JUST THE FACTS

- Coming off their bye and a victory in Week 8, the Baltimore Ravens (2-6) host the Jacksonville Jaguars (2-6) on Sunday, Nov. 15. Kickoff for this AFC matchup, which is just the fourth home game for Baltimore this season, is set for 1 p.m. at M&T Bank Stadium.
- On Nov. 1, the Ravens beat the visiting Chargers, 29-26, in a battle that came down to the final seconds. **K Justin Tucker** nailed a 39-yard field goal as time expired, marking his fifth FG of the day and his second game-winner this season. **QB Joe Flacco** threw for 319 yards and 1 TD (**TE Crockett Gillmore**) and ran for a 1-yard score that provided his team a 26-23 lead with 4:34 remaining in the fourth quarter. Then Chargers QB Philip Rivers, who threw 3 TD passes during his 28-of-37, 301-yard performance, brought San Diego right back. Rivers directed the Chargers to the Ravens' 31, where K Josh Lambo made a 49-yard FG to tie the game at 26 with 2:27 left. After that, Flacco and the Ravens needed 9 plays to reach the San Diego 21-yard line, and then Tucker hit the game-clincher.
- In all six of their defeats this season, the Ravens have had an opportunity to tie the game or take a lead in the final two minutes of play. Baltimore's six losses have been decided by 30 points (5.0 average margin of defeat). Each Ravens game has been decided by 8 points or fewer, marking the most such games of any NFL team this season (tied with SD).
- Five of Baltimore's first seven games this season were scheduled on the road, with the Ravens dropping close contests at Denver, at Oakland, at San Francisco and at Arizona. (Baltimore won in OT at Pittsburgh on Oct. 1.) The last time an NFL team opened the season playing five of its first seven games on the road was in 2000. That team – 16 years ago – was the eventual Super Bowl XXXV-winning Ravens.
- Beginning with Sunday's game, Baltimore plays five of its last eight at home. The Ravens will host the Rams on Nov. 22 and then travel to Cleveland for a Monday night special (Nov. 30) and play at Miami on Dec. 6.

RAVENS HISTORICALLY STRONG AFTER THE BYE WEEK

NOTE THE QUOTE

OC MARC TRESTMAN ON QB JOE FLACCO & THE RAVENS STEPPING UP AFTER THE LOSS OF WR STEVE SMITH SR.

"When things like this happen, the best way to go is for everybody to take it upon themselves to take some of that weight, and everybody carries a little bit more weight across the whole scheme of what we're doing offensively and try to pick up for the loss of Steve, as opposed to one individual player trying to take it all on himself. Joe is the quarterback of our football team, and he understands the responsibility and what goes with that. But it's certainly all of our responsibility – coaches and players alike – to make sure that we take on some of that load as well and try to do it together."

INJURY REPORT

- Seven starters have missed a combined 20 games this season, including **DE Chris Canty** (calf - 4), **TE Crockett Gillmore** (calf - 2), **S Kendrick Lewis** (knee - 1), **LT Eugene Monroe** (concussion/shoulder - 4), **WR Steve Smith Sr.** (back - 1), **OLB Terrell Suggs** (Achilles - 7 straight) and **CB Lardarius Webb** (thigh - 1).
- The Ravens have 13 players on Injured Reserve, including Smith Sr. (Achilles), Suggs, **WR/RS Michael Campanaro** (back), **CB Will Davis** (knee) and **RB Lorenzo Taliaferro** (foot).
- Against the Chargers on Nov. 1, Smith Sr. (Achilles) and starting **C Jeremy Zuttah** (shoulder) left the game and did not return. **T Eugene Monroe** (shoulder) missed the contest, as did **CB Tray Walker** (concussion) and **S Terrence Brooks** (thumb).
- 2015 first-round choice **WR Breshad Perriman** has not played in a game this season after sustaining a knee injury on the first day of training camp (July 30). **S Matt Elam**, the 2013 first-round draft pick, was placed on IR after sustaining a torn biceps (Aug. 1). **DE Brent Urban**, who also suffered a torn biceps (Aug. 6), is on IR - Designated for Return. Former starter **TE Dennis Pitta** (hip) is on the Physically Unable to Perform (PUP) list.

SPOTLIGHT: JUSTIN FORSETT

What were your first impressions of the Ravens in 2014?

