WEEK 17: RAVENS (8-7) AT BENGALS (10-5)

DEC. 29, 2013 • 1 P.M. ET • PAUL BROWN STADIUM (65,515)



JUST THE FACTS

- With a chance to make the playoffs for the sixth-consecutive season and seventh time in the last eight years, the Baltimore Ravens play at the Cincinnati Bengals this Sunday, Dec. 29. Kickoff at Paul Brown Stadium is 1 p.m. ET. To earn the postseason as the second Wild Card entrant, the Ravens must beat the Bengals and have either Miami or San Diego lose or tie. (Baltimore can also make the playoffs if Miami, San Diego and Pittsburgh lose.)
- The Ravens, winners of four of their last five games, take an 8-7 record into Sunday's battle. The Bengals, also winners of four of the last five, are 10-5 and have won the AFC North, a crown the Ravens owned the last two seasons. The Ravens beat the Bengals, 20-17 in overtime, at M&T Bank Stadium on Nov. 10.
- Last Sunday, the Ravens were stunned by the Patriots in Baltimore by a score of 41-7. New England took a 17-0 first-half lead, increased that to 20-0 after three quarters and exploded for 21 points in the final 2:05 of the contest. The Ravens got within 13 at 20-7 in the fourth quarter, but failed on a fourth-and-10 situation on their next possession. The Bengals beat the Vikings, 42-14, in Cincinnati.
- The 2012 Super Bowl XLVII Champion Ravens are the NFL's only team to earn the playoffs in each of the last five seasons – all under head coach **John Harbaugh**. (Baltimore has won at least one playoff game in each of the last five years when it also appeared in three AFC Championships.)
- This Sunday, Miami hosts the Jets, the Chargers are home to Kansas City, which has secured the top AFC Wild Card spot (fifth seed), and the Steelers host the Browns.

HARBS SAYS

"It's simple: We have to go to Cincinnati and win. That was pretty much going to be the case whether we beat New England or not. We have to coach and play a lot better than we did against the Patriots, and we know we are capable of doing that. We can't say enough about the players on this team. They work so hard, and they'll be ready in Cincinnati, a team that plays very well at home."

Bryant** (knee), **OLB Adrian Hamilton** (wrist) and **WR Aaron Mellette** (knee) are on Injured Reserve. **DE Kapron Lewis-Moore** (knee) is on the Non-Football Injury list.

WHAT'S GOING ON?

The Ravens are the NFL's only team to make the playoffs in each of the past five (2008-12) seasons. This Sunday, Baltimore aims to clinch its sixth-straight postseason berth and post its 72nd overall win (includes playoffs) under head coach **John Harbaugh**. If the Ravens were to make the playoffs, Harbaugh would become just the second coach in NFL history (since 1970 merger) to secure a postseason berth in each of his first six seasons (Bill Cowher, Steelers, from 1992-97).

JOE FLACCO ON PANIC

SPOTLIGHT: JIMMY SMITH



Pos: CB **Ht:** 6-2 **Wt:** 200 **Exp. (Ravens/NFL):** 3/3

When did you know you were going to be a cornerback? "When I was 13 years old, my brother told me. I didn't play football – I played basketball – growing up. I played football one day, and I saw one of my best friends playing it. I looked at it thinking, 'Oh, I could do that.' My brother took me to Oklahoma and put me on the field to do drills. He had me covering in man-to-man, and I was naturally jamming up receivers. He saw that and said, 'You're going to play corner.'"

Was there ever a time when you had the mindset of an offensive skill player? "I played two ways in high school. When I was getting recruited for college, a lot of people wanted to play me at wide receiver, but I knew I wanted to play corner. I just knew that my size and athleticism at corner is rare, compared to a wide receiver. It was a business decision."

What is the mindset of being a coverage specialist? "In my head – and this is how I thought coming in here – I wanted to cover every single route, no matter what the coverage is, no matter what our weak spot in the defense was. I wanted to cover every single route. I had to learn that I couldn't do that. I had to give up some things to get other things. When I go out there man-to-man, I immediately think I can cover every route. Going into the game, I'm thinking I'm not going to allow any catches, but one or two is OK. Really, I'm trying to go for zero."

How much can going up against players like Torrey Smith and Jacoby Jones in practice help you grow as a cornerback? "Any type of guy like that who has a lot of speed is rare in the NFL. To face that type of speed and agility every day can only make you better."

