# CHICAGO BEARS vs. BALTIMORE RAVENS

Week 6 — Sunday, Oct. 15, 2017 1 p.m. ET — M&T Bank Stadium (71,008)

## JUST THE FACTS

- The Baltimore Ravens (3-2) and Chicago Bears (1-4) square off this Sunday (Oct. 15) in a 1 p.m. contest at M&T Bank Stadium. This marks the Ravens' first game against an NFC foe this season, while Chicago has already beaten the Steelers, 23-17, in overtime during a Week 3 game at Soldier Field.
- The Bears and Ravens meet for the sixth time ever, with Chicago owning a 3-2 series lead. Baltimore last battled the Bears in 2013, when Chicago won a 23-20 overtime contest in the Windy City. Both Ravens' victories in the series were played in Baltimore.
- Last Sunday, Baltimore captured a 30-17 win at Oakland behind a strong all-around team effort. The Ravens limited the Raiders to 245 yards, adding 3 sacks and 1 FR-TD (CB Jimmy Smith). On offense, Baltimore tallied 365 yards, including 143 rushing, with 2 ground TDs (TE Vince Mayle & RB Javorius Allen). QB Joe Flacco was not sacked (nor did he throw an INT), with the signal caller completing 19 of 26 passes for 222 yards, including 3 for 133 to WR Mike Wallace. K Justin Tucker added 3 FGs in the win, scoring the 700th point of his career.
- In their 22nd year of existence, the Ravens have earned a playoff berth in six of the past nine full seasons. Since head coach **John Harbaugh**'s arrival in 2008, Baltimore has posted the NFL's fourthmost total victories (98), won the league's second-most playoff games (10), advanced to an impressive three AFC Championship contests, and in 2012, captured the World Championship in SB XLVII.

#### INJURY UPDATE



## SPOTLIGHT: MICHAEL PIERCE

Why did you choose to sign with the Ravens as an undrafted free agent in 2016? "They flew me out for a pre-draft visit and basically showed me their scheme

and the kind of players they had here. They showed me Brandon [Williams] and the kind of nose guards they have. Even being from Alabama, I knew the lineage and the types of guys they have had on the D-line in Baltimore. To have the coaches spend time with me and show me how I could fit in their scheme really went a long way."

What is the strangest encounter you have had with a fan? "I was at the grocery store Wegmans, and I was being followed by a guy. I guess he was an avid lifter. I'm shopping, and I just see this guy following behind me picking up everything I'm picking up. I turn around and say, 'How are you doing?' He was like, 'I'm a big fan of the Ravens! I want to get as strong as you and Brandon [Williams]. What do you guys eat? Can I see your grocery list?' He followed me around the whole store and bought everything I did. It was odd, but kind of cool."

**Do you collect anything?** "I collect jerseys. I bought a Carmelo [Anthony] jersey at a signing auction, I have a [Kristaps] Porzingis jersey, and I just recently bought a Steph Curry jersey."

What's the weirdest thing you have ever eaten? "I went to someone's house, and they had raccoon, so I tried that. It wasn't for me. It's a backwoods specialty, but I couldn't get down with it."

Compare you and DT Brandon Williams to a non-football duo: "Mike [Greenberg] and Mike [Golic] from 'Mike & Mike' on ESPN. You have one animated guy in Golic and a super chill guy in Greenberg. Brandon is obviously the super animated guy, while I'm the chill guy. You put us together, and we are having a great time and constantly laughing."

**Favorite NFL player to watch growing up:** "Vince Wilfork. He played in Dean's [Pees] scheme, and the dude was a monster. I pray he goes to the Hall of Fame. He was one of the best nose guards ever."

What would you like to do after your playing career? "I would like to be a college athletic director. I've always loved sports. I want to make an impact on people's lives, not necessarily in coaching, but changing an entire program and making an impact on kids."

## RAVENS NEAR 200TH VICTORY

The Baltimore Ravens franchise, in its 22nd season of existence, is one win shy of reaching 200 total victories. Since coming to Baltimore in 1996, the Ravens have posted 15 playoff wins (the NFL's fourth most) and 184 regular season victories (the league's eighth most). With a win against Chicago, Baltimore can become just the seventh NFL team to win 200 total games since 1996.

