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## NFL WEEK 3: TEXANS (2-0) VS. RAVENS (1-1)



SUNDAY, SEPT. 22, 2013 • 1 P.M. ET • M&T BANK STADIUM (71,008)

### JUST THE FACTS

• The Baltimore Ravens, currently 1-1, will host the undefeated Houston Texans (2-0) this Sunday, Sept. 22, at M&T Bank Stadium. Game time is 1 p.m. This will be the fifth time in the last four seasons that these two teams have played. The Texans' lone win (43-13) in these contests came last year (10/21/12) in Houston. Baltimore won at the Texans, 34-28 in OT, on 12/13/10, won (29-14) at M&T Bank Stadium on 10/16/11 and won (20-13) in the Divisional Playoff round in Baltimore on 1/15/12.

• After being shut out in the first half, the Ravens rebounded from a 6-0 deficit to beat the Browns, 14-6, in Baltimore last Sunday. **QB Joe Flacco**, who found out within two hours of kickoff that his wife had delivered their second son (Daniel), orchestrated 2 second-half TD drives. The first ended with a 5-yard **RB Bernard Pierce** TD run, and the second was capped by Flacco's 5-yard TD strike to rookie **WR Marlon Brown**. The Texans, meanwhile, stopped the visiting Titans, 30-24, in overtime last Sunday. Houston also played a thrilling opener when it won at San Diego, 31-28, on Sept. 9.

• Baltimore has won back-to-back AFC North titles and is the NFL's only team to go the playoffs in each of the last five seasons – winning at least one game in every one of those campaigns. All of this has come under the direction of head coach **John Harbaugh**, who has directed the Ravens to three AFC Championship games and a victory in Super Bowl XLVII last February.

• Following the home game against Houston, the Ravens will go on the road for consecutive weeks when they play at Buffalo on Sept. 29 and at Miami on Oct. 6. Green Bay comes to Baltimore on Oct. 13, the only home game for the Ravens in the month of October.

### HARBS SAYS

"We all know this: It's a week-to-week league. That's the truth. You're in a battle every week, and every team can beat the other one. That's what makes the NFL great. What the Ravens need to do every week is take care of business. If we can do that with all the necessary preparation and focus, we can be in the hunt and make this interesting. If we don't do that, we won't be there. We do believe we're capable of being a very good football team this season, but we've got to make that happen."

### INJURY REPORT

Four Ravens missed the Browns game: starting **WR/RS Jacoby Jones** (knee), **C Ryan Jensen** (foot), **WR/RS Deonte Thompson** (foot) and **DT Brandon Williams** (toe). **ILB Arthur Brown** (chest), **CB Chykie Brown** (knee), **DE Chris Canty** (groin) and **RB Ray Rice** (hip) left the Cleveland game and did not return. **TE Dennis Pitta** (hip), **OLB D.J. Bryant** (knee) and **OLB Adrian Hamilton** (wrist) are on Injured Reserve. (Pitta is designated for return.) Former starting **ILB Jameel McClain** (spine) is on the Physically Unable to Perform list, and rookie (6th round) **DE Kapron Lewis-Moore** (knee) is on the Non-Football Injury list.

### LEWIS ENTERS RING OF HONOR



**LB Ray Lewis**, who retired at the end of the 2012 season after playing 17 years with the Ravens, will be placed into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of this Sunday's game. Lewis, a 13-time Pro Bowler and the Ravens' second-ever draft choice (26th overall in 1996), helped Baltimore win two Super Bowls, the first in 2000 and the second last February. He was the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV in the Ravens' 34-7 victory over the Giants following the 2000 season. Lewis, a two-time NFL Defensive Player of the Year (2000 & 2003), is the only player in NFL history with at least 40 sacks (41.5) and 30 interceptions (31).

## NOTE OF THE WEEK I

During the John Harbaugh Era (since 2008), the Ravens' defense has been particularly strong at home, allowing the NFL's second-fewest points per game (14.9) and third-fewest net yards per game (286.0). The Ravens have also made life hectic on opposing quarterbacks at M&T Bank Stadium, forcing passers into a 67.1 rating (tops in the NFL) and posting 55 INTs (second most).

**What did you take most from your time with Ed Reed?** "Just being a professional – how to come out to work every day, how to practice hard, and most of all, how to study film. He studied film all the time, and that was one aspect he always put on me."

**Do you ever take anything from watching other cornerbacks?** "My favorite is Asante Samuel; I love watching him. He gambles, but he gambles right a lot. I have favorites, but I don't take too much from them. I just take on my game from what I study."

**What's more important, reading the receiver's eyes or the QB's?** "Reading the eyes of the receiver. I was always told by Ed Reed, 'If you see the quarterback throw the ball, you're going to see the receiver catch it. Certain defenses allow you to watch the QB, but that's more for the safety to watch the quarterback's eyes. For a cornerback, you need to keep your eyes on your man.'"

**What does it mean to you to be a Raven?** "I want to be here for the rest of my career. I love the organization. I've got a good relationship with the head coach. Just being around here in this atmosphere, it's the place to be. I don't know if it can get any better in the league, so I would love to be here for the rest of my career. I love the community and the support of the community."