What was your "welcome to the NFL" moment? "When I was facing Ted Ginn Jr. in 2011. They didn't throw it to him, but he beat me so bad. He just took off. My rookie season against San Francisco, I was in press coverage, and when the ball snapped, I went to put my hand on him. He took off so quick that by the time I turned around, he was 10 yards behind me. I was thinking: 'Geez! I have never seen speed like that.'"

What's your favorite play from your career? "The fourth down stop in the Super Bowl. They had their best receiver on me – the third corner – split wide by himself. I knew it was either going to be a slant or a fade. I was gearing up for the slant, but they ended up throwing the fade."

What's one thing people don't know about you that you're proud of? "I'm one of 11 siblings: three girls, eight boys. All of them live in California except for me and my brother, who moved in with me here."

RICE MILESTONE

RB Ray Rice has 9,164 total yards from scrimmage during his career, which is just 3 yards shy of breaking RB Jamal Lewis' franchise record of 9,166. Rice has 6,165 rushing yards and 2,999 receiving yards in six NFL seasons, averaging 100.7 yards per game from scrimmage.

T. SMITH MILESTONE

With 101 more receiving yards, **WR Torrey Smith** (1,101 yards on 62 catches this season) will set a single-season franchise record, surpassing WR Michael Jackson (1,201) from 1996. Additionally, with 2 more receptions of 25-plus yards, Smith will break the single-season team record set by Jackson (14 in 1996).

FLACCO MILESTONE

QB Joe Flacco (3,720 in 2013) needs 98 passing yards to set a new career high (3,817 from 2012). Last week against New England, Flacco set the Ravens' single-season franchise record for both completions (332) and passing attempts (564), surpassing the records set by QB Vinny Testaverde (325 for 549) in 1996.

TUCKER MILESTONE

With 1 more FG made, **K Justin Tucker** (35) will break K Matt Stover's single-season team record of 35 set in 2000. Tucker (131) needs just 5 points to set a Ravens' single-season record, breaking Stover's mark of 135 from 2000.

“It still seems like John Harbaugh doesn’t quite get the credit he deserves. He’s the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first five seasons, and he’s deftly guided the Baltimore Ravens through a retooling this fall and back into contention.”

Head coach John Harbaugh on overcoming adversity and battling back in improbable fashion:

“The thing I love about our football team is that we are a team of faith. We believe. We trust. Because of that, we’ll fight. We will run the race right down to the end. That’s something that our football team does. I’m very proud of them for that.”

Offensive coordinator Jim Caldwell on QB Joe Flacco and his clutch play-making ability:

“He hasn’t been lucky. I think what you see is a real highly-competitive guy that has the ability when things are on the line to get focused. The game doesn’t ever get too big for him, and he certainly knows how to move the ball down the field under some very, very difficult circumstances.”

The Baltimore Sun’s Peter Schmuck on the 2013 Baltimore Ravens: “No one can discount the toughness the Ravens have shown during the second half of this season. No one can say they don’t deserve to be where they are in the playoff picture right now — for better or worse ... The Ravens are one of the scariest teams in the NFL right now because no one knows what they’re going to do next.”

Patriots QB Tom Brady on ILB Daryl Smith:

“He looks a lot like Ray Lewis. Ray Lewis is Hall of Fame; he’s one of the best players I’ve ever played against, but Daryl Smith has really stepped in and been a big leader for them. He’s right in the middle of the defense. He’s a really smart, instinctive player, really good against the pass, fast sideline to sideline. He’s got a lot of qualities for a great linebacker. He’s made a lot of plays from an interception return for a touchdown, strip-sacks, fumbles and stuff like that. He’s really good.”

BaltimoreRavens.com’s John Eisenberg on the 2013 Ravens:

“In the sweeping theatrical production that is the NFL, every team plays a certain character, fills a role. There are royals. There are peasants. There are court jesters. There are dashing young men destined to break your heart. There are radicals, over-the-hill knights, honorable soldiers and Rex Ryan’s team. (See if you can match those archetypes with teams. It’s fun.) Who are the Ravens? I see them as the savvy gladiator, calm in conflict, knowing what it takes to prevail – a role they have almost perfected.”

Ravens WR Torrey Smith on the Ravens’ mentality:

“No one throws in the towel. No one doubts for a second that we aren’t going to get it done no matter what the situation is.”