## QUOTH THE RAVENS



## WR JEREMY MACLIN ON THE RAVENS' OFFENSE STARTING FAST AND THE DOMINANT O-LINE PERFORMANCE IN THE WIN AT OAKLAND:

"I think guys came out with a mindset that we wanted to dominate the game and make a statement, and I think we did that from the start. I think the offensive line played great — both in the run and the pass game. I thought they dominated. Everything starts up front. Anytime you keep Joe [Flacco] clean and anytime you open up lanes for those running backs, we like our chances."

## Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on rookie first-round pick CB Marlon Humphrey:

"He is fast, physical, big, he uses his hands, and he is into the gameplan. He has all those things that you want a DB to possess. I think that he is just a really good player, a really good talent, and I think we have done a good job of bringing him along and not throwing him in there too fast. Each week, he gets more and more plays, and now he has himself in a little bit of a rotation-type thing."

#### QB Joe Flacco on last week's 30-17 win at Oakland:

"Every win is big. [The Oakland win] is a little more significant, just because what it does for the mentality and confidence of the football team, and what the other side, what not winning, would have done to the mentality of the football team. It doesn't matter when you lose them, necessarily, or when you win them, you just have to have the right amount of wins at the end. But as far as the mentality of this football team and confidence of our offense, of our defense, I think it will definitely go a little bit longer than a normal win."

## John Harbaugh on QB Joe Flacco handling pressure well and playing strong in last week's win at Oakland:

"Joe is always going to do that. He is going to try to put together the best game he can every week. You're not always going to have your best game, but hey, we want to string together as many good games as we can. I was happy for Joe, because there is pressure in that position, and he handles it so well, which we are always very proud of."

## QB Joe Flacco on confidence and being resilient:

"I have confidence in who I am as a player and a person, and I have confidence in our football team. So I'm never going to waver. I may not play well one week, but it's not going to change who I am."

## Special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on RB Alex Collins' ability to return kicks:

"He's a hard-running, downhill player. He's able to read blocks. We think he can make big plays, just like on offense. You see it when he has the ball in his hands. He's exciting to watch."

## S Eric Weddle on CB Brandon Carr, who will start his 150th-consecutive game this Sunday:

"I love everything about Brandon – his professionalism, his work ethic, his accountability. A lot of people take for granted a guy like Brandon, just the consistency, how good he is. He's just solid. You know what you're going to get every day from him. There's a reason guys play a lot of years in this league. Look at the way he conducts himself. It's not just about talent. It's about a lot of different factors."

## Browns T Joe Thomas on OLB Terrell Suggs, who has 4 sacks through five games:

"Suggs is always one of the greatest challenges that I face every year, and it is amazing in his 15th NFL season that he still is doing it as well as he did when he was in his sixth or seventh season. I think he is one of the greats of all time, not only for the Ravens, but at his position."

## Offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg on G/T James Hurst, who can play LT, RT, RG and LG:

"He is a natural football player. He has really worked hard to get himself to this point. This is a man that can play one of any four spots and do a really good job, because he is natural. He is a natural football player. He is smart. He is a hard worker — all of those things. It has been seamless for him. He has been at right tackle, left tackle, left guard. He could play right guard at the drop of a hat. He is a valuable member of our squad."

# Head coach John Harbaugh on WR Mike Wallace, who posted 133 receiving yards on 3 catches in last week's 30-17 win at Oakland:

"From a coaching perspective, this is a really good football player. This is the guy that changes the face of our offense dramatically. He adds an element that is just very important in the National Football League. He's a complete receiver. He has speed. He's a big-play-threat guy; he has been throughout his career. He's a player that can run all the routes. He's a blocker, and he's experienced."

- Bears head equipment manager **Tony Medlin** is the brother of Ravens assistant certified athletic trainer, **Ron Medlin**.
- Bears assistant defensive backs coach **Roy Anderson** served as a defensive assistant for Baltimore from 2005-11.
- Ravens **DT Kapron Lewis-Moore** (practice squad) spent the 2017 offseason and training camp with Chicago.
- Ravens **QB Josh Woodrum** (practice squad) spent part of 2016 on the Bears' practice squad.
- Ravens offensive assistant **Andy Bischoff** (tight ends, 2013-14), offensive assistant/QBs coach **Craig Ver Steeg** (offensive assistant/quality control, 1996) and specialists coach **Randy Brown** (kicking consultant, 1996-1998) all spent time on Chicago's coaching staff.

