NFL WEEK 6: PACKERS (2-2) VS. RAVENS (3-2)



SUNDAY, OCT. 13, 2013 • 1 P.M. ET • M&T BANK STADIUM (71,008)

JUST THE FACTS

• Making their only home appearance in a five-game stretch, the Ravens will host the Green Bay Packers this Sunday, Oct. 13, at M&T Bank Stadium. Kickoff is at 1 p.m. Baltimore, tied for first in the AFC North, is 3-2, while the Packers are 2-2.

• **K Justin Tucker** kicked a game-winning 44-yard field goal with 1:42 left in the contest in a 26-23 victory at Miami last Sunday. It was Tucker's fourth FG (42, 50 and 25 yards) of the game. The Dolphins took a 13-6 halftime lead, but the Ravens dominated the third quarter, holding the ball for over 11 minutes and jumping back ahead for a 16-13 edge. Baltimore produced three-consecutive scoring drives in the second half to take a 23-13 lead. Miami bounced right back, scoring 10 points in a minute and 45 seconds to tie the game at 23 with eight minutes left in the game. **OLB Terrell Suggs** was a hero in the fourth quarter with 3 sacks, while **RB Ray Rice**, who rushed for 74 yards and added 28 more with 6 catches, scored 2 touchdowns.

• The Packers beat the visiting Lions, 22-9, last Sunday at Lambeau Field. Green Bay, which had its bye weekend prior to this victory, opened the season with a 34-28 loss at San Francisco, beat the Redskins (38-20) in Week 2 and then lost at Cincinnati, 34-30. This will be the first of four games against the NFC North for the Ravens this season. Baltimore will also play at Chicago (Nov. 17) and Detroit (Dec. 16) and host the Vikings on Dec. 8.

• Following the game against the Packers, the Ravens will make their annual trek to Pittsburgh, where they will play the Steelers on Oct. 20. Baltimore's bye is the following weekend (Oct. 27).

HARBS SAYS

"Our team is always evolving with the same objective: We want to be the best we can be at that time. Five Ravens, including Pro Bowl **WR/RS Jacoby Jones** (knee), did not play in Miami. Also missing were: **WR Marlon Brown** (thigh), **DT Terrence Cody** (knee), **C Ryan Jensen** (foot) and **DE Marcus Spears** (knee). **TE Dennis Pitta** (hip), **OLB D.J. Bryant** (knee), **OLB Adrian Hamilton** (wrist) and **WR Aaron Mellette** (knee) are on Injured Reserve. (Pitta is designated for return.) Former starting **ILB Jameel McClain** (spine) is on the Physically Unable to Perform list, and rookie **DE Kapron Lewis-Moore** (knee) is on the Non-Football Injury list.

WHAT'S GOING ON?



Entering Week 6, the Ravens have produced the NFL's second-most sacks (19), with **OLB Terrell Suggs** totaling 7 of Baltimore's QB drops. Suggs, who has at least 1 sack in each game this season, can set a Ravens' franchise record this Sunday if he notches a sack in his sixth-consecutive game. (Paul Kruger - 2012 & Adalius Thomas - 2005 & 2006 also each had five-game-sack stretches.)

JOE FLACCO ON BEING TOUGH AND CONFIDENT

"I think being mentally tough is everything, even for all the other positions, but especially at quarterback. You have to deal with a little bit more at quarterback. There are plenty of guys who have talent, but if you're not mentally tough enough to deal with things, then you'll never get to show that. In the end, that's the top thing. If you have the confidence to go with the talent, that's what's going to propel you to the next level. That's what's going to make teammates and coaches believe in you and make you have a good team."

SPOTLIGHT: TORREY SMITH

Who was your favorite athlete growing up? "Mike Vick. I always played quarterback before college. He went to Virginia Tech, and I'm from Virginia, so I was a fan. I just liked watching him, as well as Allen Iverson."

What was your "Welcome to the NFL" moment? "Just watching the atmosphere of the first game of my first year (2011) – Steelers versus Ravens – to open up the season. There's nothing better. It was crazy, the atmosphere and to see how the rivalry works."

What's your favorite play from your career so far? "My favorite play – I was watching it – was when [Josh] Byner tackled [Ted Ginn Jr.] at the end of the Super Bowl. That's my favorite play."