"It was first class, just the way they handle their business and take care of the guys. The food was great, and the people were welcoming. Everybody speaks to you when they pass by in the hallway. Little things like that, you don't

get that everywhere you go. The practices were much more difficult than any place I'd been. We had 'double-downs,' and I've never done that anywhere else. That's when you split up first and second team, and everybody else goes on the other side of the field to run the same plays. Everyone gets the same reps, and no one is resting. That was tough."

Before signing with Baltimore, was there ever a moment when you thought your career may be over? "Before I signed here, I was getting ready to transition out of playing; I was doing job shadowing. I didn't know if I was going to get another shot, but I was still training, remaining hopeful. I remember when I got hurt, broke my foot in the Houston Texans game when I was a Jaguar, and just looking up at the ceiling from the field and thinking, 'Man, this could be the last time I ever suit up.' I didn't know if I'd get another shot. I remember that moment."

Do you have a post-NFL career in mind? "Because of the journey I've been on, I've been blessed to still be able to play this game and learn a lot of things along the way. I want to travel, speak and share my story and inspire and motivate people to be the best they can be. I want to speak in the church and to Fortune 500 companies. I'm also interested in doing player development. Before I signed here, I had an opportunity to interview with a team, and a lot of coaches told me along the way, 'If you ever need a job in player development, I've got you.'"

Which item is next on your bucket list? "I want to go to every city that has been on 'Diners, Drive-Ins and Dives.' I want to go to at least one restaurant in each city."

Which professions do you respect most? "Military, doctors and policemen – service people. I spent a lot of time, early in my career in Seattle, going to the military base there, Fort Lewis."

Describe your relationship with your offensive line. "I'm close with all of them. Every time we get 100 yards rushing, I bring them wings on Monday from America's Best Wings. They enjoy that, and it's a tradition we started last year. They all like the honey lemon pepper, so that's my go-to. I make sure I get a lot of those."

Which former or current teammate is ... The best athlete? "Marshawn Lynch." **The biggest prankster?** "Pete Carroll." **Best student of the game?** "Matt Hasselbeck." **The most competitive?** "Steve Smith Sr."

QB Joe Flacco on the young receivers stepping up after losing WR Steve Smith Sr. to injury:

“Those guys don’t blink. They don’t blink. They’re calling for it the whole game, and they want the opportunity to go in there and get the job done. You’ve got to be proud of the way they go up there. They’re not afraid. They want the ball, and they want it to be on them. That’s all you can ask for.”

WR Steve Smith Sr. on John Harbaugh and the Ravens’ culture:

“It all starts with John Harbaugh. There has been no pointing fingers or anyone getting down on themselves – what you might expect in a lot of other places. I like that he hasn’t used all the clichés like, ‘Tough times call for tough guys.’ Instead, he tells it like it is and says, ‘We just need to win the next one.’ There is no giving up, no panic, no wavering whatsoever. That’s just not the culture of this organization.”

WR Kamar Aiken on WR Steve Smith Sr. and what the Ravens must do in his absence:

“He has always told us to keep pushing. That’s what he has embedded in our heads. Even though he wasn’t around us at the end [of the Chargers game], we feel like he was with us. A little bit of him is in every one of us.”

DT Timmy Jernigan on the season-ending Achilles injury sustained to WR Steve Smith Sr.:

“We know what Steve stands for. Steve is the toughest person I know. He’s the toughest person I’ve ever seen in my life. The dude is tough as nails. We’re definitely going to keep fighting for him.”

Special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on P Sam Koch revolutionizing the punting game:

“I said this a year ago, and I’ll say it again: He’s changing the way the game is going to be played. It’s remarkable to me that more have not necessarily followed the lead. Perhaps that’s an indication of how difficult it is to do what he’s doing, because you don’t see much of it – even from the highly-skilled professionals that we see on a weekly basis. Nobody else is doing this. He has shown the value of it if you look at our gross punt and our net punt numbers. He has shown the value of the skills that he has, and yet, we still don’t see anybody else doing it. If they could do it, I can assure you they would. He has made it a lot of fun to coach football for those of us around him, because every day we go out there, and he has a new thought [about] something else that we want to try.”