## **WEEK 5 RECAP AT OAKLAND**

#### RAVENS 30, RAIDERS 17 • WEEK 5, OCT. 8 • OAKLAND-ALAMEDA COUNTY COLISEUM

The Ravens opened a 21-3 early second-quarter lead on their way to an impressive 30-17 win in Oakland. The victory stopped a two-game Baltimore losing streak and put the Ravens in a first-place tie with Pittsburgh (both 3-2) in the AFC North. **QB Joe Flacco** set the tone for the day when he hit **WR Mike Wallace** with a 52-yard bolt on the Ravens' first offensive play of the game. Four snaps later, **TE Vince Mayle** scored on a 2-yard sweep to give the Ravens a 7-0 lead. On the following series, **CB Jimmy Smith** picked up a TE Jared Cook fumble, caused by **LB Patrick Onwuasor**, and raced 47 yards for a 14-0 lead in the game's first four minutes. After K Giorgio Tavecchio's 32-yard FG, the Ravens produced a 15-play, 75-yard TD drive that finished with a **RB Javorius Allen** 1-yard TD (21-3). After QB E.J. Manuel, who replaced the injured QB Derek Carr, found WR Michael Crabtree for a 41-yard TD, Baltimore produced another long drive (8 plays) that ended with a 22-yard **K Justin Tucker** FG, producing a 24-10 halftime score. Oakland stormed back in the third quarter to get within 7 (24-17) on a 3-yard RB Marshawn Lynch TD. Once again, the Ravens responded with an important scoring series that ended with a 21-yard Tucker FG to put the lead back at 10 (27-17) early in the final quarter. Tucker then made the final margin 13 with a 44-yard FG with 2:24 remaining in the contest. Flacco's efficient outing included 19 completions on 26 attempts for 222 yards, including 3 to Wallace for 133 yards. Allen rushed 21 times for 73 yards, while **RB Alex Collins** produced 55 yards on 12 carries. The Ravens limited Lynch to 43 yards on 12 rushes. Crabtree led the Raiders with 6 receptions for 82, while Manuel was 13-of-26 for 159 yards. Baltimore had only 1 penalty for the game.

LB Ray Lewis - 2000 Super Bowl XXXV MVP

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing firsthalf performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.



## THE HARBAUGH FILE

John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 & 2014) of his nine full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl title. Under his guidance, the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012).

#### Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

- The Ravens are one of seven teams with at least six playoff berths in the past nine seasons (2008-16): GB (8), NE (8), Bal. (6), Cin. (6), Ind. (6), Pit. (6) & Sea. (6).
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since 2008 rank second only to New England's 11.
- "Harbs" is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim (formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.
- Harbaugh is the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh owns the second-most playoff wins (10, tied) by a coach in his first nine seasons (since the 1970 merger).
- With the Ravens' 2014 playoff berth, Harbaugh became one of eight coaches in NFL history to make the postseason in six of their first seven seasons coaching.
- For coaches to make the playoffs in at least six of their first nine years, "Harbs" is one of five active coaches to do so (Pete Carroll, Mike McCarthy, Andy Reid & Mike Tomlin).
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.

## ROSBURG LEADS RAVENS SPECIALISTS

SEASONS RAVENS: 10TH NFL: 17TH Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg** has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Below are several standout notes about the coach and his successful group of specialists:

#### SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned eight combined Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013 & 2016), LS Morgan Cox (2015 & 2016) and P Sam Koch (2015).

#### PRIME KICKER & PUNTER

• Two-time Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (175) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 89.3% career success mark, "Tuck" is the second-most accurate kicker in league history (175-of-196 on FGAs). Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch**'s 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL that season, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages, both career highs and Ravens records.

#### RAVENS' BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

#### Rosburg's Past

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in *The Dallas Morning News*' annual comprehensive report.

Since 2014, the Ravens have produced the NFL's most blocked kicks (12), including an NFL-high 4 (tied, Mia.) in 2016.

A 23-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia Eagles (2004-12) and San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000).

#### FIVE PRO BOWLERS

• Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.

#### 1997-2000: 49ers - Offensive Coordinator/QBs Coach

## PEES A PREMIER DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Defensive coordinator **Dean Pees** led the Ravens' seventh-ranked defense (322.1 ypg) in 2016, marking the sixth time a defense has finished in the NFL's Top 10 with Pees at the helm (despite only nine years of D.C. experience). Dating back to 1990 (the past 27 seasons), Pees ranks first (tied, Jim Bates) in percentage of Top 10 finishes (.667) as a defensive coordinator.