What was your first job? "My first real job was at Walmart. I was a cashier, and everybody would come in my line. I used to hate it."

What's your favorite Olympic sport? "Track and field. It's fun to watch. The swimming races are pretty cool, too. Anytime there is man versus man, and you are watching them go at it, it's pretty cool."

You were a standout high school basketball player. Did you play pickup games in college with the Maryland basketball players? "We played in the intramural league; we won the championship twice. We won it my freshman year and my sophomore year, and then I stopped playing. They have open gyms [in the Comcast Center] as well. We'd go by there and play during the offseason. All kinds of guys from the [NBA] would come over and play in Comcast. Last time I was down there, John Wall, Michael Beasley, DeMarcus Cousins, Scottie Reynolds and Kevin Durant played. There are so many people from Washington, D.C., [that are NBA players]."

Most of your high school highlights were two-handed dunks. Did you not like to do any one-handed throw downs? "I've dunked on so many people one-handed. I broke my leg dunking. If I have control, I'm dunking with two hands. It's easier to come down."

What's the first word that comes to mind when you hear the following names? John Harbaugh: "Leader." Joe Flacco: "Winner." Steve Bisciotti: "The Man." Ozzie Newsome: "Genius." Jacoby Jones: "Team clown." Marlon Brown: "Beast."

NOTE OF THE WEEK II

In each of the past four full seasons (2009-12), Ravens **QB Joe Flacco** and Packers **QB Aaron Rodgers** are the only NFL quarterbacks to throw for at least 3,600 yards and 20 TDs, while posting 12 INTs or less. Each player has also led his team to a World Championship and been named Super Bowl MVP (Flacco, SB XLVII in 2012, and Rodgers, SB XLV in 2010.)

NOTE OF THE WEEK III

WR Torrey Smith has excelled this season, producing 556 receiving yards (third most in the NFL) on 27 catches. With 6 receptions for 121 yards last week at Miami, Smith became the first Raven since Qadry Ismail in 1999 to post back-to-back 100-yard receiving games. (Ismail had three straight that year.)

“I think it’s one of those things again [where] he surrounds himself with good coaches, which is a big part of the success of any organization. He’s a good manager of people. He understands the game, and he respects the game. He’s a leader. I think he obviously inspires people around him.”

– CBS-TV analyst Bill Cowher on Ravens head coach John Harbaugh

Head Coach John Harbaugh on OLB Terrell Suggs:

“He is playing as well as he’s played, ever. He’s playing at, obviously, a Pro Bowl-type level. But he can even play better. That’s the thing. He’s so determined right now. I see him walking around here – he’s just got a look on his face, a single-minded purpose-type look on his face. So, that’s the way he’s playing.”

DE Chris Canty on OLB Terrell Suggs’ performance in 2013:

“This is the best I’ve ever seen him. He’s everywhere making plays. When you turn on the tape, his effort just jumps out on film. He came into training camp in tremendous shape with a tremendous attitude. It’s no surprise that he’s playing at a high level. It’s no surprise. He’s flying around the football. His commitment and dedication to the guys in this locker room is unquestioned.”

MMQB’s Peter King, naming K Justin Tucker his Special Teams Player of the Week following the Ravens’ win at Miami:

“Can’t get much better than this guy. Tucker kicked field goals of 42, 50, 25 and 44 Sunday in Miami, and the last one won the game with 1:42 to play. In his 13-month career with Baltimore, Tucker is 45 of 50 on field goals, making all 25 attempts from inside 40.”

John Harbaugh on QB Joe Flacco’s toughness and mettle and the Ravens’ pass protection:

“Joe doesn’t ever get fazed. Joe, it seems, never gets shaken. Joe is not the kind of guy that’s going to get rattled. That’s just who he is. That’s part of his greatness. And that’s why he is who he is as a player. He’s not going to get fazed by any of that stuff. So we know we have to work on some things protection-wise. And we’ll continue to do that. We’re going to be a good pass protection team. I guarantee you that. And Joe understands that. And that’s just the way he plays.”