### CAREER SNAPSHOT

Ray Lewis, a 13-time Pro Bowler and the Ravens' second-ever draft choice (26th overall in 1996), helped guide the Ravens to two Super Bowl titles during his career, capturing the Lombardi Trophy in 2000 and 2012. Following the 2012 campaign, Lewis, who will be forever known as the greatest linebacker of his generation and one of the best defensive players in NFL history, retired after 17 seasons. Here is a brief look at his storied professional career:

- In 2000, led a defense that established a 16-game single-season record for fewest points allowed (165) and fewest rushing yards allowed (970), recorded 4 shutouts (1 shy of the post-1970 merger record), and finished first league-wide in six key defensive categories
- Was the second player in NFL history to win both NFL Defensive Player of the Year and Super Bowl MVP awards (2000)...DT Harvey Martin of Dallas won Defensive Player of the Year in 1977 and was co-MVP of Super Bowl XXII with DT Randy White
- Is the only player in NFL history with at least 40 career sacks and 30 career INTs (41.5 sacks and 31 INTs)
- Posted a franchise-record 2,643 career tackles, including a single-season team-best 225 stops in 2003
- Led the Ravens in tackles in 14 of his 17 seasons, registering at least 150 stops 11 times
- Returned 3 of his 31 INTs for TDs
- Had a team-record and career-high 25 tackles at NYG (9/14/97)
- Posted seven career 20-tackle games
- Is second only to Jack Ham (53) in take-aways by a LB in NFL history with 50 total (31 INTs and 19 FRs)

### PERENNIAL PRO BOWLER

LB Ray Lewis was invited to 13 Pro Bowls during his career, tying Hall of Famer Reggie White for the most by a defender in NFL history. Lewis played in 12 Pro Bowls, missing the 2006 Hawaiian classic due to a hand injury. Here are the defenders who have earned the most Pro Bowls during their careers.

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“A leadership role is something I definitely don’t mind taking on now, because I was mentored by one of the greatest leaders probably ever to play the game in Ray Lewis. A lot of his leading was by example, and when he spoke, everybody listened, because they had that respect for him. So, I think being a leader comes with how much respect people have for you. These guys look at the way I work, and they understand that my actions are going to show on the field.”

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**ESPN.com’s Herm Edwards on head coach John Harbaugh:**

“Going into his sixth season in Baltimore, all John Harbaugh has done is win. He’s made the playoffs every year, won at least one playoff game every year, and of course, won a Super Bowl. He’s instilled toughness in his team, which will carry over after the losses of [Ed] Reed and [Ray] Lewis. This team is a perennial playoff contender with a great coach at the helm.”

**Fox Sports analyst Brian Billick on his respect for Ravens general manager & executive vice president Ozzie Newsome:**

“When you can look to a leader who’s in the Hall of Fame and has two rings that he won with two different coaches and two different quarterbacks, whatever he thinks it takes, you can’t question.”

**Former Green Bay Packers vice president Andrew Brandt on the Ravens’ front office and ability to manage the salary cap:**

“The Ravens have always done a good job setting priorities and principles in building their team and not changing course due to the emotion or impulse of the moment. Like all good teams, they’re willing to move on from popular players and make unpopular decisions for the greater good of the team. Ozzie [Newsome] sets a nice course, and Pat Moriarty does a good job executing it on the financial side. They’ll be fine.”

**OLB Terrell Suggs on his desire to win a second Lombardi Trophy:**

“Last year’s team achieved some great things, but why settle for that when you have the opportunity to do it again? As long as I have got air in my lungs, I’m going to try and win another one. The first one is great, but I’d guarantee you the second one feels better.”

**Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on the Ravens’ new players:**

“With Elvis [Dumervil] and Chris Canty and [Marcus] Spears and Michael Huff – these are not rookies or young guys that don’t know how to be pros. [Ray Lewis] was an unbelievable pro, but so are these guys. They may not be right now the Ray Lewis name that has always been here, but these guys are very, very good professionals. In the classroom and [on the field], they are great examples to these rookies on what you are supposed to be.”

**WR Torrey Smith on rookie WR Marlon Brown’s skill set:**

“Marlon is a big playmaker. He can do a little bit of everything. He has deceptive speed with his stride. He gets in and out of his breaks fast, and he’s explosive for a guy his size.”

**Assistant GM Eric DeCosta on the Ravens’ scouting process and signing of undrafted free agents:**

“I don’t want to compare it to Coke’s secret recipe, but we compare it to Coke’s secret recipe. We try to treat the process as one of the most competitive things that we do all year. Besides the games [themselves], undrafted free agency is when you’re competing against the other 31 teams for a very small amount of players with a very small amount of money. ... For us, it’s critically important.”

**Owner Steve Bisciotti on the Ravens’ veteran leaders after the departure of LB Ray Lewis and S Ed Reed:**

“We’re not going to miss a beat from a leadership standpoint. Direction, these guys are going to know what direction to go in. I think this is a great opportunity for guys like [Terrell] Suggs to step up and Joe [Flacco] to step up. It’s coming along exactly the way I figured. Ray Lewis is a once-in-a-generation guy. And you saw guys like Terrell Suggs – who was a Defensive Player of the Year [in 2011] – in the offseason, and as the season started last year, he was still deferring to Ray Lewis. And it’s just interesting. When you have someone of that iconic level, it was hard to step out of his shadow, and they really didn’t try to. They knew that they were seeing something special, and that they were fortunate to be a part of it.”

**Saints LB Jonathan Vilma on FB Vonta Leach:**

“He reminds me of the Lorenzo Neals in the day, those 1990s fullbacks that were just big, raw, mauler-type guys that have no neck, just head and shoulders, and they are going one way.”

**Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on new Ravens LB Daryl Smith:**

“Daryl [Smith] is a very intelligent player. You can tell he’s a veteran. He plays smooth. He’s got heavy hands. He’s a tough guy. I really love his personality, and he fits right in with our [defensive meeting] room. We’ve been very pleased so far.”

