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NFL WEEK 4: RAVENS (2-1) AT BILLS (1-2)

SEPT. 29, 2013 • 1 P.M. ET • RALPH WILSON STADIUM (72,498)



JUST THE FACTS

• The Baltimore Ravens will play the first of two-straight road games against AFC East teams when they visit the Buffalo Bills this Sunday. Game time at Ralph Wilson Stadium is 1 p.m. ET. The Ravens, winners of two straight, are 2-1. The Bills, who have played three dramatic games that have been decided late in the fourth quarter, are 1-2.

• Missing three starters and other important contributors, the Ravens rallied from a second-quarter 6-0 deficit vs. the visiting Texans and exploded for 30 points in a 30-9 victory last Sunday. It was the second-straight game Baltimore did not allow a touchdown. The Ravens scored 17 second-quarter points when **ILB Daryl Smith** intercepted a QB Matt Schaub pass and raced 37 yards for a TD; less than two minutes later, **WR/RS Tandon Doss** returned a Houston punt 82 yards for another TD. Led by **QB Joe Flacco** and **WR Torrey Smith**, who caught 2 passes for 72 yards on the series, the Ravens opened the second half with a 9-play, 80-yard TD drive that ended with a **RB Bernard Pierce** TD. **K Justin Tucker** added 3 FGs (28, 45 and 43 yards) for the Ravens.

• The Bills opened the 2013 season with a dramatic 23-21 home loss to the New England Patriots and then won an equally thrilling contest in Buffalo when they beat the visiting Carolina Panthers, 24-23. Last Sunday, Buffalo lost at the Jets, 27-20.

• Baltimore currently is 2-1 and tied for first with Cincinnati in the AFC North, which the Ravens have won the last two seasons. The Ravens are the NFL's only team to go to the playoffs each of the past five seasons, and they have won at least one postseason contest each of those years. All of this has come under the direction of **John Harbaugh**, who has led the team to three AFC Championship games and a victory in Super Bowl XLVII last February.

HARBS SAYS

"The NFL reality is that every team is good and has a lot of really good players. If you believe otherwise, I think you're mistaken. It's not like you have any easy games. Seven Ravens, including starters **RB Ray Rice** (hip), **WR/RS Jacoby Jones** (knee) and **DE Chris Canty** (thigh), missed the Texans game because of injuries. Inactive also were **ILB Arthur Brown** (chest), **C Ryan Jensen** (foot), **WR/RS Deonte Thompson** (foot) and **DT Brandon Williams** (toe). **DT Terrence Cody** (knee) left the Houston contest. **TE Dennis Pitta** (hip), **OLB D.J. Bryant** (knee), **OLB Adrian Hamilton** (wrist) and **WR Aaron Mellette** (knee) are on Injured Reserve. (Pitta is designated for return.) Former starting **ILB Jameel McClain** (spine) is on the Physically Unable to Perform list, and rookie **DE Kapron Lewis-Moore** (knee) is on the Non-Football Injury list.

NOTE OF THE WEEK I

After allowing 7 touchdowns to Denver in Week 1, the Ravens have not permitted a TD in their past two games, holding the Browns to 6 points on 9/15 and the Texans to 9 last Sunday. Dating back to the 2008 season, the Ravens have allowed the NFL's second-fewest TDs and also produced the NFL's second-most games (tied, Pit.) of not allowing a TD to be scored.

NOTE OF THE WEEK II

Dating back to 2008, the Ravens have scored 532 points off turnovers, including last Sunday's INT-TD by **ILB Daryl Smith**. Only New England (584) and Green Bay (560) have scored more points off turnovers than the Ravens since 2008. This season, Baltimore has forced three turnovers, with each resulting in a TD (21 points).

You've done MMA training with your brother, Jon "Bones" Jones. What can be used by a defensive lineman? "Leverage. I was a big wrestler coming out of high school. Wrestling and striking when you're

swinging, it's the same as a club [move], so you're going to use your step – same hand, same foot. [It's the] same with pass rush moves. There is a lot of coordination."

What was it like having your other brother, Chandler, with you at the Super Bowl, considering you had just beaten him and the Patriots the week before in the AFC Championship? "It was awesome. I'm sure he was a little hurt, a little sore, but it's a blessing that he or I was going to play in the Super Bowl. I'm just happy that he came to support me. He enjoyed himself."

Who's the athlete you idolized growing up? "Isaiah Kacyvenski. He was a special teams player – a linebacker – for the Seattle Seahawks from my hometown. He's someone I looked up to, someone that's a mentor to me, someone I still talk to today. He's a great guy. He went back to school at Harvard to become a doctor. He's a few years ahead of me, but we went to the same high school, so he came around to support our teams."