Owner Steve Bisciotti on the Ravens’ veteran leaders after the departure of LB Ray Lewis and S Ed Reed:

“We’re not going to miss a beat from a leadership standpoint. Direction, these guys are going to know what direction to go in. I think this is a great opportunity for guys like [Terrell] Suggs to step up and Joe [Flacco] to step up. It’s coming along exactly the way I figured. Ray Lewis is a once-in-a-generation guy. And you saw guys like Terrell Suggs – who was a Defensive Player of the Year [in 2011] – in the offseason, and as the season started last year, he was still deferring to Ray Lewis. And it’s just interesting. When you have someone of that iconic level, it was hard to step out of his shadow, and they really didn’t try to. They knew that they were seeing something special, and that they were fortunate to be a part of it.”

CBSSports.com’s Jason LaCanfora on the Ravens’ reputation:

“They are first-class from the owner on down. People want to work for them, and players want to play for them. They are an elite franchise in every sense of the word in any way you want to evaluate it.”

NFL.com’s Gregg Rosenthal on the Ravens’ trade for LT Eugene Monroe, engineered by general manager Ozzie Newsome:

“Newsome has a knack for finding useful veterans at the last minute. McKinnie was an example last year. Linebacker Daryl Smith, not picked up till June, has turned into a monster signing for the defense this season. Monroe is a much bigger move because he should be with the team for a long time. The Wizard of Oz strikes again.”

Fox Sports analyst Brian Billick on his respect for Ravens general manager Ozzie Newsome:

“When you can look to a leader who’s in the Hall of Fame and has two rings that he won with two different coaches and two different quarterbacks, whatever he thinks it takes, you can’t question.”

Ravens OLB Terrell Suggs on the acquisition of OLB Elvis Dumervil:

“Everybody was kind of hitting the panic button on us in the spring because of the guys we lost. In Ozzie [Newsome] we trust. He did a great job of reloading the gun. Once Elvis signed, he fit right in – a guy that belongs here. He has the mentality we have here. He’s not afraid to work hard and get better every day here.”

Ravens RB Ray Rice on the Ravens’ mentality:

“We’ve always been underdogs. There’s something about the Ravens, something about us [that] we’ve always been underdogs. I don’t think it’s something that our guys read into. I think we’ve embraced being the villain at times. We don’t mind going into the game saying that we’re the underdog. We don’t mind that kind of stuff, because when you overcome it ... We were never the perfect football team. We won a Super Bowl last year, but we were never the perfect football team. We just found ways to win games, and that’s the kind of football team we are.”

WR Torrey Smith on how he wants to be known:

“I’m just a receiver. I don’t want to be labeled as a deep-threat guy, which is always going to happen because I’m always going to be able to run past people until I’m slow. I watch some guys who are very good at being deep threats, but it’s like people don’t respect them doing anything else. I don’t want to be one of those guys. I want to be known as a solid all-around receiver that’s fast, not a fast guy that plays receiver.”

SIZING UP THE STREAK

The Ravens have won 13-consecutive home games against the NFC dating back to 2006, a streak that ranks as the NFL's longest home winning stretch by one conference vs. another. In the Ravens' 13-straight home wins over NFC opponents, Baltimore has scored 28.3 points per game and allowed just 13.3. The Ravens have also posted a +16 turnover ratio in these 13 victories.

SUCCESS VS. THE NFC

The Ravens have won 10 of their last 14 games against NFC foes. Under head coach **John Harbaugh**, Baltimore is 13-7 (.650) in games vs. the "other" conference, ranking as the third-best such mark by an AFC team since his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

LAST WEEK AT MIAMI

Baltimore Ravens 26, Miami Dolphins 23
Sun Life Stadium • Miami, FL • Week 5: Oct. 6