The Baltimore Sun’s Jon Meoli on ILB Daryl Smith:

“The team’s leading tackler yet again, Smith is outshining pretty much everyone on the defense, including emerging star C.J. Mosley beside him, with his consistency this season. He’s led the Ravens in tackles in five-straight games. His 76 tackles on the season are [fourth] most in the NFL, and he’s been a rare constant in the Ravens’ defense through the first half. Inside linebacker is a stacked position, but in a season of so much disappointment for the Ravens, everyone associated with this team would smile at the thought of Daryl Smith earning a long-overdue Pro Bowl bid.”

Chargers head coach Mike McCoy on M&T Bank Stadium:

“It is a great environment. From the very first time I went there in my Carolina days, they have great energy, great fan support. It’s a loud place, so you’ve got to do your best with the silent count, offensively. But it’s a great environment on Sunday afternoon.”

TE Crockett Gillmore on the team chasing perfection:

“Our aspirations, the way we practice, we’re striving for perfection every day. I don’t feel there’s any more sense of urgency from the beginning of the season to now. You’re always chasing that goal. Obviously, it’s football, and it’s never going to happen [every time], but your expectations and what we need to do [doesn’t change].”

WRs coach Bobby Engram on WR Chris Givens’ acclimation to the team and his comfort level with QB Joe Flacco:

“Chris is one of those guys that came in and absorbed the playbook right away, and you saw him on the field. I think the first game he had almost 30 snaps and had a little bit of a setback, but he’s getting ready where we’re going to need him more. That was a great play – a couple of really big plays – that he made in the [Chargers] game. The check that we hit him down the field on and the back-shoulder catch was a great adjustment on the ball. Yes, we’re going to need him to step up and help us out.”

Defensive backs coach Chris Hewitt on CB Jimmy Smith:

“He’s giving up a couple of plays, but the guy – if you watch the entire film – the guy has been dominating people. He has had some dominating plays. Has he had dominating games? No, but he has had dominating plays. ... I think he’s continuing to keep on getting better as a player. He’ll be the first to tell you that he wants to be better, and he has put a lot of weight on his shoulders and a lot of stress on himself to become that leader or that big-time playmaker that we need. He’s doing a great job. I’m not pressing too much on Jimmy. Jimmy is doing a great job.”

Linebackers coach Ted Monachino on the Ravens’ pass rush and secondary and finding ways to limit big plays:

“Being a guy that coaches in the front, I believe the best pass defense is a good pass rush, and those things work together. And right now, we’re not getting it done on either end. I know that our secondary guys would cover a lot better if we could get the ball out of the quarterback’s hand much faster, and that’s what our mission has been from the beginning. We’ve got to continue to create plays to overload protections and work on individual protectors in ways that they have a hard time handling. But I think that I would take – as a front guy, a guy that coaches in the pass rush – I look at that as my issue. My issue is to get the ball out of the quarterback’s hand. My issue is to make sure that our secondary doesn’t have to cover as long as they’ve had to cover. And that’s where we have to go from here.”

Typical of every game the Ravens played in the first half of the season, Baltimore's 29-26 victory over the Chargers came down to the final minutes of the contest. It was Tucker's fifth field goal of the day and his second game-winner of the season. **QB Joe Flacco** threw for 319 yards, completing 25 of 37 passes, and ran 1 yard for the important touchdown that gave his team a 26-23 lead with 4:34 remaining in the fourth quarter. Chargers QB Philip Rivers, who threw 3 TD passes during his 28-of-37, 301-yard performance, brought San Diego right back. Rivers directed the Chargers to the Ravens' 31, where K Josh Lambo made a 49-yard FG to tie the game at 26 with 2:27 left. Flacco and the Ravens needed 9 plays to reach the San Diego 21-yard line, and then Tucker hit the game-winner. The Chargers earned a 16-13 halftime lead on a pair of Rivers' TD throws (9 yards to WR Malcom Floyd and 13 yards to WR Keenan Allen) and a 42-yard Lambo field goal. Baltimore's points came on a 3-yard Flacco-to-**TE Crockett Gillmore** TD toss and 2 Tucker FGs (48 and 29 yards). After another 48-yard Tucker FG to tie the game at 16 in the third quarter, Rivers found a wide-open Floyd for a 70-yard scoring play, giving the Chargers a 23-16 lead. The Ravens lost leading **WR Steve Smith Sr.** for the season with an Achilles tear in the third quarter. Smith Sr. left the game with 5 catches for 82 yards, but did move into 10th on the NFL's all-time receiving chart (13,932), passing Hall of Famer Cris Carter (13,899) on the prestigious list. The game marked the Ravens' 100th victory at M&T Bank Stadium, a venue that first opened in 1998.

