fall right into that category. He’s making progress, and he’s close as well.”

**Could Ryan Jensen provide depth at guard and center? (Ryan Mink)** “Yes. Ryan [Jensen] is a two-way guy. He can play both guard spots and center.”

**Do you feel like you’ve been given a bit of a reprieve since the other division teams lost and now you’re going to play a division game? (Joe Platanio)** “The great thing about it is – and we all know this – it’s week to week in this league, and it’s going to be that way. What we need to do is take care of our business. If we take care of our business, we’re going to be in the hunt and make it interesting, and if we don’t, we’re not. I know that’s kind of a bad answer, but it’s the truth. All of a sudden, we find ourselves tied for first place. We also find ourselves tied for last place. *(laughter)* That’s where we’re at, and we’ll make it where we will.”

**How do you want your team to deal with that loss? Do you want them to move on or do you want them to be ticked off? (Jamison Hensley)** “That’s a good question, and I would say this: I want both. I want them to feel how I feel, but that’s how we all feel. We’re ticked off at ourselves, to use your term. We’re not happy about the way we played, especially in critical situations. Against a good team like that, and all credit to them, but you can’t just hand them points. It’s just not something that you can do. And we did that – we handed them opportunities. Going forward, we’ve got to improve from that. So, yes, we should be upset about that. We also have to move on from it emotionally, and we have to prepare for the next challenge. It’s just like a play. You can’t carry



the last play into the next play. I think we did that a couple times during the game, too. Guys carried the last play into the next play and let it complicate things. So, we have to not carry the last game emotionally into the next game.”

**Is this just the right kind of year to have an emergency list for potential free agents? (Aaron Wilson)** “That’s an ongoing process for us. We have to be looking at guys at all times. Guys are going to get hurt. We’re going to need to make personnel decisions. We’re going to have needs, and we’ll be looking at guys constantly.”

**Marlon Brown played more than you had probably planned. How do you think he did? (Matt Vensel)** “I would say he played well. He’s a rookie. It wasn’t too big for him. He handled the situation extremely well, which we all thought that he would, and I’m happy to see that he did. We’re looking forward to seeing how he develops. We’re kind of excited about it.”

**How would you evaluate Gino Gradkowski in his first regular season game? (Ryan Mink)** “Gino [Gradkowski] did a good job. The thing about Gino – and he and I talked about this – that people are going to question is [that] he’s a 300-pound guy, which we all say is pretty darn big, and there are a lot of centers who aren’t as big as he is. But, you say, ‘Is he going to hold up physically against the bigger defensive linemen?’ He’s going to have a challenge again this week. He did that really well. Physically, he did a good job. Then, of course, running the show, he did a good job, [but] he could do better with that. For the first time out against that defense, it was pretty good. There is a lot that he can improve on and get better at.”

**Is there something about home openers [that is unique], especially being the defending Super Bowl champions? (Jamison Hensley)** “As coaches, we’re probably always wary of those things, but I like our guys’ ability to handle that part of it. There’s nothing like playing at M&T Bank Stadium. Any player or coach that plays here for the Ravens definitely feels that way. We’re really excited to be coming back home to our fans. We just feel a need to play the way they expect us to play. That’s our challenge, and we need to do that.”

**I know you guys traded Anquan Boldin for salary cap purposes, but did seeing him play the way he did yesterday make it difficult to block out all the second-guessing? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “I haven’t heard any of it, probably by design. My wife did mention it to me a couple times. *(laughter)* *(Reporter: “What about Jim [Harbaugh]?”)* No, Jim didn’t say anything. [Anquan] is a great player, and there’s nobody here who didn’t want Anquan back. He plays for another team now, and I happen to have a rooting interest in that team, I guess. I haven’t watched the game, but I have a rooting interest in Anquan, too. We all do. He played well. It was a business decision both ways. It was definitely disappointing that it went the way it did, but I’m happy for his success and looking forward to our success as well.”

**With the blocked punt, have you figured out what happened, and is it easily correctable? (Clifton Brown)** “It’s easily correctable from the standpoint of ... The situation is that we understood what they were doing, and we tried to execute the assignment right. We had assignment issues sometimes in the game in different areas, [and] we had technique [and] execution issues at other times. And then there were a few scheme issues – understanding the scheme. That was an execution of fundamentals issue. The guys involved fully understand it, but we need to get better at it. There are really fast guys coming off the edges. When you’re young in this league, you need to know how to do it, and we just have to get better at it. That was a big turning point in the game, as it always is. When you’re backed up like that, and you get a punt blocked ... It happened for us in the preseason, and you saw what a turning point it was. Hats off to the guy who rushed off the edge there – he did a great job. But, we need to block better.”