What was your first job? "I had two jobs: working McDonald's, and I was a paper boy in high school. That was my first job. We wanted extra things we couldn't afford as a kid, so we had to get jobs. I remember being in upstate New York on cold mornings, riding my bike and delivering papers. That's something you don't forget."

Did you ever have any issues on that route with people or dogs? "There was a 'Cujo' dog we always looked out for. We would run from it, but we didn't know it had an invisible [protector] fence. It would always run out towards us, and we would take off. We'd just throw the paper anywhere and keep going."

What pops into your mind when hearing the following? **Joe Flacco:** "Captain. General." **Ozzie Newsome:** "Brilliant." **John Harbaugh:** "Winner." **Steve Bisciotti:** "Mastermind." **Matt Elam:** "Hard worker." **Terrell Suggs:** "Explosive."

Ravens **ILB Daryl Smith**, who was signed as a free agent (Jax.) this offseason, has been outstanding in his first three games as a Raven. Smith, who leads the team with 25 tackles, is one of four NFL defenders to post at least 25 tackles, 1 sack and 1 INT entering Week 4. Coincidentally, Bills rookie **LB Kiko Alonso** is one of the other NFL players to accomplish this feat.

“If you’re smart and humble, you realize that you have to work harder than you did the year before. I think it takes a great deal of humility throughout the organization, and that’s why they have a chance. The leadership group in terms of Steve [Bisciotti], Ozzie [Newsome] and John [Harbaugh], they are all strong men with tremendous humility. They don’t think they have it all figured out.”

SportsIllustrated.com’s Don Banks on the Ravens’ 30-9 win over Houston in Week 3:

“We’ve seen this type of defensive-led football in Baltimore plenty of times before. When [Ray] Lewis and [Ed] Reed were in their prime, there were many seasons when the Ravens had to get it done first and foremost on defense and hope for just enough offense to not hurt the cause. That familiar Baltimore blueprint was back in Sunday’s 30-9 thrashing of the Texans, a game that might set the tone for the first Ravens season in history without either Lewis or Reed in the lineup.”

Ravens head coach John Harbaugh on QB Joe Flacco:

“Joe accomplished something that was really almost unmatched in postseason history. So, what he does going forward will be [special, too]. Joe is going to become one of the premier quarterbacks in the history of the National Football League. I’ve said that many, many times. In the end, that statement will prove to be correct, and all the naysayers out there – they will be wrong, as usual.”

CB Lardarius Webb on why he admires John Harbaugh:

“If I ever become a coach, I want to be just like him. I want to coach just like him. Sometimes he can be hard on you, but I want to be just like him. He’s hard on us, but he’s hard on us for good reason. He’s always trying to get the best out of me. I love that guy, I do.”

QB Joe Flacco on WR Torrey Smith taking on the role of being a No. 1 wide receiver and a leader in just his third year:

“Torrey – he’s an awesome guy. He’s a young guy who’s growing and growing each day. It’s different when you’re the leader of a receiving corps at such a young age. But he’s awesome for that kind of role just because of the way he goes about his business every day. He comes in here ready to go, and you wouldn’t really want anybody else doing it.”

Rookie WR Marlon Brown on WR Torrey Smith’s leadership:

“If you’re having a tough day of practice, everyone is hurting and tired, usually I just look over at Torrey, and I just see how he responds. He responds with a good attitude, so I’m going to get out there and respond with a good attitude. If something is going wrong, or if I need help with something, I go to Torrey before I go to anybody. He’s our leader.”

ESPN.com’s Jamison Hensley on the Ravens’ defense:

“Here’s the bottom line: Since that Week 1 embarrassment in Denver, the Ravens haven’t allowed a touchdown and have given up a total of 15 points in two games. It’s too early to say the Ravens’ defense is back. But this defense, which has seven new starters from the Super Bowl-winning unit, is certainly coming together with big plays, a ferocious pass rush and a defiance in the red zone.”

Head Coach John Harbaugh on ILB Daryl Smith:

“Daryl is a pro. I’d say he is a consummate pro in a lot of ways. He doesn’t say a lot, because he’s just about business. I really believe [he’s] one of the most underrated defensive players in football over the last eight, nine years. We feel pretty fortunate that he’s here right now.”

DT Arthur Jones on OLB Pernell McPhee:

“Pernell is a playmaker. He just comes to work and does his job. He made so many great plays last game [against Cleveland]. He’s just a guy that’s always there and is a hard worker. He doesn’t complain. He doesn’t cry that he switched positions. He just works, and you appreciate guys like that.”

Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on S James Ihedigbo and LB Josh Bynes, both new starters in the Ravens’ defense:

“[They’re] doing really well. Josh – the guy is an overachiever. I think he’s done very, very well. The thing is that Josh is very smart, [and it’s] the same thing with [James] Ihedigbo. I think both of them are the same kind of guy, but in different positions. They just play hard, study hard, and I love guys like that. It’s fun to coach guys like that. I don’t know if they’re the most gifted, but it doesn’t really matter. Those are the fun guys to coach, because you trust them. When you put them out on the field, there’s a big trust factor as a coach, and those two guys I trust totally.”

Senior Bowl exec. director and former Ravens personnel executive Phil Savage on Baltimore’s success with undrafted free agents:

“The reason they’ve been successful is they work at it, and they have a history and a tradition. Really from the moment we got to Baltimore, we put a lot of emphasis on college free agents. I think the Ravens have always approached it like it’s the eighth round of the draft, and their scouts take great pride in unearthing a player or two. If you can get one of those players on your team, the impact of it on the salary cap is really significant.”

LAST WEEK VS. HOUSTON

Baltimore Ravens 30, Houston Texans 9

M&T Bank Stadium • Baltimore, MD

Week 3: Sept. 22

Playing without starters **RB Ray Rice**, **WR/RS Jacoby Jones** and **DE Chris Canty**, the Ravens overwhelmed previously-unbeaten Houston, 30-9, at M&T Bank Stadium last Sunday. Holding the ball 13 of the first 16 minutes of the game, the Texans took a 6-0 early second-quarter lead on 2 K Randy Bullock field goals (27 and 29 yards). **K Justin Tucker's** 28-yard FG made the score 6-3 with 4:11 remaining in the first half. Baltimore **ILB Daryl Smith** then stole a QB Matt Schaub pass and raced 37 yards to the end zone to give the Ravens a 10-6 advantage. Less than two minutes later, **WR/RS Tandon Doss** returned a Texans' punt 82 yards for a TD, making the score 17-6. Another Bullock FG (29 yards) produced a 17-9 halftime score. Baltimore increased its advantage on the opening drive of the third quarter, producing a 9-play, 80-yard drive that finished with **RB Bernard Pierce's** 1-yard TD dash. **WR Torrey Smith** produced 2 of the first downs on that series with catches of 48 and 24 yards. Tucker added 2 fourth-quarter FGs (45 and 43 yards) to make the final margin. This marked the second-consecutive game that the Ravens' defense did not allow a TD. Houston produced just 264 yards behind Schaub, who was sacked 3 times, completing 25 of 35 passes for 194 yards (72.8 rating). Rookie WR DeAndre Hopkins caught 6 of those for 60 yards. Meanwhile, **QB Joe Flacco** threw 24 times with 16 completions for 171 yards (87.3 rating), with Smith catching 5 for 92 yards. **TE Dallas Clark** added 4 receptions for 46 more, and Pierce rushed 24 times for 65 yards.

LAST GAME VS. BUFFALO: RAVENS 37, BILLS 34 (OT)

S Ed Reed played his first game of the 2010 season, intercepting 2 passes and helping the Ravens to a come-from-behind 37-34 overtime victory over the Bills at M&T Bank Stadium. K Billy Cundiff's 38-yard field goal, which was set up by a LB Ray Lewis forced fumble and recovery at the Bills' 45-yard line, gave Baltimore the hard-fought win. The Ravens trailed 17-3 and 24-10 in the first half before exploding for 17 points in 64 seconds to take a 27-24 early third-quarter lead. TE Todd Heap caught 2 first-half touchdowns from **QB Joe Flacco**, who completed 16 of 31 passes for 250 yards. Flacco also threw a 34-yard TD to WR Anquan Boldin after handing the ball to RB Willis McGahee, who flipped it back to the quarterback. The Ravens' defense, which entered the game ranked third in the NFL, allowed 514 yards, the most by an opponent since 2000. QB Ryan Fitzpatrick completed 29 of 43 passes for 382 yards, including 3 TD passes to WR Lee Evans. **WR Stevie Johnson**, who also caught a TD toss from Fitzpatrick, had 8 receptions for 158 yards. **RB Ray Rice** (72) and McGahee (64) combined for 136 rushing yards for the Ravens. In the victory, two Ravens eclipsed the 8,000-yard mark for a career: Flacco for passing yards and Boldin for receiving yards. The Ravens improved to 9-0 whenever Reed snags 2 INTs in a game.

BILLS SNAPSHOT

Overview: Buffalo dropped a tight contest last Sunday at the NY Jets, 27-20, falling to 1-2 and fourth place in the AFC East. Through the season's first three weeks, each of the Bills' contests has been decided by seven points or less. Now under first-year head coach **Doug Marrone** and led by 2013 first-round draft pick **QB EJ Manuel**, Buffalo hopes to earn its first trip to the playoffs since 1999.