**ESPN.com’s Matt Williamson on G Marshal Yanda being one of the NFL’s top offensive linemen:**

“[Marshal] Yanda is one of the most underrated players in the game. He does everything well and is one of the best guards in the league in pass protection. In fact, Yanda has been quite successful on the edge at right tackle. He is also an excellent run-blocker who paves the way for Ray Rice when the Ravens need a tough yard or two.”

## LAST WEEK VS. CLEVELAND

### Baltimore Ravens 14, Cleveland Browns 6

M&T Bank Stadium • Baltimore, MD • Week 2: Sept. 15

After being shut out in the first half, the Ravens rebounded from a 6-0 deficit to beat the Browns, 14-6, at M&T Bank Stadium. Baltimore **QB Joe Flacco**, whose wife, Dana, delivered their son, Daniel, within two hours of kickoff, kept his focus as he directed the two second-half scoring drives. Cleveland grabbed a 3-0 first-quarter lead on former Raven **K Billy Cundiff's** 21-yard field goal. Cundiff converted a 51-yard FG with two seconds left in the second quarter to give the Browns a 6-0 halftime advantage. Ravens **K Justin Tucker**, who missed just 3 FGs a year ago in his rookie season, missed two attempts in the first half, one from 50 yards and the second from 44 yards. On Baltimore's first possession in the third quarter, Flacco led a balanced 12-play, 80-yard drive that ended with **RB Bernard Pierce's** 5-yard touchdown run. (Flacco completed first-down passes on three third-and-long situations during the drive.) The Ravens' second TD came in the fourth quarter when Flacco hit rookie **WR Marlon Brown** with a 5-yard TD strike. Baltimore's defense limited Cleveland to 259 yards and did not allow a TD for the first time since it held the Browns to 5 FGs on 11/4/12. The Ravens sacked Browns QB Brandon Weeden 5 times, including 1.5 by **ILB Daryl Smith**. Weeden completed 21 of 33 for 227 yards, with TE Jordan Cameron catching 5 passes for 95 yards. RB Trent Richardson was limited to 58 yards on 18 carries (3.2 avg.). Flacco completed passes to eight receivers, finishing 22-of-33 for 211 yards. **WR Torrey Smith** caught a career-high-tying 7 balls for 85 yards. **RB Bernard Pierce**, who subbed in the fourth quarter for injured **RB Ray Rice** (hip), gained 57 rushing yards.

### Houston Texans 43, Baltimore Ravens 13 Reliant Stadium • Houston, TX • Oct. 21, 2012

A banged up Ravens team, playing its first game without recently-injured LB Ray Lewis and **CB Lardarius Webb**, lost at Houston, 43-13, in a battle that featured the AFC teams with the best records (5-1). Houston **QB Matt Schaub** threw 2 TD passes, and **RB Arian Foster** ran for 2 more, while the Texans' defense added a safety and a TD with 1 of 2 INTs against **QB Joe Flacco**. Baltimore started well, taking a 3-0 lead on **K Justin Tucker's** 51-yard FG. After forcing back-to-back "three-and-outs" on the Texans' first two possessions, Houston's defense scored when Flacco was tackled for a safety by LB Connor Barwin. Houston took advantage of the next possession, completing a TD drive when

Schaub hit WR Kevin Walter with a 25-yard TD strike for a 9-3 lead. **CB Johnathan Joseph** then stole a Flacco pass and raced 52 yards for another TD to give the Texans a 16-3, second-quarter lead. The rout was on. By halftime, Houston led 29-3 after a Schaub-to-**TE Owen Daniels** TD and 2 K Shayne Graham FGs (33 and 29 yards). Showing the fight they kept all game, the Ravens came back with a TD in the third quarter when Flacco hit **WR Tandon Doss** on a 15-yard pass. Foster then added his 2 TD runs (1 and 2 yards) around another impressive Tucker FG (54 yards) to complete the scoring. Houston dominated in almost every category, outgaining the Ravens 420 to 176 yards and owning time of possession (38:16 to 21:44). Flacco completed 21 of 43 for 147 yards, and Schaub was 23-of-37 for 256 yards and a 100.7 rating. Houston rushed for 181 yards, with Foster gaining 98 on 19 carries. **RB Ray Rice** ran 9 times for 42 and was limited to 12 yards receiving on 5 catches. The game featured the first appearance of the season for **OLB Terrell Suggs**, who was the NFL's 2011 Defensive Player of the Year and had torn his Achilles in April. Suggs notched 4 tackles, 1 sack and 1 PD against the Texans.

## TEXANS SNAPSHOT

**Overview:** Coming off two-straight AFC South titles, the Houston Texans are 2-0 in 2013 and stand alone atop the division. After thrilling victories in consecutive weeks to start the season, the Texans became the first team since the 1970 NFL merger to win their first two contests on the game's final play. Last week, despite an eight-point, fourth-quarter deficit, Houston defeated Tennessee, 30-24, in dramatic fashion, capped off by a rookie **WR DeAndre Hopkins** 3-yard TD catch in OT. The Texans are one of eight teams that remain unbeaten.

**Gary Kubiak:** In his eighth season leading the Texans, Kubiak owns a 60-53 regular season record since becoming the franchise's second head coach in 2006. After failing to earn the postseason in his first five years at the helm, he has guided the Texans to consecutive AFC South titles, including a franchise-best 12-4 mark in 2012. Houston has appeared in the Divisional Playoff in each of the past two seasons. A 20-year NFL coaching veteran, Kubiak has also served as the Broncos' "O" coordinator (1995-2005) and the 49ers' QBs coach (1994).