K Justin Tucker kicked his game-winning fourth field goal (44 yards) of the day with 1:42 remaining in the fourth quarter to help the Ravens earn a hard-fought 26-23 victory at Miami. Trailing 13-6 at the half, the Ravens dominated the third quarter, holding the ball for over 11 minutes to take a 16-13 lead. The Ravens opened the second half with a 6-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 2-yard **RB Ray Rice** TD run. After forcing a Dolphins' punt, Baltimore came back with an 11-play series that ended with a 25-yard Tucker field goal. After a Miami three-and-out, the Ravens produced an even better drive – 11 plays for 94 yards – that ended with a Rice 3-yard TD scamper to give Baltimore a 23-13 lead at the start of the final period. Miami, however, responded immediately with 10 points in 1 minute and 45 seconds to tie the game at 23. (The Dolphins scored when S Reshad Jones returned a **QB Joe Flacco** INT for a 25-yard TD, which followed a 48-yard K Caleb Sturgis FG.) Sturgis missed a 57-yard FG attempt at the end of the game that would have sent the contest into overtime. Tucker (42 and 50 yards) and Sturgis (37 and 25 yards) exchanged a pair of field goals in the first two quarters before Miami QB Ryan Tannehill hit TE Charles Clay with a 9-yard TD pass with 46 seconds left in the second quarter. Baltimore's defense limited the Dolphins to 22 rushing yards (fourth fewest in Ravens history) and sacked Tannehill 6 times, including 3 by **OLB Terrell Suggs** in the fourth quarter. **OLBs Elvis Dumervil, Courtney Upshaw** and **Pernell McPhee** also produced QB takedowns. Flacco was 19-of-32 for 269 yards, including 6 passes for 121 yards to **WR Torrey Smith**. Rice rushed 27 times for 74 yards and added 6 catches for 28 more.

LAST GAME VS. GREEN BAY: PACKERS 27, RAVENS 14

The Ravens turned the ball over 4 times, including 3 interceptions from **QB Joe Flacco** – one from the Packers’ 3-yard line in the fourth quarter – in a Monday Night Football 27-14 loss at Green Bay. The Packers took a 17-0 halftime lead on 2 **QB Aaron Rodgers** touchdown passes (**TE Jermichael Finley** and WR Donald Driver) and a **K Mason Crosby** field goal. Baltimore came back with 2 third-quarter TDs (Flacco to WR Kelley Washington for 12 yards and a RB Willis McGahee 1-yard run) to make the score 17-14. Rodgers threw his third TD pass (a second to Finley), and Crosby added another FG in the fourth quarter. A total of 23 penalties, 12 on the Ravens and 11 on the Packers, for 310 yards (the second-most in NFL history) were called in the game. Green Bay’s NFL-leading defense limited the Ravens to 185 yards, with just 66 on the ground. Baltimore, which played without Pro Bowl defenders S Ed Reed (hip) and **OLB Terrell Suggs** (knee), did create 3 turnovers, including interceptions by S Tom Zbikowski and OLB Jarret Johnson. The game temperature was 21 degrees with a wind chill of 15. Rookie OLB Paul Kruger and Zbikowski each made their first-career NFL starts. Zbikowski, who started in place of Reed, also recorded his first-career interception.

PACKERS SNAPSHOT

Overview: Following a Week 4 bye, the Packers are 2-2 and stand third in the NFC North. Last week, Green Bay defeated Detroit, 22-9, earning its 23rd-consecutive victory over the Lions in Wisconsin. This week marks the first of two-straight AFC North clashes for the Packers, as they return home to face the Browns on Oct. 20.

Mike McCarthy: McCarthy is in his eighth season as head coach of the Packers and has compiled a 76-40 regular season record. Under his guidance, Green Bay has earned five double-digit-win seasons and has finished under .500 just once (2008). McCarthy has coached Packers teams that have earned five playoff berths, won three division titles and captured Super Bowl XLV in 2010. He is 1-0 all time against the Ravens, with a 27-14 win in 2009.

Offense: Green Bay ranks third in total offense (453.3 ypg), including the fourth-ranked passing attack (312.3 ypg) and fifth-best ground game (141.0 ypg). The Packers are averaging 29.5 points per contest, the league’s third-best mark. Pro Bowl **QB Aaron Rodgers** has completed 101 of 152 passes (66.4 percent) for 1,331 yards, 9 TDs and 3 INTs. His 83-yard touchdown strike to **WR James Jones** (19 catches for 339 yards and 2 TDs) last week is the longest pass play in the NFL this season. **WR Jordy Nelson** has 23 receptions for a team-high 379 yards and 3 TDs. **RB James Starks**, who missed last week’s game (knee), has a team-best 187 rushing yards.