Doug Marrone: Marrone is in his first season at the helm in Buffalo and his eighth year in the NFL coaching ranks. Prior to joining the Bills, he spent the last four seasons (2009-12) as the head football coach at his alma mater, Syracuse University, where he helped the Orange offense set several program records in 2012. A prolific offensive mind, Marrone served as offensive coordinator of the New Orleans Saints (2006-08), helping guide the unit that finished first in total offense and passing yards in both 2006 and 2008. He also spent four seasons as the Jets' offensive line coach (2002-05).

Offense: Buffalo ranks 14th in total offense (350.0 ypg) and owns the fifth-ranked rushing attack (135.0 ypg). Behind a two-headed assault, the Bills are one of two teams (Houston) that features a running back duo with over 150 rushing yards apiece (**RB Fred Jackson** - 169 and **RB C.J. Spiller** - 153). Spiller left last week's contest with a leg injury and did not return. Manuel has been sturdy in his first campaign, completing 64 of 108 passes for 689 yards, 4 TDs and 1 INT. **WR Stevie Johnson**, who has recorded three-straight 1,000-yard seasons, has paced the offense with 17 receptions for 236 yards and 2 TDs.

Defense: Buffalo ranks 28th in overall defense (417.3 ypg) and has allowed the league's second-most rushing yards (155.0 ypg). A 2013 second-round pick, rookie **LB Kiko Alonso** has been stellar, leading the unit with 27 tackles (17 solo), adding a team-high 2 INTs, 1 sack and 1 FF. Buffalo has recorded 9 sacks, led by Pro Bowl **DL Mario Williams**, who is tied for second in the NFL with 4.5 QB takedowns.

SPECIAL FORCES



Assistant head coach/special teams coordinator **Jerry Rosburg**, a 35-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. In 2012, the Ravens' special teams units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones**, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD in Super Bowl XLVII.

Rosburg's kickers were special in 2012, too: **P Sam Koch** set Ravens single-season punting records with a 47.1 gross average and a 40.8 net average, shattering career bests. **K Justin Tucker** made 30 of 33 FGAs (90.9%), producing the second-best success rate in Ravens single-season history and also the second-best mark by a rookie kicker in NFL history.

Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume both with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

SPECIAL TEAMS STANDOUTS

In 2012, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 2 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that's based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. The Vikings finished first in Gosselin's special teams rankings, followed by the Ravens and the Bengals.

A STRONG RETURN

Dating back to the 2008 season when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore has produced the NFL's second-best kickoff return average (24.8).

COORDINATORS NOTES

CALDWELL'S ATTACK



Jim Caldwell, a 36-year coaching veteran, joined the Ravens as the team's QBs coach in February 2012 and was elevated to offensive coordinator on Dec. 10, replacing Cam Cameron. Caldwell arrived in Baltimore after coaching 10 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, including the three (2009-11) as head coach. In his first year at the helm, he led the Colts to the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLIV. Caldwell, who earned a Super Bowl ring (2006) with Indy, spent six seasons tutoring one of the NFL's all-time greats in QB Peyton Manning. During the course of Caldwell's time in Indianapolis, the Colts achieved much success, tying an NFL record with nine-straight playoff appearances and winning six AFC South division titles.

CALDWELL FIRES UP "O"

Under **Jim Caldwell**, who was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to the Ravens' Dec. 16, 2012 game vs. Denver, Baltimore averaged 400.6 yards of offense per contest (146.4 rushing & 254.1 passing) and 27.3 points per game to close out the season.

PEES LEADS THE "D"



Dean Pees, a 10-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2012, after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, leads a Baltimore unit that finished as the NFL's third-best scoring defense four-consecutive years (2008-11) and tied (NYG) for 12th in 2012, allowing 21.5 points per game.

Ozzie Newsome's legacy is unlike any the game has seen. Known throughout all of sports as a premier leader, Newsome is a Hall of Fame player, the architect of Baltimore's 2000 and 2012 Super Bowl championship teams and an elite personnel evaluator who became the NFL's first African American GM.

"Ozzie's credibility is what stands out the most," head coach John Harbaugh states. "And it's not just about what he has accomplished. To me, it's his commitment and focus while striving to do more."

IMPRESSIVE STREAKS FROM '12

• In 2012's Week 13 division battle against the Steelers, Baltimore's home winning streak was snapped. The Ravens entered the game having won 15-consecutive games at M&T Bank Stadium (16 including playoffs), the NFL's longest active home streak at the time.

• The defeat marked the Ravens' first loss at home since 12/5/10, which also came against the Steelers (13-10).