**Offense:** Houston ranks fourth in total offense (450.5 ypg) and points (30.5 ppg.). Behind the explosive tandem of **RB Ben Tate** (18 carries, 148 yards) and **RB Arian Foster** (37-136), the Texans own the league's third-ranked rushing attack (146.0 ypg). **QB Matt Schaub** is 60-of-93 passing for 644 yards, 6 TDs (third in AFC) and 3 INTs. **WR Andre Johnson** (who left last week's contest and did not return - head) is tied with a league-high 20 receptions for 222 yards, while the first-round rookie receiver Hopkins leads all first-year players with 183 yards on 12 catches with 1 score. **TE Owen Daniels** is tied for first among NFL TEs with 3 TDs, adding 91 yards on 7 receptions.

**Defense:** The Texans' unit ranks fourth overall (255.5 ypg), posting the NFL's third-best pass defense (156.0 ypg), but has allowed 6 passing TDs. Houston has forced opponent three-and-out drives a league-best 48 percent of the time. **LB Brian Cushing** missed most of last season with a torn ACL, but has been dominant in leading the defense with 16 tackles (15 solo), 1 INT (returned for a TD) and tying for a team-high 2 sacks. Last year's AP Defensive Player of the Year, **DE J.J. Watt**, has produced 2 sacks, adding 8 tackles (7 solo).

## SPECIAL FORCES



Assistant head coach/special teams coordinator **Jerry Rosburg**, a 35-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. In 2012, the Ravens' special teams units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones**, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD in Super Bowl XLVII.

Rosburg's kickers were special in 2012, too: **P Sam Koch** set Ravens single-season punting records with a 47.1 gross average and a 40.8 net average, shattering career bests. **K Justin Tucker** made 30 of 33 FGAs (90.9%), producing the second-best success rate in Ravens single-season history and also the second-best mark by a rookie kicker in NFL history.

Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume both with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

## SPECIAL TEAMS STANDOUTS

In 2012, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 2 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that's based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. The Vikings finished first in Gosselin's special teams rankings, followed by the Ravens and the Bengals.

## A STRONG RETURN

Dating back to the 2008 season when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore has produced the NFL's second-best kickoff return average (24.8).

# COORDINATORS NOTES

## CALDWELL'S ATTACK



**Jim Caldwell**, a 36-year coaching veteran, joined the Ravens as the team's QBs coach in February 2012 and was elevated to offensive coordinator on Dec. 10, replacing Cam Cameron. Caldwell arrived in Baltimore after coaching 10 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, including the three (2009-11) as head coach. In his first year at the helm, he led the Colts to the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLIV. Caldwell, who earned a Super Bowl ring (2006) with Indy, spent six seasons tutoring one of the NFL's all-time greats in QB Peyton Manning. During the course of Caldwell's time in Indianapolis, the Colts achieved much success, tying an NFL record with nine-straight playoff appearances and winning six AFC South division titles.

## CALDWELL FIRES UP "O"

Under **Jim Caldwell**, who was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to the Ravens' Dec. 16, 2012 game vs. Denver, Baltimore averaged 400.6 yards of offense per contest (146.4 rushing & 254.1 passing) and 27.3 points per game to close out the season.

## PEES LEADS THE "D"



**Dean Pees**, a 10-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2012, after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, leads a Baltimore unit that finished as the NFL's third-best scoring defense four-consecutive years (2008-11) and tied (NYG) for 12th in 2012, allowing 21.5 points per game.

- Rice needs 243 receiving yards to hit the 3,000 milestone. He also needs 63 receiving yards to move into fourth on the Ravens' all-time list, passing Qadry Ismail (2,819). Rice needs 2 receiving yards to pass Travis Taylor (2,758) for fifth on Baltimore's career chart.

- With 151 total yards from scrimmage, Rice can hit the 8,500 milestone for his career. If Rice gains 818 yards from scrimmage, he'll pass Jamal Lewis (9,166) for the most yards from scrimmage in Ravens history.

### WR TORREY SMITH

- With 1,873 receiving yards during his career, Smith needs 127 more to reach the 2,000-yard milestone.
- With 112 more receiving yards, Smith can take over sole possession of 10th on the Ravens' career receiving yards chart. WR Jermaine Lewis currently stands 10th with 1,984 yards.

### WR BRANDON STOKLEY

- Stokley (392) needs 8 more catches to reach the 400-career milestone. With 1 more receiving TD, he'll have 40 for his career.

### OLB TERRELL SUGGS

## IMPRESSIVE STREAKS FROM '12

- In 2012's Week 13 division battle against the Steelers, Baltimore's home winning streak was snapped. The Ravens entered the game having won 15-consecutive games at M&T Bank Stadium (16 including playoffs), the NFL's longest active home streak at the time.

- The defeat marked the Ravens' first loss at home since 12/5/10, which also came against the Steelers (13-10).

- Pittsburgh's win in Week 13 (2012) snapped another streak: The Ravens had won 12-straight AFC North games, tying Indianapolis for the longest division winning streak since 2002 division realignment.

- With 2012's Week 15 loss to Denver, the Ravens dropped back-to-back home games for the first time under **John Harbaugh**. The last time Baltimore lost consecutive home games was in 2007 (12/3 and 12/9), a stretch that spanned 39 home games leading into Week 15's defeat.