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



**QB Joe Flacco - 2012
Super Bowl XLVII MVP**

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

THREE-STRAIGHT TOP 3s

In 2014, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 5 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that is based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. In 2013, Gosselin also ranked the Ravens' unit No. 5, and in 2012, he awarded them the No. 2 spot (behind Minnesota).

RAVENS THRIVE W/ ROSBURG



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 36-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008.

- Since 2011, Baltimore has 7 total kick return TDs (3 PR & 4 KOR), tying (Den. & Min.) for the NFL's most.

- In 2014, **P Sam Koch** produced the NFL's No. 3 gross average (47.4) and No. 1 net average (43.3), setting the Ravens' single-season records for each. Dating back to 2014, Koch's 48.1 gross average and 44.1 net average both rank No. 1 in the NFL.

- Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's second-most FGs (116) since entering the league in 2012. "Tuck" has connected on 116 of 130 FGAs to post an 89.2 success rate, the second-best mark in league history. He was 29-of-34 (84.4%) in 2014, with his 5 misses coming from 54, 54, 55, 57 & 64 (blocked). In 2013, Tucker set franchise records in FGs made (38) and FGs attempted (41). Going 38-of-41 on FGAs, he produced a franchise-record 140 points.

- In 2012's Super Bowl season, the Ravens' ST units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's Week 9 game at Pittsburgh, Jones added another 108-yard KOR-TD to his stellar resume and now has 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards during his career.)

- Impressively, Baltimore has ranked in the NFL's Top 5 in KOR average four times over the past seven seasons.

- Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with both the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

- Four Ravens players have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012) and **K Justin Tucker** (2013).

A STRONG RETURN

Since 2008, when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore owns the NFL's No. 1 KOR average (25.4).

COORDINATORS NOTES

TRESTMAN TAKES THE "O"



Marc Trestman was hired as the Ravens' offensive coordinator on Jan. 20, replacing Gary Kubiak. Trestman, the former Chicago Bears' head coach (2013-14), is a 31-year coaching veteran who has 20 years of NFL coaching experience, including eight as an offensive coordinator (see chart below).

During his time in the NFL, he has helped teams to eight playoff appearances, two conference championship games and a Super Bowl berth (XXXVII as offensive coordinator of the Raiders).

- In the five seasons prior to his Chicago arrival, Trestman was a head coach in the Canadian Football League, leading the Montreal Alouettes to back-to-back Grey Cup Championships in 2009 and 2010. He was named the CFL's Coach of the Year in 2009.
- In its first year (2013) under Trestman, Chicago's "O" posted several records by gaining a franchise-best 6,109 net yards. The 2013 Bears also finished second in team history with 445 points.

Super Bowl XLVII MVP **QB Joe Flacco** was masterful during the Ravens' 2012 playoff run, completing 73 of 126 passes for 1,140 yards, 11 TDs and 0 INTs to produce a 117.2 passer rating. Flacco joined Hall of Fame QB Joe Montana (1989) as the only players to produce 11 TDs and 0 INTs during an NFL postseason.

- In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.
- In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.

- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 24 career postseason TD passes, the most in a player's first seven seasons in NFL playoff history.

J. SMITH: A STANDOUT CB



CB Jimmy Smith, one of the NFL's top cornerbacks and the Ravens' 2011 first-round pick, suffered a foot injury last season in Week 8 at Cincy and was placed on Injured Reserve for the rest of the year. Rarely targeted last season, Smith finished with 8 PD, 28 tackles and 1 INT in eight games.

- This past April, the Ravens signed Smith to a four-year contract extension, locking him up to a long-term deal before he entered the final year of his rookie contract. (Smith is now signed through 2019.)
- Smith has been outstanding over the past few seasons. In 2013, he had 16 passes defended (third on the team), adding 2 INTs, 2 FFs and 58 tackles in his first year as a regular starter for the club.
- In Week 1 at Denver this season, Smith had a 24-yard INT-TD, his first-career score and sixth-career pick. He also led the team with 8 tackles.