• Pittsburgh's win in Week 13 (2012) snapped another streak: The Ravens had won 12-straight AFC North games, tying Indianapolis for the longest division winning streak since 2002 division realignment.

• With 2012's Week 15 loss to Denver, the Ravens dropped back-to-back home games for the first time under **John Harbaugh**. The last time Baltimore lost consecutive home games was in 2007 (12/3 and 12/9), a stretch that spanned 39 home games leading into Week 15's defeat.

Super Bowl XLVII MVP QB **Joe Flacco** was masterful during the Ravens' 2012 playoff run, completing 73 of 126 passes for 1,140 yards, 11 TDs and 0 INTs to produce a 117.2 passer rating. Flacco joined Hall of Fame QB Joe Montana (1989) as the only players to produce 11 TDs and 0 INTs during an NFL postseason.

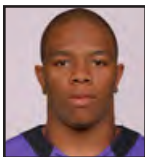

TORREY'S COURAGEOUS NIGHT

WR Torrey Smith played in the 2012 Week 3 Sunday night victory over New England after his brother, 19-year-old Tevin Jones, passed away in a motorcycle accident that morning. Smith posted 6 catches for 127 yards and 2 TDs in the come-from-behind win, producing the third 100-yard game of his young career. Additionally, he eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving milestone for his career.

SMITH BIG IN '12 PLAYOFFS

In the 2012 thrilling, double-overtime Divisional Playoff win at Denver (38-35 on 1/12/13), **WR Torrey Smith** caught 59-yard and 32-yard TD passes, helping mark the first game in NFL playoff history that a QB (**Joe Flacco**) threw 2 TDs of 59-plus yards (the other being to **WR Jacoby Jones** on a 70-yarder). In the 2012 postseason, Smith recorded a 21.2 yards-per-catch average, reeling in 11 passes for 233 yards.

2011 ROOKIE SENSATION

In 2011's Week 11 game vs. Cincinnati, **WR Torrey Smith** set a Ravens' single-season and single-game record for receiving yards by a rookie, totaling a career-high 165 yards on 6 catches (27.5 avg.). In 2011, he had 50 catches for 841 yards and a Ravens' rookie-record 7 TDs. Impressively, the 2011 second-round pick owns two of the Top 5 receiving days in team history.

Smith Quick Hits:

- During the '11 campaign, Smith ranked 13th in the NFL with a stout 16.8 yards-per-catch avg.
- Smith's 26-yard TD catch with 8 seconds remaining in Week 9 at Pit. capped a 92-yard drive and sealed the Ravens' 23-20 win.
- Impressively, 5 of his 7 TD receptions in 2011 covered at least 25 yards (74, 41, 38, 36, 26, 18 and 8 yards), and he averaged a sensational 34.4 yards-per-TD catch.
- Never before has a Ravens' wideout registered dual 150-yard receiving games in a season (165 vs. Cin. and 152 at STL). Smith also posted the Top 2 receiving yards outputs by a rookie in the NFL in 2011.
- In 2011's Week 11, Smith joined Ken Burrow (2 in 1971) and Randy Moss (3 in 1998) as the only rookies in NFL history to have multiple games with at least 150 receiving yards and a TD catch.

WR Torrey Smith ranks first in Ravens franchise history in yards-per-catch average, posting a 17.1 mark over the three seasons in which he's caught 115 passes for 1,965 yards and 15 TDs. In 2012, Smith tallied a 17.4 yards-per-catch mark, which ranks fourth best in franchise single-season annals.

SACKS OF "DOOM"



This past spring, the Ravens signed free agent **OLB Elvis Dumervil**, who spent his first seven seasons with Denver. Though he missed the entire 2010 campaign with a pectoral injury, Dumervil has totaled 272 tackles (196 solo), 65.5 sacks, 17 FFs, 9 FRs, 1 INT and 12 passes defended during his career. Last season, he recorded 54 tackles (32 solo), 11 sacks, 6 forced fumbles and 1 pass defended, earning his third Pro Bowl honor.

Since entering the NFL as a fourth-round draft choice out of Louisville in 2006, Dumervil's 65.5 sacks rank eighth most among active players. His 17 quarterback drops during the 2009 campaign ranked first in the NFL that season.

CB Corey Graham, who signed with the Ravens as a free agent in 2012, was a standout for Baltimore during its Super Bowl XLVII journey. Starting eight games in the regular season after **CB Lardarius Webb's** knee injury and every playoff contest, Graham finished the year with 54 tackles, 2 INTs and 8 PD. HEAD COACH JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE

Opening statement: "Injury-wise, we got through the game pretty well. Terrence Cody has a sprained knee. It would be a stretch to expect him back this week. We're going to try, but more likely it will be after this week coming up. We have a chance to get Chris [Canty] back. We have a chance to get Ray [Rice] back. We'll see as the week goes on how that goes. Anything else from yesterday? Maybe you will have a question on something, but I can't really think of anything else that was of any significance."