Since 2000, the Ravens own a 62-2 record when posting at least a +2 turnover margin in a game, with the only losses coming in 2010 in a 23-20 OT thriller at New England (10/17) and in Week 2 of 2012 in a 24-23 dramatic game at Philadelphia (9/16).

## TORREY'S COURAGEOUS NIGHT

**WR Torrey Smith** played in the 2012 Week 3 Sunday night victory over New England after his brother, 19-year-old Tevin Jones, passed away in a motorcycle accident that morning. Smith posted 6 catches for 127 yards and 2 TDs in the come-from-behind win, producing the third 100-yard game of his young career. Additionally, he eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving milestone for his career.

## SMITH BIG IN '12 PLAYOFFS

In the 2012 thrilling, double-overtime Divisional Playoff win at Denver (38-35 on 1/12/13), **WR Torrey Smith** caught 59-yard and 32-yard TD passes, helping mark the first game in NFL playoff history that a QB (**Joe Flacco**) threw 2 TDs of 59-plus yards (the other being to **WR Jacoby Jones** on a 70-yarder). In the 2012 postseason, Smith recorded a 21.2 yards-per-catch average, reeling in 11 passes for 233 yards.

## 2011 ROOKIE SENSATION

In 2011's Week 11 game vs. Cincinnati, **WR Torrey Smith** set a Ravens' single-season and single-game record for receiving yards by a rookie, totaling a career-high 165 yards on 6 catches (27.5 avg.). In 2011, he had 50 catches for 841 yards and a Ravens' rookie-record 7 TDs. Impressively, the 2011 second-round pick owns two of the Top 5 receiving days in team history.

#### Smith Quick Hits:

- During the '11 campaign, Smith ranked 13th in the NFL with a stout 16.8 yards-per-catch avg.
- Smith's 26-yard TD catch with 8 seconds remaining in Week 9 at Pit. capped a 92-yard drive and sealed the Ravens' 23-20 win.
- Impressively, 5 of his 7 TD receptions in 2011 covered at least 25 yards (74, 41, 38, 36, 26, 18 and 8 yards), and he averaged a sensational 34.4 yards-per-TD catch.
- Never before has a Ravens' wideout registered dual 150-yard receiving games in a season (165 vs. Cin. and 152 at STL). Smith also posted the Top 2 receiving yards outputs by a rookie in the NFL in 2011.
- In 2011's Week 11, Smith joined Ken Burrow (2 in 1971) and Randy Moss (3 in 1998) as the only rookies in NFL history to have multiple games with at least 150 receiving yards and a TD catch.

## LONG BALL LOVE

**WR Torrey Smith** ranks first in Ravens franchise history in yards-per-catch average, posting a 17.0 mark over the three seasons in which he's caught 110 passes for 1,873 yards and 15 TDs. In 2012, Smith tallied a 17.4 yards-per-catch mark, which ranks fourth best in franchise single-season annals.

Much of Baltimore's success in 2012 could be attributed to the strong performances of the special teams units. In addition to posting a league-best 3 kick return TDs (108- & 105-yard KORs and 63-yard PR by **WR/RS Jacoby Jones**), scoring a TD off a fake FG (7-yard run by **P Sam Koch**) and being consistently accurate on FG attempts (**K Justin Tucker** was 30-of-33), Baltimore's return blocking and coverage teams excelled. The Ravens ranked second (tied, Min.) in the NFL in average starting position after a kickoff (24.6-yard line) and stood fifth in opponent average starting field position following a kickoff (20.6-yard line).

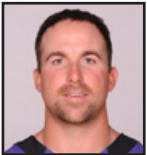

## HEAD COACH JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE

**Opening statement:** "Injuries, just the guys we talked about last night are really the only things to speak of, I would say. Chykie [Brown], same as last night. Ray [Rice], same as last night. Chris Canty has an MRI that we're waiting for on a groin strain, and we had the MRI on Art Brown with the [pectoral] strain, but he was out there at the walk-through, so I don't know that there was any issue there, but we'll find out here soon enough. That's what I know at this point."

**When it comes to young players, they tend to be emotionally a bit more up-and-down than a veteran. But with Marlon Brown's great start, is he taking to things in a more even-keeled way? (Joe Platania)** "He seems to be. He seems to be very even-keeled. Marlon has done a nice job. He works hard every day. He's got a really good mentor in Torrey Smith. He can see how Torrey has handled his success and the kind of approach Torrey takes to the job every day, and that probably benefits him."

**John, with Ray Rice, he still didn't need an MRI? You guys felt good enough about it? (Aaron Wilson)** "Right, correct."

**John, can a guy play with a flexor strain? I honestly don't know. Are you wondering if he can play, or since he hasn't had an MRI it appears that he can? (David Ginsburg)** "That's the indication, that it's not anything that's really serious. They would be looking at it if they thought it was. So, we'll just be day-to-day with him. Ray's a guy ... I'd probably lean toward resting him this week and then see how he looks this weekend. He's not going to need the practice to play in the game, but if he feels great, we'll put him out there, and if he doesn't, we'll probably rest him and get him ready to go Sunday if possible."

**The run game seemed to change things for you in the second half. Can you talk more about the balance in the run/pass game in the second half? (Mark Zinno)** "We had more balance in the second half."

**How did that have an effect on the team in a positive way? (Mark Zinno)** "It had a positive effect. I thought it was good. If you have a specific question, I would be happy to answer it."