OLB Terrell Suggs on the Ravens’ mentality:

“We are pretty much battle-tested against anything a team can throw against us. We just keep trucking along. This team is very tough and very mentally strong.”

DE Chris Canty on how the team regroups from the New England loss:

“We just have to put this one behind us. We’ve got to focus in on the task at hand, which is the Cincinnati Bengals. It’s a one-game season for us, so that’s going to be our focus, and that’s going to get all of our energy.”

Ravens assistant GM Eric DeCosta on QB Joe Flacco:

“The thing about Joe that is great is that he doesn’t get flustered. He may have a bad quarter, he may have a bad half, he may have a bad game. But, he’s going to come back and play better every single time. You have a bad first half, he comes out and has a great second half. It’s happened repeatedly. His personality lends itself to tough situations, critical situations. Players respond to that, and those are the things about Joe that make him special and unique.”

QB Joe Flacco on CB Jimmy Smith’s progress in 2013:

“He’s so much more sure of what he’s doing. He’s not afraid to be wrong. He’s not second-guessing himself [thinking], ‘Should I have done this?’ or ‘Should I have done that?’ He’s just going out there and playing. I think because of that, his ball skills have improved so much. He’s reacting to those things so much better because he’s not thinking in his head, ‘What happens if I don’t make this play?’ He has confidence, he’s very sure of himself, and a lot of the basic things that his talent allows him to do – he’s freed up, and those things are just starting to come out.”

Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis on NT Haloti Ngata:

“He still is so big and strong and just gets up and swats guys and goes. He’s another guy, who down the line, will have an opportunity to be considered as a possible Hall of Fame player for his accomplishments since he’s been in the league.”

LAST WEEK VS. PATRIOTS

New England Patriots 41, Baltimore Ravens 7

The Ravens lost the ability to control their playoff destiny when they dropped a 41-7 decision to the Patriots at M&T Bank Stadium last Sunday. The game started badly for Baltimore and finished even worse when New England scored 21 points in the final 2:05 of the contest. A pass interference (**CB Jimmy Smith**) call in the end zone on the Pats' second possession of the game gave New England a first down on the Ravens' 1-yard line. RB LeGarrette Blount scored on a burst up the middle on the next play for a 7-0 NE lead. A **QB Joe Flacco** interception on the Baltimore 32 by CB Logan Ryan on the next series set up the Patriots' second score. That came when QB Tom Brady hit RB Shane Vereen with a 4-yard touchdown pass that helped the Pats to a 14-0 first-quarter lead. A K Stephen Gostkowski 45-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter gave the Patriots a 17-0 advantage that they held through the remainder of the first half. A Gostkowski 42-yard FG made the score 20-0 entering the fourth quarter. The Ravens finally got on the board with 9:21 left in the game when Flacco plunged one yard for a TD to make the score 20-7. After holding the Patriots to a three-and-out, the Ravens had a fourth-and-10 from their 48 with 6:46 remaining. But, a pass from Flacco to **TE Dennis Pitta** landed incomplete. Nine Patriots' runs later, plus a personal foul on **CB Lardarius Webb**, Blount scored his second TD of the day – a 7-yard run. On the Ravens' next play, a bad snap to backup **QB Tyrod Taylor** was scooped up by NE DE Chandler Jones in the end zone for another TD to give the Pats a 34-7 lead. The Patriots weren't finished as CB Tavon Wilson intercepted Taylor and raced 74 yards for a TD and a final margin of 41-7. Brady completed 14 of 26 for 172 yards, while Flacco was 22-of-38 for 260 yards with 2 INTs. Three Ravens caught four passes: **WR Marlon Brown** (51 yards), **TE Ed Dickson** (44) and Pitta (34). Blount led NE with 76 rush yards, and WR Julian Edelman caught seven from Brady.

LAST GAME VS. CINCINNATI: RAVENS 20, BENGALS 17 (OT)