Isn't it ironic that today is your 51st birthday and yesterday Daryl Smith, who wears No. 51, had a great game? On a team that is trying to get younger on defense, Daryl Smith has meant a lot to you, hasn't he? (Joe Platania) "Daryl Smith has meant a lot to us, you're right. Daryl has just done a great job, and for him to come up [with big plays], it's not just the interception. He's played really well consistently from the beginning. He had [10] tackles, he had a few assists, a broken up pass, might have had a sack; he got a quarterback hit in there. He just played exceptionally well – and had a baby. His wife had a baby. I don't know if you guys are aware of that or not. He had a little girl this morning, about two o'clock in the morning. That tells you about Daryl. Probably nobody knew about that; that's how quiet he is. And, she does share a birthday with yours truly. *(laughter)* So, we were really excited about that. At least I was really excited about that. I don't know if Daryl or his wife [cared]. I don't think they probably cared, but I was pretty fired up about it. *(laughter)* It was a glorious day for the Smith family."

Have you heard about the incident with Jacoby Jones last evening? Is he injured or is he any worse? Reports were that he got hit in the head? (Mark Zinno) "Regarding Jacoby, we got reports of that, middle of the morning, this morning some time, I heard about that. As far as him, he's fine. He went through everything today that he was supposed to go through. He didn't miss anything. [I'm] not very impressed, personally, with the report. It's not something we want to be known for. I'd like to think it's not something those guys would want to be known for. It's nothing to be proud of. So, I'm disappointed in that sense."

Without going into detail with us, have you followed up with the players involved individually? (Jerry Coleman) "You're right, any conversations with those guys [are private]. Of course we're going to have conversations, and we've had conversations about that and other things. We'll probably keep that between us, address it with the team. What do you want to be known for? Do you want to be known as a football player or do you want to be known for that? I don't think that's anything to be proud of."

Do you know if there will be anything legal that will happen after the fact? (Mark Zinno) "No, I don't know anything like that."

Is it fair to assume you will not be celebrating your birthday on a party bus in D.C.? (Gerry Sandusky) *(laughter)* "Well, I'm going to pretend that question never happened." *(laughter)*

You've heard the only saying that nothing good ever happens after midnight. Would you consider a curfew for the team? (Aaron Wilson) "Well, my dad, Jack Harbaugh is here, and that was definitely a motto that was enforced in our household: 'Nothing good happens after midnight,' and I did reiterate that with the guys today."

With Ray Rice, we saw him on the sidelines dancing around a little bit. Has he made a lot of progress, and do you feel like he has a good chance to play this week? (Aaron Wilson) "I don't know about good, or great or whatever, but he was close this week, to a degree. So was Chris [Canty]. With those muscle things, you never know for sure, but they were in the ballpark this week, and we think that will put them really in the ballpark coming up."

Have you seen the improvements from Week 1 to Week 3 in accordance to what you think would be on schedule? And do you see it getting even better as you go along? (David Ginsburg) "One of the things about this team, I've told them, that we've been really happy with the fact that ... We've really made as much progress as we could make. In every area that we've really put an emphasis on, we feel like we've made great progress there. [It's] not 100 percent across the board, [but] there's a process to everything that you do. It's hard to put a finishing product out there before you're finished, but we're on our way. And I really love two things that have gotten us to make the kind of improvement you're talking about: Our attitude is as good as I've ever been around as a football team – and even individually, across the board – and our work ethic is as good as any that I've been around. So, I'm just proud of these guys [for] the way they work and the way they approach their job, and you would like to think that that shows up in how they improve."

John, were you encouraged by the chemistry that was on display between Joe Flacco and Dallas Clark? (Clifton Brown) "There was some good stuff out there, you're right. In terms of some of the timing and some of the tight throws that were made, big third-down conversions, types of stuff where they're working on one defender and breaking away at the right time and Joe putting it away from the defender ... That's the kind of stuff that we have been working really hard to get to, not just with Dallas, but with all the guys. But you're right, it showed up a little bit on Sunday."