**The defense gave up 49 points the first week. This week you were able to hold the Browns to just two field goals. What is your evaluation after watching the tape of the defense? (Bill West)** "We didn't give up the big plays. We tackled far better than we did the week before. The offense we played last week is further along than the offense we played this week. Certainly, we understand that. So you've got to take that into account as well. But, we just improved in some areas that we needed to improve in. Mainly, in the back end, and yet, when you watch the tape, there are a lot of things that we still have to improve in. So, it's a work in progress. I feel like we are under construction, but it's always that way. You just have to keep building on what we've done before and try to improve going forward."

**How would you evaluate Matt Elam's play after watching the tape? (Ryan Mink)** "I thought he played really well. He did what a young safety probably should do: He played to keep everything in front of him. There were some things that he probably could have played a little bit tighter at times, and younger guys probably would have probably made the mistake of playing it too tight sometimes. He played with a lot of maturity in that way, and it was good to see. He played well."

**Did Ray Rice indicate when he got injured in yesterday's game? It seemed like earlier in the game he might have gotten nicked up before the play where he went down. Did he say anything about that? (Jamison Hensley)** "I don't have that information."

**On the topic of Ray, the guy from the Browns, Phil Taylor, smacked him upside the head. He seemed to suggest that maybe Ray had spit on him. Did you watch the tape or did you talk to Ray about the incident? (Aaron Wilson)** "I've not talked to Ray about it. It was brought to my attention. I watched it; I didn't see that on the tape."

**Plus it looked like Ray had a mouth piece in, too. (Aaron Wilson)** "I didn't see that on the tape at all."

**That would make it tough to spit ... (Aaron Wilson)** "Right. You want me to put a quote out there like that? Really? (laughing) (Reporter: "How about a birthday gift?") "A birthday gift." (laughter)

**How big of a lift did Tandon Doss provide the return game with Jacoby Jones being out, and just being able to handle both kickoffs and punt returns? (Luke Jones)** "Tandon did a really nice job. At the end of the game, I happened to be walking down the sideline, and somebody said something, and I said, 'Yes, Tandon is playing great.' And there was Tandon right there. It was kind of neat. He really solidified us back there with Jacoby being out – and made the play. He set up the score at the end of the game with the 30-yard punt return or whatever it was. We got the ball down at the 42-yard line, I think, and took it in to score. [That] was just hugely valuable. There was more wind out there than you think, and it was blowing a little funny up there. Their guy had some short punts up into the wind that were hanging a little bit, and Tandon has great hands and handled them very smoothly. So, it was good. It helped us."



**It seemed like Jimmy Smith had a strong game yesterday, too. Was that the case when you watched the tape? (Matt Zenitz)** “Jimmy Smith had a very strong game. He made two plays back to back there at the end where he got PBU’s [pass breakups] and was pretty much one-on-one there against good receivers with good throws that he got the ball out, which was just so big for us in getting that last stop.”

**How big was Jimmy Smith on special teams, too? I noticed him covering the gunner on punt returns, and it seemed like he played a key role in a couple of the punt returns. (Matt Zenitz)** “We are in a situation right now, and you’ve notice that, on special teams where we are a little bit nicked up in different spots, and a lot of our guys have had to play a lot of special teams as well. Guys who are starting and doing things like that – James [Ihedigbo] is starting on the punt team, [Matt] Elam played in pretty much every phase. Michael Huff is out there in pretty much every phase. Jimmy, all the guys, have done a good job with that. That’s a challenge, but they are stepping up and you don’t hear a word out there. They love to play, but it’s not easy.”

**Is there any concern about the lack of production from the tight ends in games so far this season? (Mark Zinno)** “Sure, absolutely. Those guys need to be a big part of what we are doing. They are fully capable of making catches. Ed [Dickson] should be a big-play guy up the seam, over routes and all those kinds of things. We need to get Ed going. Billy [Bajema] made the catch on top of the linebackers, which was big for us. People consider Billy to be a blocker, which he does a great job of, but for him to be able to get downfield and make some plays like that is important. And then Dallas [Clark] had a couple of big plays for us. He had a big third-down conversion. But those guys, you’re right, those guys have to be a bigger part of what we’re doing.”

**When you looked at the film and saw what many people considered drops yesterday – the Marlon Brown and also the Torrey Smith [“nine” routes] – do you consider those drops or just tough balls to catch? (Jerry Coleman)** “I don’t know. The NFL stats do not consider those drops, but those are balls we’d like to see caught. Those are balls that have been caught. I’ll tell you what, those guys expect to make those plays. Torrey has been talking about it all day; he feels like he should have made that catch, and he makes that catch nine out of 10 times. And those are catches we’d like to see Marlon make. He’s a big, tall receiver up the sideline. I felt like he slowed down a little bit. I felt like he gauged it a little more than he should have rather than just running to the spot and beating the ball to the spot and going up and getting it. So, that’s probably an experience thing for him.”

**This week you will potentially be facing another former teammate in Ed Reed if he plays. You’ve seen how teams have game-planned against him for many years. How will it be to be the one game-planning against him this week? (Jamison Hensley)** “It’s going to be like it was for other teams game planning against us in the past, I suppose. It will be a different feeling. I’ll let you know afterwards. It’s a little tougher because we haven’t seen him on tape, so we really don’t know how he fits in their defense. We’ll have to assume that he is going to play. We’d be surprised if he didn’t play in this game, and we’ll have to assume he’s going to play the way he’s played in the past. We’ll have to fit him into their scheme, which in a lot of ways is similar to what we’ve done here. So, it shouldn’t be too hard to figure out where he’s going to be and just envision him out there playing the way he played for us all those years.”