The Ravens' defense dominated in Week 1's 20-0 win over Cincy:

- ✓ It marked the fourth time in team history the Ravens tallied 5 sacks and forced 5 turnovers in a game (last was 9/17/06 vs. Oak., with 6 QB drops, 3 INTs & 2 fumbles).
- ✓ For the first time in franchise history, Baltimore produced 5 sacks and 4 INTs in a single game.
- Only 10 times in the past 10 seasons has an NFL team posted 5 sacks and 4 interceptions in a game.
- ✓ The performance marked the 18th time in Ravens history the defense forced 5 turnovers. (The Ravens then added a 19th time in Week 2's 24-10 victory over Cleveland.)



- The Ravens are 12-3 at home all time against teams from the *West Coast* (Oak. 5-1, SD 3-1, SF 2-0 and Sea. 2-1).
- In the Ravens' history, Baltimore has hosted 17 games when the temperature was below 40 degrees. Impressively, the Ravens are 15-2 in these contests, winning 15 of the past 16.

## THE FRANCHISE QUARTERBACK

In 2016, QB Joe Flacco set a Ravens' single-season franchise record for passing yards (4,317), which also ranked as the NFL's seventh most (second in the AFC). Flacco now owns four of the Top 5 passing yards campaigns in team history. In 2016, he also set Baltimore's single-season completions record (436), breaking his previous record (362 in 2013).

Super Bowl XLVII MVP QB Joe Flacco was masterful during the Ravens' 2012 playoff run, completing 73 of 126 passes for 1,140 yards, 11 TDs and 0 INTs to produce a 117.2 passer rating. Flacco joined Hall of Fame QB Joe Montana (1989) as the only players to produce 11 TDs and 0 INTs during an NFL postseason.



"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter "S." He's debuted a "boomerang" punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a "changeup" of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

## A TREMENDOUS 2016

In 2016, All-Pro **K Justin Tucker** connected on 38 of 39 FGAs (lone miss was a block), posting the fifth-best percentage in NFL single-season history. In addition to making 35-straight FGs at one point (tied for fifth-best streak ever), here are several facts about his remarkable season, which is arguably the best ever by a kicker:

- ✓ Tucker's 38 FGs made ranked No. 1 in the NFL. He was also 27-of-27 on PATs. An NFL single-season record 24 of Tucker's 38 FGs made in 2016 came from 40 yards or beyond.
- ✓ Tucker's 10 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They tie (Blair Walsh, 2012) for the most in NFL history. (Tucker was a perfect 10-for-10 from 50 yards and out during the 2016 season.)
- ✓ Tucker's 141 points ranked second in the league only behind Atlanta's Matt Bryant (158).
- ✓ In Week 12 vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game. (These feats earned him AFC ST POW honors.)







## **PLAY 60 CHALLENGE**

To kick off the 10th annual NFL Play 60 Challenge, the Baltimore Ravens invited 12 youth to M&T Bank Stadium on Oct. 1 when the Ravens hosted the Pittsburgh Steelers. To celebrate the NFL's PLAY 60 Challenge, which encourages youth to be physically active for at least 60 minutes every day, the Ravens will host several events that coincide with the program throughout this season. In September, the team hosted its first PLAY 60 football clinic for athletes of all abilities when it partnered with Special Olympics Maryland. In partnership with the American Heart Association, the Ravens will also spend the season encouraging students at Carroll County and Baltimore County public elementary schools to get active every day over a four-week, incentive-based period. During this program, in-classroom tracking materials and individual student guides will be distributed to help students record their physical activity. To conclude the PLAY 60 Challenge, three participating schools that record the highest activity rates amongst their students will receive visits from some of their favorite Ravens players. Students who achieve specific benchmarks, set by the PLAY 60 program, will also have the opportunity to earn individual prizes and rewards. Top performers from participating schools will be recognized during a grand prize luncheon held at the Under Armour Performance Center in the spring of 2018.

Throughout the morning, they spoke to students about topics like building healthy relationships, bullying prevention and controlling emotions. Since its 2016 debut, Character Playbook has helped more than 1,700 students in over 25 schools in the Baltimore-Metropolitan area learn how to cultivate and maintain healthy relationships.

## JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 6

**Opening statement:** "Good to see everybody – appreciate you guys being here. Obviously, we've studied hard, and we're happy with the outcome. We're on to Chicago. So, what do you have?"

Yesterday, you said it was a good win, but every win is a win. But, QB Joe Flacco was talking about the fact how [the win] was a confidence builder for this team, and particularly, the offense. Is there some credence to that, in terms of a win providing confidence for team that had lost two straight? (David Ginsburg) "What I talked about last week regarding that was [that] it's hard to have confidence if you're not doing anything to generate confidence. It's one thing to believe – and you have to believe, a lot of times, on the unseen. That's what faith is. But in terms of confidence in athletic ability, there's something in going out there and doing it. So, that's what Joe is probably referring to."

Was the team aware of the Steelers situation? Did you guys scoreboard watch at all or pay attention to any of that? (Jerry Coleman) "I don't know. I heard about it after our game."

As far as the way the division is shaping up, everyone thought that the Steelers coming into Baltimore, beats them, and they have total control of the division. Now, you're tied for first place with them. Your message to the guys was what? (Jerry Coleman) "We don't listen to what everyone says; we never do. You say 'everyone,' but it wasn't us. We all understood and said last week that it's a week-to-week league, a week-to-week sport. Things change in a week, so nothing has really changed that way."

How happy were you with the offensive line play yesterday? (Stan Charles) "[I was] very happy with the offensive line play. They played very well, thank you. They stepped up. The pass protection, I thought, we had a very good pass protection plan. They have three very good end and inside pass rushers, four – if you count [Mario] Edwards, who is more of an always inside guy. Then, some of those guys move around, they switch sides. Our coaches did an excellent job of game-planning and setting up different types of protections to keep them off-balance. Our guys executed very well. The offensive line, the tight ends and the running backs all did a very good job."

You lost RB Terrance West yesterday. Do you have a plan to fill that position? (Peter Schmuck) "We do. We have to see if we can execute it, right now, in terms of what we're going to do, who we're going to look at. We'll just wait until we know. I don't want to start putting the plans out there until we know if we can pull it off."

Is there any kind of timetable for RB Terrance West (Jamison Hensley) "It's already been reported, so just go with that. That's out there. We'll just leave it at that." (Reporter: "Anything other than the report?") "I'm not changing my policy; my policy hasn't changed."

You did say you play a doctor at press conferences. Do you have any word, "Dr. Harbaugh," on DT Brandon Williams? (Jerry Coleman) "No. I have no information." (laughter)

The things that QB Joe Flacco was saying about confidence – they're ethereal, they're not definable. How much of what happened yesterday was just flat-out executing well? Is the whole thing about confidence a cliché? (Peter Schmuck) "Well yes, [it's] indefinable. Is it eth-E-real? E-re-ther-eal? I think I know how it's spelled; I'm a good speller, but I'm not a good pronouncer, sometimes." (Reporter: "How do you spell it?") "I'm going to say it's: e-t-h-e-r-e-a-l." (Reporter: "That's it.") "Man! I won the sixth-grade spelling bee – for the record. But, I think you're right. To me, it's doing, it's going out and executing. All that other stuff, to me, is interesting corner-of-the-bar conversation. To me, as a coach, you go by what you see; and what you see is what you evaluate and what matters; and what you see is what you attack, in terms of what you want to improve, things you chose to do or include in the next gameplan, or don't include. It's based on what you see. Of course, it's also based on what you believe your players are capable of doing going forward, and what they think, too. We have great conversations with those guys. So, that part of it plays in. But confidence is something that's just hard to define. I think you know it when you see it, and it's important to have it. I believe if we execute well, we're going to be very confident."

The offense had a great half. I think the first half started, they scored on three out of their four drives. Then you had mentioned, they come down the first two drives and they were three-and-outs. Is there something, in particular, that kind of got you out of that two-drive lull? Adjustments you may have made? (Jeff Zrebiec) "Well, you were there. It was the plays that didn't work. We didn't get yards on those plays; we ended in third-and-long, I think, twice in a row, and our first- and second-down plays didn't net



us anything. Now, we can look at all those particular plays and dissect them – which we certainly do – and we can go through that. But the bottom line is that they didn't work, and we were third-and-long, and that's why you're three-and-out. It comes back to that execution part of it."