James Ihedigbo seemed like he had a good game yesterday. What have you seen from him through the first three games of the season? (Matt Zenitz) “He had a great game. James had a great game. He made some big tackles for us. Coming down and supporting out of the secondary, a couple times, Arian [Foster] or Ben Tate got out there loose a little bit and looked like they had a chance to make some yards, and James cut them down. I thought he played really well. He was in good position in pass coverage all day. This is a ‘shot’ team, too – this is a play-action pass, throw-the-ball-downfield outfit, where they made a bunch of big plays in the pass. And we felt like holding them to minimal or no big plays was going to be really important for us [and] was going to be a tough job for our secondary. And our secondary played with tremendous discipline – great eyes, great spacing and leverage in the back end. And [the Texans] had no big plays downfield in the passing game. So, that was really important.”

Ihedigbo is one of the new starters at safety this season, and Matt Elam obviously has recently kind of stepped into that role as well. How happy have you been with what you’ve seen from James through the first few games? (Matt Zenitz) “We’ve been really pleased with James, and Matt, too. You talk about both safeties – both of those guys have played really well. And I’d throw Mike [Huff] in the same category. Michael came out and played well yesterday. He played quite a few snaps on defense and had a tackle on the kickoff team. But James, to your question, has been kind of the glue back there. He’s been the guy that’s made all the calls for us. He’s the guy that gets us into the right coverage and that unwinds the formation for us. So, he’s done a great job of that.”

The 2.6-yards-per-carry average is 31st in the league right now. Are you content with that and the run game, or is that more of a by-product of the last two weeks, [where] you’ve committed to the run more, as far as the number of attempts you’re getting per game? (Mark Zinno) “The average? Well, no that’s not going to be OK. That number is not going to be that number, for one thing. That’s going to come up dramatically before the season is over and sooner. We’ve played some very good fronts; I don’t want to minimize the fact that we’ve had to block some good people. A lot of times when you watch the tape, there is really good blocking going on out there. Sometimes, against a really good front where they’ve got seven guys that can make plays ... One guy here, one miss there, one bad target in another place, each time that’s what holds you back. Their safeties do a great job of tackling, so they limit you from the big runs. Our run game is not where it needs to be. We’re going to go to work on that – we have been working on it. We’ll continue to do so, and we need to make that important. One thing we’ve seen that, philosophically, we’re going to stick with it. It’s something that we think is important. We’re going to be able to run the ball here; it is a part of our DNA, and it is part of who we are as a football team. It’s going to be important, and we have the people to do it. We’ve got some big, strong, tough offensive lineman, and we have really good backs. Our fullback [Vonta Leach] is the best blocking fullback in the league. The run game is something that has to happen for us.”

With Ray Rice and Shaun Draughn getting banged up yesterday, do you see a need to add another running back, or [will you] wait and see as the week goes on? (Luke Jones) “We’ll see. Right now we’re in a wait-and-see mode. [There is] no imminent move as far as running back goes, because we feel those guys’ injuries are something we can deal with. We’re always looking for a good player or two, though.”

Talk a little bit about Tandon Doss. He was let go, then brought back when Jacoby [Jones] goes down, and then getting the big run in yesterday. (Bill West) “That’s real rewarding isn’t it? To see the kind of day Tandon [Doss] had ... Personally, I really have always been a believer in Tandon. I’ve always felt like he had what it takes. I was really interested by his comments yesterday. That was really honest what he described, which is pretty neat for a guy to do that publicly the way he did. To see it pay off for him is a nice lesson for everybody. He’s always had talent; he’s worked extremely hard. He really had a good week of practice the last week of preseason, and then he played well in the last preseason game, too. So, this is not just happening now. It’s good to see.”

Getting back to the run game, this is essentially, with the offensive line and Vonta [Leach], the same group you were able to run the ball with in the playoffs. Can you put your finger on what the difference is in these first three weeks as opposed to the playoffs? (Jamison Hensley) “We can, I believe we have. I think we understand it. [I] don’t really feel an urgency to share it, exactly. We do feel like we understand it and we’re working on it. There’s no doubt in my mind that it can be corrected. We’re not getting the production from the run game that we should, but we also feel like we’re on our way to getting that done. We just have to do it; you just have to go out there and get it done.”

Are the struggles with the running game more of an offensive line issue, running back issue or collective? (Matt Zenitz) “It’s collective. It’s always collective; it’s never one thing. Of course, you could put the tight ends in there, you could put the quarterback in there with the checks or whatever, [and] you could put the receivers in there as far as the downfield blocking. All of our guys take – if you’re looking to point a finger – all of our guys are going to point the finger right back at themselves. That’s the kind of guys we have. I would characterize it more of being in sync, more in terms of working together more efficiently – combination blocks going to the right guy with the right technique at the right time. Those things – it’s not just a matter of just one-on-one knocking somebody off the ball. That’s not the way it works. It’s way more complicated than that up front. And like the passing game, when we talked precision, there’s a precision to the run game, too. It’s something that we don’t quite have ironed out yet against good fronts, and we’ve got to get there. That’s what we’re working on.”