**John, with the play to Chris Ogbonnaya, I don’t know if it was a blown coverage or what? Obviously, it would have been a game-changing play had they completed it to him. What was your reaction when you saw that he was standing wide open? (Mark Zinno)** “My first thought was ... I probably can’t say it here with a live microphone, and the second thought was relief. Third thought was let’s not call that defense again. *(laughter)* After looking at it on tape, I think it’s something that we’ve got to look at, make sure that scheme-wise we have that thing locked up, and anything like it in the future, because they found us with a nice little scheme there, and we’ve got to make sure we’ve got that sewn up next time.”

**Did you get a chance to talk to Joe Flacco today now that he’s gotten a chance to go home and be with his wife and new baby? How is he doing? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “We did give Joe some time today to stay up [in New Jersey], because of getting up there so late last night. I just talked to him through texts, and he seems pretty happy.”

**Brandon Stokley had a couple of nice catches on third down. Is he kind of developing into exactly what you envisioned when you brought him here? (Garrett Downing)** “I hope so. It’s such a hard question to answer, but we have high hopes for Brandon as a third-down chain mover. He was that yesterday, and that’s something ... He made some huge plays for us. And the thing I forgot to mention last night in the press conference, probably the key to the whole second half, was the third-down conversions. What were we, 7-of-8? We ended up 50 percent for the day largely on what took place in the second half. So, if we can convert on third down – and even though they weren’t all third-and-shorts, because their run defense did a good job even – but as you guys are talking about, we stayed patient with the run game, and then we converted on third down. So, to have that type of a weapon is really important.”

**It seems like Joe Flacco has played better than the numbers would indicate, especially yesterday. Do you feel the same way? (Matt Zenitz)** “The first game, for sure, because he had all the drops. Yesterday, he played well to win the game. He made some throws, as you pointed out, that could have been game-changers in the first half if we come up with those catches on the ‘nine’ routes. Then, [in] the second half, he converted the third downs – that was big. I don’t know if the numbers – as you said, they might not have been that [good],



but they were pretty darn good, and they were good enough to win the game. He was about a 95 quarterback rating, which isn't too bad, so we hope it gets better."

**When you're evaluating the offense at this point, do you look at it as saying that a lot is going right, but they just have to make plays when they have chances? (Ryan Mink)** "That's part of it, yes. Making plays is a big part of it. When you look around the league, that's usually the difference if you're doing all the other things to put yourself in position to win games – blocking and picking up blitzes and things like that. We've got to do all those things better. We have playmakers, guys who are capable of doing it, so we just want to see us continue to build on that."

**Is there a rooting interest in tonight's game for you? (Mark Zinno)** "If there was, I'd probably get in big trouble if I said so, right? But there really isn't. Really, there is not. Maybe at the end of the game, I'll get into the game like you guys will, and I'll start to feel a certain way and start pulling for a team. Usually, I'm the kind of guy who pulls for a close game, unless it's really something we need to have happen. I'll be watching the Houston Texans' tape, and I'll have that up in the background probably and probably be distracted more than I should by checking that game out. It'll be a fun thing to watch for all ..." (Mark Zinno: "You'll be rooting for a tie, right?") "That's not a bad idea. Would a tie help us? A tie would help us, wouldn't it? Ok, there you go. (laughter) Duffy Daugherty, right, what did he say?" (Joe Platania: "Kissing your sister.") "Ties are like kissing your sister, Joe Platania, 1966, Notre Dame – very impressive, Joe." (laughter) (Kevin Byrne: "10-10.") "10-10!" [Score of the 1966 Michigan State vs. Notre Dame "Game of the Century."] That's impressive. Jack Harbaugh knew that, right coach Harbaugh? (laughter) Anything else you want to add to this press conference?" (laughter)

**Is it tough to be patient with the run game when the gains are one and two yards? Is it tough to focus on the fact that you're wearing them down and setting up other things? (Jeff Zrebiec)** "Yes, and you're not always wearing them down. Sometimes, they're just getting stronger. You've got to gauge that a little bit. We'd sure like runs to go for more than one or two yards, but I think we understand that sometimes that happens against a good defense. You have to get better at everything. So, we've got to continue to build our pass protection, which did a nice job for the most part yesterday. They had a nice blitz package. I thought our assignments were really good on the blitz package stuff. The run game got better as the game went on. It was at its best at the end, when it was most important. So, the fact that we were able to close the game out with our run game was really big, and that goes to your point. But, we've just got to continue to improve in every area. We're a work in progress – run game, pass protection, making plays downfield, quarterback play, defense, special teams – the whole thing. We've just got to work on everything at once."

**Unfortunately, it's not like college, where you can have a couple of teams to play to prepare for later. Is this a tough schedule for a team like yours, when you have Denver and Houston in the first two out of three games? (Dave Ginsburg)** "I was never in one of those programs as a college coach where we had that. I was always the [underdog] team they [the favorite] were playing, it seemed like, so they were all tough. So maybe that was good training for the NFL, which every team faces that challenge. That's just the way it is. Everybody you play is really good. Everybody you play has really good players. It's not like you're going to have two or three [easy games]. If you're one of those top [college] teams that you're talking about, you're going to have two or three really big games that you better be ready for, and the rest of them you're going to win. It's just not like that, and that's the beauty of the National Football League. I think that's why everybody loves the NFL. It is so much fun to watch. I like coaching here better for that reason, because every week you have a chance, no matter who you're playing. You have a chance to win. Any team in this league can win the championship. The team that plays the best will be the team that wins it in the end, over the course of a long season."