- ✓ **CB Jimmy Smith** is one of six players (Kwon Alexander, Adam Jones, Reshad Jones, Dwight Lowery & Tyrann Mathieu) to post at least 35 tackles, 2 INTs, 5 PD and 1 sack in 2015. Smith had a pick-6 in Week 1 at Den. (first-career TD) and an end zone INT vs. Cincy in Week 3.

In the 2012 Week 10 win over Oakland, **P Sam Koch** scored his first-career TD on a fake FG in the third quarter, scampering 7 yards for the score in the Ravens' 55-20 victory.

In 2014's Week 2 win vs. Pit., **P Sam Koch** passed OLB Jarret Johnson (129 games from 2003-11) for the longest streak (now 152 games) in Ravens history. Koch has not missed a game in his NFL career.

STARTS UP FRONT FOR "O"

In 2015, the Ravens returned their entire starting offensive line from 2014, marking the first time in team history that all five starters reunited in the trenches. In 2014, Baltimore's O-line unit was masterful. Here are a few notes about the standout group:

- Permitted just 19 sacks in 2014, the second fewest in team history (17 in 2006) and in the NFL (Denver, 17).
- The unit helped protect **QB Joe Flacco**, who posted a career best in passing yards (3,986) and TD passes (27) in 2014.
- In 2014, **RB Justin Forsett** produced a career-high 1,266 rushing yards (NFL's fifth most) and led the league with a team-record 17 rushes of 20-plus yards, earning his first Pro Bowl. This season, Forsett's 562 rushing yards rank 10th entering Week 10.
- According to STATS, the Ravens' O-line posted a 72.1 "production index" score in 2014, the NFL's fourth-best mark.
- The Ravens have allowed just .036 sacks per pass play since 2014, ranking as the NFL's second-best figure (Denver, .032).

JUST FOR KICKS



Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker** ranks as the NFL's second-most accurate kicker of all time. He's connected on 116 of 130 FGAs to produce an 89.2 success rate.

- In 2013, he made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most.

Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

- In addition to his 2013 Pro Bowl, Tucker was named Special Teams Player of the Month (November) and AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times in 2013. In 2014, he was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week (Week 3) and Month (November).

- Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's fifth-longest streak of all time.

- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and were a single-game NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.

- Tuck has earned two AFC Player of the Week honors in 2015 (Week 4 at Pit. & Week 8 vs. SD, both contests in which he hit game-winners).

- He is now 47-of-52 during his career when the Ravens are losing a game, and he's 34-of-37 when Baltimore is down by 7 points or less. The Pro Bowler is 23-of-28 in the last 2 minutes of a half during his career, and he's 43-of-47 in the fourth quarter.

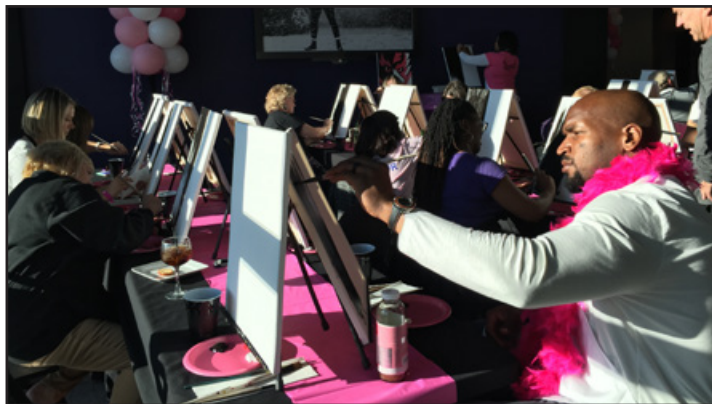

**JOHN HARBAUGH'S MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: NOV. 9**

Opening statement: "Hey guys, good to see everybody – long time no see. We have [senior vice president of public and community relations] Kevin Byrne back from hip surgery. [Vice president of public relations] Chad [Steele], you got me, man. Chad Steele told me the day of Kevin's hip surgery that, that night Kevin was on the treadmill, and I believed it knowing Kevin. *(laughter)* You got me. So, we had the guys back. Everybody was back safe and sound, and we went to work today with meetings and did some field work there. I guess [there are] two announcements to make: Brent Urban ... Well, one announcement and one non-announcement: Brent Urban is back practicing this week. The non-announcement is I don't have any news on Dennis Pitta until Wednesday when we'll know for sure. That's our last day to make a determination, and I don't have an announcement until Wednesday on that."