It looks like DT Willie Henry is starting to emerge. When you watch the tape, what do you see him doing now? (Ryan Mink) "I see him playing defensive tackle very well. He's doing a good job. Do you want me to go through all the different things that the defensive tackle does?" (Reporter: "No; what is he doing well, right now, to emerge?") "He's playing defensive tackle really well. He's knocking people back, he's getting off blocks and making tackles, and he's rushing the passer. He's playing well. Now, he's not 100 percent. He'll look at a couple of his plays, we will too, and he and I will talk about a couple plays where he got pushed back or pushed past or something like that. Screens, he knows I've been getting him about how he plays screens a little bit. So, he'll pick that up. He stayed onside this week – which was big, because they tried to get him again. But, he was against a really good left guard a lot of times. He held his own – more than held his own – a number of times. You guys saw it in the game. I was really proud of the way he played and the way he stepped up."

Were you pleased with the way the number of penalties have decreased? Was the one penalty legit? (Jerry Coleman) "The one penalty was clearly legit. We weren't lined up. Yes, I was happy about it."

Do you think WR Breshad Perriman is capable of breaking out of where he is right now? (Stan Charles) "Of course. If we didn't think he was capable of being a topnotch receiver ... That goes for any player, really. If you don't think they can do it, you're not going to have them around. We don't keep guys around for charitable reasons. This is a business, and this is world-class competition. He's here to make plays. He made a huge play on that third-down — that drive was a big drive. That drive flipped the momentum back. So, if we're dwelling on the two drives we didn't get, well, let's dwell on that drive for a minute. Because they scored, got within one score, and we had two big passes in that drive: one to Mike [Wallace] and one to Breshad. Breshad made a diving catch on a third-and-11, so we're back in third-and-long again, and he makes a play. That's what you look for, and we want to see more of that. When you see that a guy can do it, then you feel like he can do it consistently. That's what he has to prove now. He'll tell you, 'Give me more chances,' and I'll say, 'Earn more chances.' He did that in this last game. That was good to see."

Do you like the way RB Alex Collins ran and held the ball? It seemed like the fumbling wasn't an issue at all or that he even thought about it. (*David Ginsburg*) "I think you're right. I think he was thinking about it, and that is why it didn't seem like it was. He was very conscious of his technique, and he did a good job of it. That is important. That is non-negotiable."

Along those lines, no turnovers. Obviously that is the formula. How pleased were you with the fact that you guys played a completely clean game? (David Ginsburg) "To that point, we didn't take any steps back during the game. We had some negative-yard plays, [but] not as many as we have had in the last two games. That was one emphasis. We wanted to minimize the negative-yardage plays as much as we could, and that got better. We wanted to eliminate the turnovers. We wanted to get some turnovers, and we got the touchdown; that was a big one. We wanted to continue to play clean football as much as we could with the penalties. You can't control that 100 percent. Usually as a coach, you know the ones you are concerned with and the ones you are not. To have only one penalty in the game, I thought was really a statement. Those are all moving in the right direction, but again, it is week-to-week. We have to put all our focus on this next game. There really are no trends. The only trend is the next game and getting ready for the next opponent."

Is there a benefit of being able to watch tonight [in the Chicago-Minnesota game] to see who figures to be at quarterback against you? (Stan Charles) "Normally on these Monday nights, I get home maybe at halftime and decide if I want to stay awake or not. Usually the answer is no. Sometimes if it is an AFC North team, you have to do it, or the Patriots or somebody like that. But this game we will be watching. I will get home in time to watch this one. I think all of Baltimore probably will. The real fans will be watching this game. The next two opponents we play [the Bears and the Vikings] will be out there."

With them playing tonight, does it give you an advantage because you have an extra day to prep for Chicago? (Ed Lee) "That is just the schedule. We play Monday night, we play Thursday night, whatever. I don't know."

I know when players are injured, you always try to say, "Next man up," and you want to keep moving forward. With the offensive line, you are dealing with multiple injuries. How difficult is it to put a cohesive offensive line when they really have not had many steps together as that group of five? (Jamison Hensley) "It just doesn't matter. It is not something we think about. It is not something we quantify. We don't waste any energy thinking about that. You just go and get ready for the next game."