Defense: The Packers have the NFL’s 19th-ranked defensive unit (374.8 ypg), but have produced the fifth-best run stop (86.0 ypg). **LB A.J. Hawk** paces the group with 32 tackles, while **LB Brad Jones** (who left last week’s contest with a hamstring injury) is second with 29 stops (a team-best 23 solo), adding 1 sack and 1 FF. **LB Clay Matthews** has produced team highs with 3 sacks and 2 FFs.

SPECIAL FORCES



Assistant head coach/special teams coordinator **Jerry Rosburg**, a 35-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. In 2012, the Ravens' special teams units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones**, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD in Super Bowl XLVII.

Rosburg's kickers were special in 2012, too: **P Sam Koch** set Ravens single-season punting records with a 47.1 gross average and a 40.8 net average, shattering career bests. **K Justin Tucker** made 30 of 33 FGAs (90.9%), producing the second-best success rate in Ravens single-season history and also the second-best mark by a rookie kicker in NFL history.

Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume both with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

SPECIAL TEAMS STANDOUTS

In 2012, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 2 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that's based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. The Vikings finished first in Gosselin's special teams rankings, followed by the Ravens and the Bengals.

A STRONG RETURN

Dating back to the 2008 season when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore has produced the NFL's No. 1 kickoff return average (24.9).

COORDINATORS NOTES

CALDWELL'S ATTACK



Jim Caldwell, a 36-year coaching veteran, joined the Ravens as the team's QBs coach in February 2012 and was elevated to offensive coordinator on Dec. 10, replacing Cam Cameron. Caldwell arrived in Baltimore after coaching 10 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, including the three (2009-11) as head coach. In his first year at the helm, he led the Colts to the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLIV. Caldwell, who earned a Super Bowl ring (2006) with Indy, spent six seasons tutoring one of the NFL's all-time greats in QB Peyton Manning. During the course of Caldwell's time in Indianapolis, the Colts achieved much success, tying an NFL record with nine-straight playoff appearances and winning six AFC South division titles.

CALDWELL FIRES UP "O"

Under **Jim Caldwell**, who was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to the Ravens' Dec. 16, 2012 game vs. Denver, Baltimore averaged 400.6 yards of offense per contest (146.4 rushing & 254.1 passing) and 27.3 points per game to close out last season.

PEES LEADS THE "D"



Dean Pees, a 10-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2012, after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, leads a Baltimore unit that finished as the NFL's third-best scoring defense four-consecutive years (2008-11) and tied (NYG) for 12th in 2012, allowing 21.5 points per game.

Ozzie Newsome's legacy is unlike any the game has seen. Known throughout all of sports as a premier leader, Newsome is a Hall of Fame player, the architect of Baltimore's 2000 and 2012 Super Bowl championship teams and an elite personnel evaluator who became the NFL's first African American GM.

- Clark (490 receptions) needs 10 more catches to reach 500, which would make him the ninth TE in NFL history to accomplish the feat.
- With 3 receiving yards, Clark can hit the 5,500-yard milestone, becoming the 17th TE in history to achieve the feat. Clark (50) also needs just 1 receiving TD to own the seventh most all time by a TE (currently tied with Ben Coates).

QB JOE FLACCO

- With 7 more passing yards, Flacco will hit 19,000 for his career.

OLB ELVIS DUMERVIL

- Dumervil (66.5) needs 3.5 sacks to reach 70 for his career.

TORREY'S COURAGEOUS NIGHT

In the 2012 thrilling, double-overtime Divisional Playoff win at Denver (38-35 on 1/12/13), **WR Torrey Smith** caught 59-yard and 32-yard TD passes, helping mark the first game in NFL playoff history that a QB (**Joe Flacco**) threw 2 TDs of 59-plus yards (the other being to **WR Jacoby Jones** on a 70-yarder). In the 2012 postseason, Smith recorded a 21.2 yards-per-catch average, reeling in 11 passes for 233 yards.

LONG BALL LOVE

WR Torrey Smith ranks first in Ravens franchise history in yards-per-catch average, posting a 17.9 mark over the three seasons in which he's caught 126 passes for 2,252 yards and 16 TDs. Dating back to his rookie campaign of 2011, Smith's 17.9 average also ranks second in the NFL.