You've always had a very unshakeable faith in your team and in your coaches no matter if the record is good or bad. As you get back to work with a home-heavy schedule in front of you, can you make the playoffs? *(Joe Platania)* "Of course we can. We're planning on it. We're very optimistic about what's in front of us, our future. [We] love our players, love the way they work, love the enthusiasm that they had today coming back and getting ready for Jacksonville. We'll take it one day at a time, one game at a time."

Are you encouraging that kind of talk from your players, because there were a lot of guys talking about that inside the locker room already today? They were talking the "P" word and even some guys talking about running the table. There were other guys just saying, "Hey, one game at a time. Like you said, we just want to go 1-0 this week." So, it was varying opinions. *(Jerry Coleman)* "I don't really encourage or discourage talk, so to speak, as you asked the question that way. They can say whatever they want and whatever they think. Our guys say what they think. They can say what they think. Everybody understands it's one week at a time. All of our guys understand that this is the game that matters. We need to be 1-0 this week, and we have a lot of 1-0's in front of us that we have to take care of before that stuff can be reality. Really, it's conversation for a later date. We have to earn our way to have that conversation, for sure. But I expect our guys to have high expectations. The standard here has been high. We've set a high bar here for a long time, and we're proud of that. We have high expectations, so we're not going to let those expectations go. We're not pleased with where we are – just like the fans aren't pleased, coaches aren't pleased, players aren't pleased. Nobody in the organization is pleased with where we're at, and we're very determined to turn it around."

Do you look at it as you felt before you went into the bye – you're at the exact midpoint. You can't forget about 2-6, but do you maybe feel you're starting anew here with the final eight games, and it's almost a new season, as it were? *(Dave Ginsberg)* "You can look at it that way. The season does split in half, it splits in quarters – all those ways of looking at it is part of it. Like we said, we have challenges every single week. Every single game writes its own story. This is a big game this week. It's an opportunity, and we just have to focus on the task at hand."

John, DE Brent Urban's situation, is that something ... Is he a guy that you have to monitor closely, because he hasn't played a whole lot of football in the last two years, or do you think he's a guy that can be on the field in game action relatively soon? *(Jeff Zrebiec)* "I think both are possibilities. You make a good point. We're going to have to monitor him really closely, because as you said, he hasn't played a lot of football in the last couple years. He has played maybe three or four weeks of training camp since he got here two years ago, so these are going to be really valuable practices for him. We'll have to see where he's at – how he's playing, how he's moving, how the bicep responds to what he's doing out there – and try to make a determination about whether he can help us or not. We have a maximum 21 days to determine that. If he can help us be better, we'll bring him up. If he can't – because of not being ready – then we'll have to put him on IR [Injured Reserve]."

John, I know running the football has always been a big part of the Ravens' philosophy. I was curious how you assess how you guys have run the football so far this year, and moving forward, might it be more important to run better, A) without WR Steve Smith Sr. and B) the weather turning the way it probably will? *(Cliff Brown)* "That's all true. You're right. We've been committed to running the ball. We can run the ball better, more effectively – yards per carry, yards per gain. People have determined that it is important to stop the run against us, and they've committed a lot of resources to doing that defensively, and we have to counterpunch that. We have to have an answer for that, and those are things that we understand. We can run the ball better, but we can also protect our run better by making people pay for over-committing to stopping it. That's going to be something that we're going to pay attention to trying to do."

About a month ago, you said DT Timmy Jernigan was still getting his practice feet under him and getting the effort to where you guys wanted it to be full time. Do you feel like he's a player in the second half that can build on that and be the guy you thought he was going to be? *(Jon Meoli)* "I do. I think he has really practiced well for the last month, and he has played well. He's consistently better every single week. He's playing with a lot of energy. He's really flying around. We have high expectations for Timmy in the second half of the season."

Along those same lines, S Terrence Brooks, I know he has been backed up by the injuries, but what have you seen from him growth-wise on the field that says he can have a bigger second half? *(Ryan Mink)* "That's another guy to watch. He's really practicing fast. Every time



he gets going, it seems like something knocks him back, injury-wise, just like it did three weeks ago. Now, last week he practiced really well. He's a guy that has a chance. He can cover ground back there. He has good ball skills. He's a hitter. He's a high draft pick. He's a guy that can really help us."