In training camp, you talked a lot about finishing and about some of the things that didn't happen last year. Most people think about that in terms of the defense closing out when the other offense is coming back. Yesterday's game featured that last clock-killing drive where your offensive line had already played almost a full game and you guys got eight yards after eight yards. Just talk about that, in terms of what happened there and why they were so successful. (Peter Schmuck) "That is a great observation. Finishing is ... It is a three-phase event – finishing a game. For the offense to be able to get first downs in the fourth quarter when primarily you are running the ball, and they know you are going to run the ball ... Still, we were able to block them, and our [running] backs were able to find holes. Our backs ran north and south. They got their pads down. They got the extra two or three yards, which is kind of the key sometimes. If you can get three or four yards on the first one, and then you can get another three on the second one, now you can convert. It is a little tougher in four-minute to convert a third-and-eight, because you have to take a risk. That is not a risk you usually want to take, because you do not want to turn the ball over, and you are more happy or adept or comfortable just punting than you are just taking that risk. The running game came through when it had to. That just goes to show you that techniques were really good and the effort and tenacity, the physicality – it was definitely there. We were strong at the end of the game. That is a statement for our guys."

I think CB Jimmy Smith played four defensive snaps after the touchdown. How much easier is it to be selective with him and maybe put a eye on the big picture with the depth that you have added with CB Marlon Humphrey and CB Brandon Carr? You know that you want to have Jimmy out there, but maybe there is not going to be that major drop-off. (Luke Jones) "We just have guys that we can play. We are very good with the guys that we have. We want Jimmy out there. He is a topnotch corner. I think he is one of the best corners in football. I am a big Jimmy Smith fan. I think Jimmy will prove in the next couple years to be maybe the best, maybe the best. I think he has a chance to do that. I feel that strongly about Jimmy. To have other guys that can play ... Brandon Carr and Marlon Humphrey played well; [Lardarius] Webb is playing well. We have some other young guys that are working their way in there or getting healthy. I am pretty excited about the fact that we have some depth in the secondary."

What were your impressions of CB Marlon Humphrey? He really was going toe to toe with one of the great veteran receivers in the league, WR Michael Crabtree. They were talking a little bit of trash. (Stan Charles) "Yes. He didn't back down, did he? He did not back down. Crabtree is pretty special. We have had some experience with him, haven't we, in Baltimore? He is a great one. Marlon didn't back down. Marlon is confident. They got him on the three-stop nines or hitch [routes], if you want to call them that, versus press [coverage]. Marlon played him a certain way. That was really the plan. Hindsight being 20-20, I think we might have played that with a little different technique than we did and helped Marlon out a little bit. Those are great learning experiences."

Going back to CB Jimmy Smith, [do you mean] the potential to be the best Raven corner? Is that what you are referring to? (Jerry Coleman) "No, I am talking about the best in the league. I am not talking about history. I do not really think about history. I am talking about here, in the now – the present. That is for you to decide – who the best ever was – when you write your book. You can't write? Is that what you said?" (laughter)

Knowing that the most important thing was winning yesterday, if you could draw a formula, was that the Ravens' formula for victory? Getting out to a lead, strong defense when you needed it and running out the clock. (Jerry Coleman) "I don't know. The formula is going to be different every week. Getting a lead is always a good thing. That is no revelation. When you get the lead, you have to keep the lead. After you keep the lead, you try to extend the lead. That goes without saying. That is philosophy; that is football. That is what you do; you try to do that. It is probably true for every sport. But how that plays out is week-to-week."

Are the white cleats part of the formula? (Garrett Downing) "We will see. We will see. The guys liked them. They looked good, didn't they?"

Being a special teams guy, how cool was it to see TE/WR Vince Mayle score a touchdown, even though he has not played a whole lot on offense until to this point? (Luke Jones) "It was great. The guys were excited. Did you see the offensive line run over and pick him up and everything? They were happy for him. Vince is a serious dude. He takes it seriously. Sometimes I have to jab him a little bit and get him to crack a smile. He was all smiles after that. We had him in the gameplan; he was in there for some other things. He was actually a decoy on a run that we had, which worked out really well, and he blocked well. He did a good job. He played well."

How pleased are you with what you have seen from C Ryan Jensen so far this year? (Ryan Mink) "Pleased. Ryan has done a really good job. I thought he had his best game yesterday. He is who he is. You know the kind of style he plays with, and we appreciate that. He is very disciplined with it. He knows the offense, makes the calls. He is very smart. He is playing well, and we want him to continue to build on that."