IMPRESSIVE SINCE DAY ONE

In 2011's Week 11 game vs. Cincinnati, **WR Torrey Smith** set a Ravens' single-season and single-game record for receiving yards by a rookie, totaling a career-high 165 yards on 6 catches (27.5 avg.). In 2011, the first-year Smith had 50 catches for 841 yards and a Ravens' rookie-record 7 TDs.

Smith Quick Hits:

- During the 2011 campaign, Smith ranked 13th in the NFL with a stout 16.8 yards-per-catch average.
- Smith's 26-yard TD catch with 8 seconds remaining in Week 9 at Pit. capped a 92-yard drive and sealed the Ravens' 23-20 win.
- Impressively, 5 of his 7 TD receptions in 2011 covered at least 25 yards (74, 41, 38, 36, 26, 18 and 8 yards), and he averaged a sensational 34.4 yards-per-TD catch.

Career 50-yard FGs by Tucker. In 2012, he had two games where he connected on dual 50+ FGs (Week 2 at Phi. & Week 7 at Hou.), making him one of 10 players in NFL history and the first rookie (Greg Zuerlein became the second on 12/2/12) to accomplish the feat.

KICK IT OFF

K Justin Tucker has been very strong with his kickoffs this season, producing the NFL's second-most touchbacks (22, tied with Stephen Gostkowski). Dating back to the 2012 campaign, Tucker has produced the NFL's third-most TBs (71).

Attendees also had access to concessions, the Ravens Team Store and special offers and giveaways from Ravens partners.





HEAD COACH JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE

Opening statement: “Good seeing everybody. Welcome, thanks for coming over. A couple of injury things: [Kelechi Osemele’s] back is feeling better today. We’ll just have to see throughout the course of the week how he responds. Marcus [Spears] had some work done on his knee; he’ll just be getting treatment. When I say that, I mean treatment-type work, and it’s nothing major [or] structural in there. We’ll just have to see how that responds, and he’ll probably be day-to-day. Marlon Brown, we’ll hope to get him out there on Wednesday. We’ll see if we can do that. It would be good to do that. Arthur Brown had no issue with his [pectoral] strain. He seemed to be 100 percent. Ray [Rice] continues to get better. Jacoby [Jones] will continue to practice this week. We’ll see how he does. And then [Lardarius Webb’s] hamstring got through it pretty well yesterday. So, that’s how it went with injuries. Just watching the tape, [it was] very similar to what we thought after the game. The offensive line, it seemed like, played even better than we thought when you watched the tape, as far as the run blocking. They blocked exceptionally well in the run game. Our conditioning really showed up in that game. It really showed up in that heat down there. It was a tough, hard-fought game. But by the second half – particularly in the fourth quarter – our conditioning seemed like it took over. The effort and heart were tremendous, and it was just a great win. And our fans – I’ll tell you – our fans are fabulous. You guys saw that down there. That was special.”

Each team presents a different set of circumstances as each game unfolds, but would it be too blunt to say that you will never ever give up on the run game again – that the Buffalo scenario will never happen again? (Joe Platania) “Come on. What else do you have?”

When you talk about the conditioning of the team, did it surprise you? Miami plays in that type of weather all the time, and the Ravens held up as well as or better than the Dolphins in the heat. (Jerry Coleman) “It’s a compliment, definitely, to the work our guys have put in. Our guys have worked really, really hard. They work really hard every day at practice. And we’ve been blessed with some hot weather here. We’ve had a lot of humidity. The first two weeks – the Denver week and the next week – we had a lot of heat at practice. And then we had a lot of heat last week, too, so it helped us.”

Can you talk about the offensive and defensive play on third-down situations? (Aaron Wilson) “We were close to 40 percent on third down, which is OK. But our defense was completely dominant on third down, especially in the second half. I think we were 78 percent on third downs on defense. [It was only] one out of seven they converted in the second half. That’s the thing, [and] that probably leads to what you are talking about. You get your defense off the field, and your offense can make a few first downs and extend some drives, and that leads to that conditioning factor.”