Looking at Jacksonville – I don't know how much tape you've seen of them – but two big receivers with WR Allen Robinson and WR Allen Hurns. What type of matchup challenges do they present? (Todd Karpovich) "You're right. Both those guys – Robinson and Hurns – are very similar. They're kind of similar-sized guys. Robinson is a little bigger. They're [big] catch-radius guys. They're strong-to-the-ball guys, good body-control guys. They're guys that can make catches against you. We're going to have to be strong in our coverage around those guys. Obviously, Jimmy [Smith is] a matchup there. 'Webby' [Lardarius Webb] is a little bit different. They create some matchup problems for us. The other issue is Marqise Lee. We expect him to be back this week, and he's the fast guy. We really loved him coming out of SC [Southern California]. He's their slot receiver, their speed guy. They have a lot of talent. They have two tight ends that, obviously, are very good pass-receiving threats as well. The young back, T.J. Yeldon, is really doing a good job. [Toby] Gerhart, of course – the old Stanford guy ... Two [seasons] ago, we played him when he was with Minnesota. He had a couple runs on us. We don't forget those things."

John, you mentioned the young receivers that Jacksonville has; how difficult is it developing wide receivers, translating the college game to the pro game? Is that still one of the tougher transitions as far as developing young guys? (Jamison Hensley) "[It is] a great question. It's a little more challenging now because the style of the offenses are so much different. Some of the pro offenses actually run the college scheme, and [there are] a limited number of routes in their offense. But, most of us are running a much more diverse route tree, and you don't always know if those guys are going to be able to run the routes or even if they're going to really be able to sort out the assignment, especially if you move them to multiple positions. So, some guys make it, and some guys don't. Some guys, it turns out, can't figure it out or can't really run all the routes. And other guys, who you might not have anticipated, just blossom because you didn't always see them doing it in college. So, it's probably a little tougher than it used to be because the offenses are a little different."

It may have been a few weeks since you've been asked, but any news regarding WR Breshad Perriman and is there a chance that he could be practicing soon? And if not, the alternative, maybe, just shutting him down because he hasn't played at all at any NFL-speed level since training camp? (Jerry Coleman) "I don't have any news on that, and he [Breshad Perriman] has been rehabbing. I expect to get some information on that really soon. To me, as you said, the clock is ticking. If he can't get out there and practice soon ... I'd love to get four games out of him, just so you can see him and he can develop for four games. But that means now we need four weeks of getting him ready to play four games, and I haven't been told that he's going to practice this week. So, I think that's a conversation that the doctors and [general manager and executive vice president] Ozzie [Newsome] need to have, and we need to make a determination on that real soon."

With you guys bringing in so many young wide receivers, obviously, with the injury to WRs Michael Campanaro and Steve Smith Sr., are you guys taking it as a "let's evaluate all these young kids" [approach] to see who might be on the roster next year? (Matthew Stevens) "No. We're trying to win games this year. I don't think there's any doubt that's part of it; that's always in the back of your mind, but we're bringing guys in to win. We really like what Chris Givens has done for us, a guy we brought in three weeks ago. [We are] excited about Joe Morgan being a part of what we're doing. The guys that we have, I'm excited about, and we think they can win for us."

I know you said a decision won't be made until Wednesday, but to you, did TE Dennis Pitta look free and fluid and just look pretty good in practice the last couple weeks? (Jeff Zrebiec) "He [Dennis Pitta] did look good in practice. We had a tough time covering him. He was doing stuff from the 'look' team and made a bunch of plays out there and just kind of looked like his old self out there. But, don't construe that as saying that he's ready to go, because it's not about that. It's going to be about he and the doctors ... The doctors are going to take a hard look at that and decide – help him decide – 'Is this really safe?' And it's going to be based on how the hip is responding to the practices. Dennis is going to play if he can; there's no doubt in my mind, based on what I've talked to him. If it's safe and he feels like he can get out there and the hip is responding well, he's going to play. And if it's not safe, then he's not going to play. It's really going to be ... It's not a black-and-white decision, but this is a decision he has to make with the doctors. But he wants to play. It's just a matter of whether it's going to be safe or not, and that was what this three-week period was for. So, I'm sure tomorrow – it is an off day – we'll sit down have a pow-wow on it and figure out if that's what we're going to do and what the doctors and he say is the best thing."