Ravens 20, Bengals 17 (OT) • Nov. 10, 2013 • Baltimore, MD

In a thrilling overtime game at gusty M&T Bank Stadium, the Ravens beat the first-place Bengals, 20-17, on a 46-yard **K Justin Tucker** field goal. Cincinnati tied the game at 17 on the final play of the fourth quarter when **QB Andy Dalton's** "Hail Mary" was tipped and caught by **WR A.J. Green** for a 51-yard touchdown. The ball bumped off the hand of **S James Ihedigbo**, who had 2 INTs (the first steals of his career). One of the main stories in this wild game were a pair of fourth-down stops by the Ravens' defense. On the Bengals' first possession of the game, they were stopped on a fourth and-1 at the Ravens' 47. On the next play, **QB Joe Flacco** attempted a long pass to **WR Jacoby Jones**, who collided with **S Reggie Nelson**. Nelson was called for interference on the Cincinnati 5-yard line. Three plays later, Flacco found **TE Dallas Clark** at the back of the end zone for a 1-yard TD and a 7-0 Ravens' lead. Baltimore extended the advantage to 10-0 in the first quarter with a 36-yard Tucker FG. Flacco's 7-yard TD dart to **WR Torrey Smith** gave the Ravens a 17-0 halftime lead. Cincy produced more penalty yards (114) than total offense (102 yards) in the first half. Dalton, who finished the game with 24 completions on 51 attempts for 274 yards and 3 INTs, was just 8-of-21 for 47 yards (1 INT) in the first two quarters. Bengals **K Mike Nugent** provided the only points in the third quarter when he hit a 32-yard FG to make the score 17-3 entering the fourth period. **RB Giovani Bernard's** 18-yard catch and run got the Bengals to within 7 at 17-10 with 8:22 left in regulation. Baltimore's second fourth-down stop came on the first series of OT. The Bengals drove to the Ravens' 33-yard line and faced a fourth-and-2. Rather than attempt a 51-yard-FG against the wind, Dalton threw a short pass to Bernard, who was tackled for an 11-yard loss. Baltimore then produced 2 first downs to set up Tucker's game-winner. BENGALS SNAPSHOT

Overview: Cincinnati defeated Minnesota, 42-14, at home last week, improving to 10-5 and securing the AFC North title. This mark's Cincinnati's third division crown and its first since 2009. The Bengals, who are winners in four of their last five, are a perfect 7-0 at Paul Brown Stadium this season. This is the fourth-straight year the Ravens and Bengals will square off in the regular season finale, with Baltimore owning a 2-1 advantage in those contests.

Marvin Lewis: Lewis is in his 11th season at the helm in Cincinnati, compiling an 89-85-1 regular season record. Leading the Bengals to the playoffs in four of the past five seasons (and three straight), Lewis has coached Cincinnati teams that have earned five postseason berths and three division crowns.

Offense: Cincinnati's offense ranks 10th overall (366.8 ypg), including the 10th-best passing offense (257.2 ypg) and the 21st-ranked rushing attack (109.6 ypg). The Bengals have the league's seventh-best scoring offense (26.4 ppg) and average 34.4 points per game at home, the league's second-best mark. Cincinnati's 74.4 percent red zone touchdown efficiency also ranks second in the league.

Defense: The Bengals own the fifth-overall defense (311.1 ypg), ranking sixth against both the pass (211.3 ypg) and the rush (99.8 ypg). Cincinnati also boasts the league's sixth-best scoring defense (19.2 ppg), while its 33.3 percent opponent third-down efficiency mark ranks fifth. The Bengals are forcing opponent three-and-out drives at a 27.3 percent rate, the NFL's fifth-best figure.

SPECIAL FORCES



Assistant head coach/special teams coordinator **Jerry Rosburg**, a 35-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. In 2012, the Ravens' special teams units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones**, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD in Super Bowl XLVII.

Rosburg's kickers were special in 2012, too: **P Sam Koch** set Ravens single-season punting records with a 47.1 gross average and a 40.8 net average, shattering career bests. **K Justin Tucker** made 30 of 33 FGAs (90.9%), producing the second-best success rate in Ravens single-season history and also the second-best mark by a rookie kicker in NFL history.

Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume both with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

SPECIAL TEAMS STANDOUTS

In 2012, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 2 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that's based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. The Vikings finished first in Gosselin's special teams rankings, followed by the Ravens and the Bengals.

A STRONG RETURN

Dating back to the 2008 season when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore has produced the NFL's No. 1 kickoff return average (25.0).

CALDWELL'S ATTACK



Jim Caldwell, a 36-year coaching veteran, joined the Ravens as the team's QBs coach in February 2012 and was elevated to offensive coordinator on Dec. 10, replacing Cam Cameron. Caldwell arrived in Baltimore after coaching 10 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, including three (2009-11) as head coach. In his first year at the helm, he led the Colts to the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLIV. Caldwell, who earned a Super Bowl ring (2006) with Indy, spent six seasons tutoring one of the NFL's all-time greats in QB Peyton Manning. During the course of Caldwell's time in Indianapolis, the Colts achieved much success, tying an NFL record with nine-straight playoff appearances and winning six AFC South division titles.