John, if Jacoby Jones comes back this week, do you put him in as the return guy? Or will you just try to take it slow with him and do it gradually in both positions? (Mike Preston) “That’s the question we’re asking ourselves right now. It probably depends on how he looks during practice. If he looks really, really good, we’d be willing to put him out there. But if we feel like we need to protect him, then we will.”

John, was the pass protection better this week than it was last week? (Mark Zinno) “I would say so. I would say it was improved. We lost a couple one-on-one battles in there that got to Joe [Flacco]. Again, Joe, I would say, [was] still under too much duress, but they were one-on-one battles. They weren’t situations where we had miscommunications or protection errors, so that was positive. And we had a lot of good protections, too.”

A.Q. Shipley played yesterday at a spot that he hasn’t played at much before. Looking at the tape, how did it look like he did? (Garrett Downing) “I thought he did a great job for the situation, especially. He came in there ... We didn’t know anything [about Kelechi Osemele’s back tightness] until pregame. Now, [Shipley] knows he’s in that spot. He practices there, but he didn’t expect necessarily to be out there; we didn’t see this coming with ‘K.O.’ [Osemele]. So, he jumped in there and did a nice job, which we would have expected.”

How about the receivers? Tandon Doss and Deonte Thompson did a great job. Ed Dickson made a few catches. They certainly gave Joe Flacco some good support. (David Ginsburg) “They did, they made some good plays. Doss made a great play over his right shoulder, then over his left shoulder, however that one went. And Joe made a great throw while basically getting hit, made the throw out there. That was a big play for us. We only had three of those guys [wide receivers active], and they played a lot throughout the course of the game. Torrey [Smith] continues to just make a bunch of plays week-in and week-out. Deonte went up for a ball down the field and got a big interference call, made some plays for us that way, too. So, it was good.”

What is your thinking on Eugene Monroe and Bryant McKinnie at the left tackle position going forward this week? (Aaron Wilson) “We’re in wait-and-see mode right now. We’ll see what happens over the course of the week. [We] don’t really know for sure right now. I hate to add this ... Yes, [Monroe] looked good last week; he looked really good, OK? We’re just going to have to see how it plays out. This is uncharted territory for us, it really is. We’ve never been down this road before. So, we’ll see what happens.”



Did you get an explanation on the John Simon personal foul? (Aaron Wilson) “John [Simon] dumped the guy after the whistle. We saw it on tape. It was foolish. It was just a bad penalty. There was really no reason to do that. John, right away, when he came off the field, he said he messed up. That’s not something that we need to have.”

Going back to the run game – last week it was 15 yards at halftime for a 2.1 average. This week, it was 33 for a 2.2 average. Was there anything specific you saw that made you say, ‘We could still go down the road of running the football and be successful at it.’? (Mark Zinno) “Yes. I thought we could be successful at it in the second half, whereas last week, I did not think we’d be successful at it in the second half [with] the way we were blocking.”

What gave you that [inclination]? (Mark Zinno) “Well, we’ll go through the tape later if you want. I’ll sit down and go through every play with you later. We blocked better – that’s what we did better. We blocked better. But you know, they have that thing now – 11-on-11. Take a look at it, and you tell me what you think.”

With a road win now, and of course you’ve got Green Bay coming in, and you’re tied atop the AFC North ... Are you OK with where you stand at this juncture of the season? (Dave Ginsburg) “No, I’d like to be 5-0. That’s where I’d like to be at this juncture of the season. But we’re not. We’re 3-2. So, we’re going to try to be 4-2 after this game.”

John, you talk about the fan base traveling. How does it feel to a team when you wind up in a stadium and you get to hear all your fans, and they support you so much when you turn around and see so much purple? (Bill West) “I’ll tell you, it’s just unbelievable. When we came out for pre-game, it might have been 10-to-1 Ravens fans. And then, of course, the Dolphins fans filled in. We came out for kickoff, and we were introduced, and we came running out there, and it was a loud cheer. You expect to get the boos, and we heard the boos, too. But that was heartening. It was emotional. We’ve got amazing fans.”