In terms of numbers, is it usually seven or eight, or do you see a lot of crowded boxes? (Aaron Wilson) “We’ve had quite a bit of safeties being involved, there’s no doubt. Yesterday, it was more [that] their really good players made some plays on us. You saw J.J. [Watt] made a couple of plays where he beat some cut-off blocks. There were times where we feel like we had numbers to a side, went to a light side, and a guy would make somebody miss and make a great play. Their linebackers really came downhill really well and did a good job of stuffing the hole. There just wasn’t a whole lot of movement there, but there were also other times where we didn’t work the right angle to the right guy as far as the way we blocked it. They were giving us some challenging fronts, too, so all of that goes together. It’s just a matter of improvement across the board, and it’s an emphasis for us.”

How do you evaluate how the offensive line has been in terms of pass blocking? (Ryan Mink) “I would say the offensive line has been excellent with the pass blocking. That’s a good point, because you chase everything all the time. But when you’ve got a young center in there and you’ve got really a young left guard in there, and you’re working those guys in, you want to make sure you can protect your quarterback. And I would give them a lot of credit for what they’ve done as far as protecting Joe [Flacco]. We haven’t had a lot of hits on the quarterback. It’s gotten better week after week. We’ve gone against some really good pass-rush fronts, and I think Joe [Flacco] feels like he’s had some pretty good opportunities to look downfield and go through his progression. And we’ve gotten a lot of pressure. It wasn’t very often where Houston didn’t bring at least five [defenders] – run and pass – but especially pass. We were really good with assignments in pass protection, [and] we were really good with technique yesterday.”

Every team deals with injuries, but you’ve dealt with some significant ones, like Ray Rice and Chris Canty. How impressed are you with the fact that you’ve been able to overcome those? (Garrett Downing) “We had no healthy scratches yesterday. All seven of the guys that sat were all injured guys. I don’t know if I can remember the last time that’s happened. For those other seven guys to step up and for us to play the way we did and to win a game like that says a lot about our coaches [and] a lot about our players and the ‘Next Man Up’ philosophy. It was important, and those guys really came through.”

The improvement of the secondary – how much do you trace it back to them working more together and getting a chance to eliminate some of the communication issues? You made a lineup change there, too. How much do you attribute it to those factors? (Jeff Zrebiec) “They’re probably all attributable to the fact that those guys – just what you’re saying – those guys have really worked hard back there. It’s not simple. Football – it’s a simple game, philosophically, at the root and the fundamentals and what’s important. Those things are simple, but there’s a complexity to the X’s and O’s. People challenge you with a whole lot of formations and shifts and personnel matchups and route combinations and things like that in the back end. It takes a lot of brain power to figure that stuff out. And not just that, but being on the same page and communicating under fire with crowd noise and all those things, and we’ve gotten better each week with that. I just think those guys in the back end have worked so hard. That was a big concern. That was a point of emphasis in this game – something that we talked to the guys about on Saturday – was being rock-solid back there in terms of how we played together and how we played technique. They did a great job of that. I’m really proud of the way the secondary played in this game.”

There’s not a lot of tape on EJ Manuel at the NFL. Does that mean you will be going back to look at his college film? (Aaron Wilson) “I think our scouts ... We have reports on those guys in college. We’re not going to spend any time this week watching his college tape. He’s got plenty of ... He’s played every game, so there are plenty of reps for us to watch where he’s at right now as a pro quarterback, and it looks like he’s doing a great job.”

Joe Flacco has been sacked [eight] times in three games, but he’s seemed pretty composed in the pocket. Last year at this time, he might not have had this composure. Are you seeing progress in that, or has he been the same way in that for you? (Mark Zinno) “The word is ‘confidence.’ He’s got confidence in the pass protection right now. He feels very much protected back there. So, some of the sacks have been sacks where he’s taken the ball and held it right through the read progression as much as he can, and then just decided to hold on to the ball and maybe take the sack. When you’re getting sacks like that, where you feel – and I’m not talking about all of them, I’m just talking about maybe a few of them ... I don’t have the numbers right now, but my feeling is that Joe [Flacco] has comfort back there to go through his read progression, which has helped him, because he’s run through the read progression plenty of times and found a crossing route. I think it was a Torrey [Smith] crossing route for the big third down on the touchdown drive after half, where he went through his whole progression and found Torrey on the crosser for a big conversion and got us down inside the 10- [yard line]. That’s attributable to pass protection – him having the time to do that, and not just the time to do that, but the room in the pocket to do it, where he feels like he’s got room to see over those guys, and he’s got room to follow through on his throws. It’s been really good for us, you’re right.”