CALDWELL FIRES UP "O"

Under **Jim Caldwell**, who was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to the Ravens' Dec. 16, 2012 game vs. Denver, Baltimore averaged 400.6 yards of offense per contest (146.4 rushing & 254.1 passing) and 27.3 points per game to close out last season.

SMITH IS SCINTILLATING

WR Torrey Smith has excelled this season. With 6 receptions for 121 yards in Week 5 at Miami, Smith became the first Raven since Qadry Ismail in 1999 to post back-to-back 100-yard receiving games. (Ismail had three straight that year.)

- In Week 15 at Detroit, Smith (now 37) moved past Derrick Mason (35) to produce a franchise record in receptions of 25-or-more yards.
- With 2 more catches of 25-plus yards, Smith (13 in 2013) will break the single-season team record set by WR Michael Jackson (14) in 1996.
- With 101 receiving yards, Smith (1,101) will set a single-season franchise record, surpassing Jackson (1,201) from 1996.
- Smith, who owns a 17.8-yard receiving average this season, pulled in a 42-yard bomb in Week 16 vs. NE., marking his eighth catch of 40-or-more yards in 2013.

He's our leader."

TORREY'S COURAGEOUS NIGHT

WR Torrey Smith played in the 2012 Week 3 Sunday night victory over New England after his brother, 19-year-old Tevin Jones, passed away in a motorcycle accident that morning. Smith posted 6 catches for 127 yards and 2 TDs in the come-from-behind win, producing the third 100-yard game of his young career. Additionally, he eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving milestone for his career.

SMITH BIG IN '12 PLAYOFFS

In the 2012 thrilling, double-overtime Divisional Playoff win at Denver (38-35 on 1/12/13), **WR Torrey Smith** caught 59-yard and 32-yard TD passes, helping mark the first game in NFL playoff history that a QB (**Joe Flacco**) threw 2 TDs of 59-plus yards (the other being to **WR Jacoby Jones** on a 70-yarder). In the 2012 postseason, Smith recorded a 21.2 yards-per-catch average, reeling in 11 passes for 233 yards.

LONG BALL LOVE

WR Torrey Smith ranks first in Ravens franchise history in yards-per-catch average, posting a 17.4 mark over the three seasons in which he's caught 161 passes for 2,797 yards and 19 TDs. Dating back to his rookie campaign (2011), his 17.4 average ties for third in the NFL.

In 2011's Week 11 game vs. Cin., **WR Torrey Smith** set a Ravens' single-season and single-game record for receiving yards by a rookie, totaling 165 yards on 6 catches (27.5 avg.). In 2011, he had 50 catches for 841 yards and a Ravens' rookie-record 7 TDs.

Ravens **CB Jimmy Smith**, the team's 2011 first-round draft pick (27th overall), has been outstanding this season. Smith has totaled 14 passes defended (third most on the team), adding 2 forced fumbles and 57 total tackles in his first season as a true starter. Dating back to Week 2 (past 14 games), the Ravens have allowed just 16 passing TDs, tied (Miami and New Orleans) for the NFL's fourth fewest. Baltimore has also yielded 211.1 net passing yards a game during this span, the NFL's eighth-best mark.

THE DOMINANT DT

JUST FOR KICKS



K Justin Tucker's 35 FGs made this season tie (Matt Stover, 2000) for the most in Ravens single-season history. His 35 makes and 38 attempts are also league highs entering Week 17. A few quick hits:

- Tucker (131) needs just 5 points to set a Ravens' single-season record, breaking Matt Stover's mark of 135 from 2000. Tucker's 131 points in 2013 is the NFL's sixth most entering the season's final week.
- At Detroit (12/16), Tucker was 6-for-6, posting a franchise-record 61-yard game-winner. It marked the sixth overall game-winner of his career (5 regular season, 1 playoffs). The 6 FGs set a single-game team record and are the most in an NFL game this season.
- Against the Lions, Tucker became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- and 60-yard range in a game.
- Tucker is now 23-of-25 during his career when the Ravens are losing a game. He's 16-of-17 when Baltimore is down by 7 points or less.
- Tucker is 12-of-13 in the last 2 minutes of a game during his career, and he's 22-of-24 in the fourth quarter.