With Torrey Smith, he’s been pretty consistent through every game. Have you seen defenses try to limit what he’s done as the season has gone on? (Jamison Hensley) “Yes. He gets a lot of double coverage. He gets a lot of press [coverage]. He gets a guy pressed and then a guy on top of him – what we call ‘choke’ coverage. And he’s done a good job handling all of those things. He gets off the line of scrimmage against press better than people think. They think they can keep him on the line of scrimmage, but he does a better job releasing than people expect.”

Kyle Juszczyk had one target. I know he didn’t get a lot of offensive plays yesterday, but he was targeted with one pass. Is that a byproduct of you guys being shorter on receivers yesterday, or something that you want to see more offensive snaps for him? (Ryan Mink) “We’d like to see more with him. He’s coming on. [He’s a] talented guy, and we’re looking forward to seeing how we can develop him even more.”

How impressed were you that you were able to get things done yesterday being so thin at wide receiver? And there was talk that Brandon [Stokley] was back in the fold ... (Jerry Coleman) “I was really happy to see the way our receivers played. It was tough, it was hot, [and] we only had three of them. We’ve never had that before, never had any experience with that before. [We] didn’t know how that was going to go, especially in that heat. Other guys, like Kyle [Juszczyk,] took up the slack as well. As far as the other question, I don’t know how that’s going to shake out. We’ll see.”

Going in with the three wide receivers, you said that that is something you’ve never experienced on any level before. That was a totally new thing for you. But it was something that you were prepared for more than ‘K.O.’ [Kelechi Osemele] going down in warm-ups? (Jerry Coleman) “Yes, we thought it would be a possibility that we’d be in that situation.”

John, your run defense was dominant yesterday. Compared to the week before, was that a scheme adjustment you made or more winning one-on-one battles? (Gerry Sandusky) “We played better run defense.”

John, you alluded to the throw that Joe [Flacco] made to Torrey [Smith.] What does it say about Joe that he’s willing to stand in there and take those hits? I know not every quarterback is as continually willing to get hit like that while making throws down the field. (Matt Vensel) “We talked about it a little last night after the game. That’s part of Joe’s [Flacco] greatness. That’s a part of what makes Joe who he is. You look around the league, and you’ll see a lot of quarterbacks not doing those things [and] not standing in there the way he stands in there. He’s special that way. We don’t win that game without him, without his willingness to stand in there and make those throws.”

[Ryan] Tannehill made some plays, extending yesterday, and that’s something Aaron Rodgers can do as well. Is that something you can emphasize this week as far as not getting guys lost when plays get extended? (Clifton Brown) “We’ll work hard on the extended coverage. When quarterbacks scramble, that’s something we work very hard on. We’ve been doing that for a very long time, [preparing for] playing against Ben Roethlisberger. That’s been a big emphasis for us, always is every practice. We make a point of that. It’s easier said than done, but you need to try and stay on top of those routes.”



How about the play of [Terrell] Suggs? It seems like he and [Elvis] Dumervil have really been working together, and Suggs had the three sacks. (Dave Ginsburg) “For a guy to take over the game like that, you don’t see that too often. He took over the game in the fourth quarter, as you said, and Elvis [Dumervil] put the exclamation point on it with that last sack. That was tough. We had them at fourth-and-long there, and [Ryan Tannehill] scrambles out to the left. He makes a pretty incredible throw on the run, hits [Mike] Wallace on a diving catch, and now they’re sitting there close to field goal range – probably are in field goal range with their kicker. Right out of the gate, ‘Doom’ [Dumervil] gets the sack. But before that, we had two drives that were snuffed out in the fourth quarter by our defense by the pressure we got, mainly by Terrell [Suggs].”

John, any concerns about Sam [Koch]? A couple of times yesterday, [he had] just a couple of short kicks. (Bill West) “That was very un-Sam-like. Those are two shanks that he usually doesn’t have. He was really doing a great job; he’s done a great a job. We’ve faced some really good returners, no less this week. We try to punt to the sideline. On the one hand, we always say, ‘Why didn’t he just punt it out of bounds?’ You guys have asked me that before: ‘Why not just punt it out of bounds?’ Well, sometimes that’s why. If you punt it out of bounds, those angles change over there. If you hit it a little bit off center, [then] that’s what happens – real short punts. We’ve asked Sam to do that a lot, and he’s done a great job of it. But on those two, it didn’t work out so well.”