**Are you anxious to see how they bounce back from something like that? (Jerry Coleman)** “We couldn’t wait to get back on the field Friday afternoon with the team, and they felt the same way. We couldn’t wait to get on the field this afternoon and couldn’t wait for the team meeting. We believe we’re capable of being a very good football team, but we’ve got to make it happen.”

**Do you anticipate the lineup being very similar with personnel groupings, without getting into strategy? (Aaron Wilson)** “Without getting into strategy? *(laughter)* Without getting into strategy or specifics, we’ll see how that shakes out.”

**What things did you see on film that were better Thursday night than you had initially thought? (Luke Jones)** “There were a lot of good things. We played well in a lot of ways, but you can’t make the mistakes we made. We had, on defense, 309 yards on seven plays. Take away seven plays, and you’re looking at a pretty darn good game against Peyton Manning – about 200 yards. Well, that’s always the case when you give up a lot of big plays, so that’s on us. We’ve got to corral the big plays, build on all the good things, build on those 63 plays or so, but take care of those seven, whichever seven those are going to be next week. You’ve got to chase all that as you go forward.”



**The play of the front seven seemed to be one of the good things from Thursday. It seemed like you guys did a good job against the run and got decent pressure, too. (Matt Zenitz)** “I thought the front seven did play well. We defended that spread attack with six in the box to play run defense. We did a nice job with that, and we were also able to get pressure. A lot of the things with Peyton [Manning], numbers-wise, is that he gets the ball out very quickly, and that’s by design. But we got a number of hits on him and we got a few sacks. So, we felt good about that, and that’s something to build off of.”

**You fell behind late in the game and had 62 passes from Joe [Flacco], and 30 in the first half. Is that more of a tilt than you wanted? (Clifton Brown)** “We know we have to run the ball. We have to run the ball well. We’re definitely not there, in terms of our ability to run the ball; we’ve got to get better. But, you do whatever you need to do to win the game. I don’t anticipate many games where we’ll throw the ball over 60 times, but we had 87 plays. Percentage-wise, we’ll probably run the ball more most of the time than we did in this game. If we catch 80 percent of the passes that we dropped, now you’re looking at a lights-out performance in the passing game. We’ve just got to execute better that way.”

**Any conversations with Dallas Clark or Ed Dickson after the game? (Bill West)** “Sure, lots of conversation. They both did things really well, and they both did things they’d like to have back – catching the ball being the main thing. Those guys have good hands and they can catch the ball. But, you have to go out there and you have to do it. That’s what it’s all about. That’s what you’re on the team for. They know that, and they’re excited to get back at it.”

**For years in this league, if you stopped the run and forced a team to pass, it was a little bit of a leg up to make someone one-dimensional. Some of these teams you run up against – Denver, high-powered passing, and there are some other ones – is that still the case in the NFL? (John Eisenberg)** “It’s definitely the case, because if you don’t stop the run, it makes it really impossible to stop the pass. But our issue was the big plays. You can’t give up a screen for a touchdown. That’s just not acceptable. You can’t leave guys wide open. You can’t miss tackles that turn into big plays. You can’t turn guys loose in the red zone. You can’t do it.”

**You add two veteran pass catchers in [Dallas] Clark and [Brandon] Stokely in training camp – I guess about midway – and then [Aaron] Mellette and [Marlon] Brown are two rookies. How much does your faith in Joe Flacco – his handle of the offense and his leadership – allow you to usher in a bunch of new pass catchers? How much does that help? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “That’s definitely a part of it. You feel like Joe will bring those guys along and train those guys and those kinds of things. But that’s our challenge right now; that’s what we’re faced with. It’s a good challenge, because they’re talented young guys, and we’re excited about the kind of players they’re going to be.”

**It’s been a stated goal of this organization the last couple of years to get younger and to get faster. When you do that, do you sometimes run the risk of having the lack of poise and the lack of execution? (Joe Platania)** “Well, it’s a risk that has to be taken by every team – that’s just a fact. We were at one point in time a few years ago the ‘oldest team,’ and everybody said we’re too old. They said we couldn’t win because we’re too old. Then, we won. So, if we’re a younger team now and they want to say we can’t win because we’re too young, then we plan on proving them wrong there, too. You have to work through the mistakes. Guys make mistakes, whether it’s a punt protection deal or dropping a pass or not playing a defense right – whatever it is. You just keep coaching through that stuff. It’s a long season, as we’ve found out. It’s a one-week season every week in the National Football League.”

**I know Aaron Mellette was inactive the other night, but is he someone you can see factoring in a little bit? (Matt Zenitz)** “Yes, we could see that. We’ll just have to see how it all shakes out. You put your 46 guys up [on the gameday roster] that make the most sense for that game. But, he’s playing well. There’s nothing that he’s doing that wouldn’t make him a possibility to be active. We only had four receivers up.”