**Could you talk about the confidence level you have in Bernard Pierce? (Jamison Hensley)** "We've had confidence in Bernard [Pierce] since, really, the day he got here and started practicing, because he showed what he's all about. He continues to get better. One thing you may not have noticed was the pass protection. He stepped up on a couple inside pressures there and really did a great job of standing those linebackers up at the line of scrimmage. He's becoming a complete back, and we're just very fortunate to have him on our team."

**It seems like every week you've had to face athletic tight ends, and now you have Owen Daniels coming up. Do you think the league is evolving to the point where you're going to see one of those guys week-in and week-out? (Matt Vensel)** "Yes. It's such a valuable weapon to have. We talked about the question with our team, and it's something we should have as well going forward the rest of the year. We have the guys to do it. But it seems like everybody has a tight end who can make plays. Those guys are big receiving threats, [and] they can run. It's probably the latest evolution in this league. And there have always been great tight ends, but I don't think everybody had one back then. We've got a pretty great one upstairs [in Ozzie Newsome]. He reminds us of that. Well, he reminds us that he was a great tight end as well as the fact that it's important [to have one]." (laughter)

**As Matt Elam gets acclimated to being a starter and playing full time, what are some of the challenges for a rookie safety? (Aaron Wilson)** "The biggest thing about a safety – one of the biggest things – is you're in the middle of it. You've got to tackle well. If you're not tackling well inside, people are going to run the ball on you. You're the last stop, so you've got to stay on top of different kind of passes, play-action passes and things like that. I think it's a discipline-oriented-type of position, and that's a little tougher for a younger guy who



hasn't seen everything. They'll be going after him with double-moves and play-action passes and things like that. He's going to see a lot of challenging looks."

**Do you see a lot of upside with the way [Matt Elam has] played so far? (Aaron Wilson)** "Oh, yes. We have a three-safety rotation now that we feel very confident in. We've got some flexibility in Michael [Huff], because Michael Huff can play the nickel, and he can play corner as well. And Matt [Elam] can play the nickel. [Secondary coach] Teryl [Austin] has done a great job of moving those guys around and getting them ready in different spots, and we've got to build on that."

**Pernell [McPhee] was somebody that [Terrell] Suggs brought up yesterday during his meeting with the media. I know Pernell has switched positions – he's in a reserve-type role – but what kind of contributions has he made through the first two games? (Matt Zenitz)** "If you noticed, we didn't have to keep our outside linebackers on the field the whole time. We were rotating Terrell [Suggs] in and out of the game. [Elvis] Dumervil rotated with Courtney [Upshaw]. Pernell [McPhee] was in the game for Terrell [and] played a lot on the run downs and did a real good job. The more guys you can play, the better off you're going to be at every position. I think a couple of guys played the whole game, but Daryl Smith was maybe one of the few guys that played every snap."

**If you get to the end of the week and you think you're going to have to rest Ray Rice, are you comfortable using a [Kyle] Juszczyk or Shaun Draughn? Do you change personnel or your approach out of the backfield? (Gerry Sandusky)** "To be determined. We'll see. Thanks for asking, though."

**Is that a good indicator for Arthur [Brown] that he's able to do the walk-through? He wanted to go back in the game yesterday. He must have been feeling decent during the game after suffering the injury? (Aaron Wilson)** "I don't want to draw any conclusion, because I really don't know."

**Arian Foster is a different type of runner than Trent Richardson. Talk about the challenges he presents and what kind of test he'll be for your run defense again. (Clifton Brown)** "This team, we've played them a lot. We got drubbed down there last year. They present so many challenges; they've got so many good players. They do a good job with their schemes – all three phases. They always play hard, they play very physical, [and] they've got a lot of speed. They've got weapons everywhere. It's just going to be a big challenge for us. Whether it's Arian Foster, Matt Schaub, or Andre Johnson ... They've got receivers everywhere. This kid from Clemson – [DeAndre] Hopkins – we loved him coming out [of college]. Their offensive line is always good and very well-coached. Flip it over to defense, it's the same thing. We understand the challenge, we understand who is coming in here, and we'll be ready."

**Is there anything you can take from the Denver Broncos game in Week 1, with all the weapons they had, and extrapolate that to the Texans, the weapons you just spoke about? (Mark Zinno)** "The best teams in this league – the most explosive offensive teams – have that in common. We've played against these kinds of teams, and New England has been like that in the past, too. It'll be very similar in that way."

**Another emotional week coming up, [with] Ray Lewis coming back and being honored in the Ring of Honor. [It's] emotional for the players and for the fans. Can you talk a little bit about that? (Bill West)** "It'll be great to see Ray. I don't know how emotional we'll be about that. We'll be emotional about ... It's always there. We'll be emotional about the game, and we'll feel great about Ray [Lewis] being here for that. It's a great honor. It's something that we'll all take pride in. Maybe Ray will be ready to give us a little fire-up talk? We'll be looking for that as well. You could feel [emotion] at the beginning of the [Cleveland] game. When we came out before the introductions – the coaches sneak up on the sideline [through] that back door – we were out before the players were out. [The Super Bowl video tribute] was just wrapping up – the festivities with the banner and everything. I'll admit, it was a little emotional – it really was. It just kind of grabs you a little bit. You could just feel the energy in the building; it was amazing. It means something, it really does. You can't let it distract you, but at the same time it's a pretty powerful thing."
