JUST THE FACTS

- Remaining in the thick of the AFC's playoff race, the Baltimore Ravens (8-6) host the Indianapolis Colts (3-11) in what is the first of two home games to close out the regular season. Winners in five of the past seven games (and four of the last five), Baltimore will clinch a seventh postseason appearance in the past 10 years with victories this Saturday and on Dec. 31 vs. the Cincinnati Bengals.
- The Ravens have won two of their past three games vs. Indianapolis, however, the Colts lead the all-time series, 8-3. (Indy also leads the postseason series by a 2-1 mark.) The Colts and Ravens last battled in 2014, when Indy emerged with a 20-13 win at Lucas Oil Stadium.
- Last Sunday at Cleveland, the Ravens prevailed with a 27-10 victory on the heels of another dominant defensive performance and the standout play of **QB Joe Flacco**. Baltimore forced 4 turnovers (2 INTs & 2 fumbles) – including a FR-TD by **DT Brandon Williams** off an **OLB Za'Darius Smith** strip-sack – while Flacco passed for a season-high 288 yards and 1 TD (he also rushed for another score). **WR Mike Wallace** produced a game-high 89 receiving yards on 6 catches (5.4 ypc). The Ravens did not turn the ball over, finishing +4 and adding to their NFL-best +17 turnover differential this season.
- The Ravens have earned a playoff berth in six of the past nine full seasons. Since **John Harbaugh's** arrival in 2008, Baltimore has posted the NFL's fourth-most total victories (103), won the league's second-most playoff games (10), advanced to three AFC Championship contests, and in 2012, captured the World Championship in SB XLVII.

COACH HARBAUGH SAYS

JOHN HARBAUGH ON BATTLING THROUGH EARLY INJURIES & ADVERSITY THIS SEASON:

"I appreciate the character and resilience of our team – the mental toughness, the focus, the ability to get right at the task at hand and push aside the stuff that is not important. They understand what is important and deal with adversity when it happens. [Injuries are] all around the league. Every team deals with it to one degree or another. We dealt with it quite a bit early and then in the middle of the season. Our guys handled it, and they kept fighting through it."

INJURY UPDATE

Starters on IR include Pro Bowl **RG Marshal Yanda** (ankle), **CB Jimmy Smith** (Achilles), **LG Alex Lewis** (shoulder), **DE Brent Urban** (foot) and **CB Tavon Young** (knee). Last Sunday at Cleveland, **WR Jeremy Maclin** (knee) and **DT Carl Davis** (shoulder) left the game and did not return.

NOTE THE QUOTE

NFL NETWORK'S KYLE BRANDT ON RB ALEX COLLINS:

"This guy is coming up everywhere. He is one of the angriest runners of 2017. He runs angry, he doesn't give up on runs, and then when he gets to the end zone, he has so much fun. It is two-face – the fun and the anger. He came out of nowhere, and he has been one of the stories of the NFL."

Note: Collins' 844 rushing yards rank 10th in the NFL (seventh in the AFC), while his 4.85 rushing average stands fifth among all NFL RBs.



SPOTLIGHT: QB JOE FLACCO

What's the best advice you've been given? "To be confident in who you are and believe that you're the best. It goes a long way – not only in sports. Especially with what we do, competing against the best every day, if you don't believe that, then you're not going to give yourself a fighting chance."

What do you enjoy most about your hometown? "I'm very biased towards it, but it's a very old, tight-knit community. My town is a square-mile. I walked to high school until halfway through my junior year, then my buddy got a car. When I grew up, we would just ride our bikes to each other's houses, knock on the door, and went out and played until our parents called us back in. I just loved how small and how easy it was to be a kid."

If you had to create a Mount Rushmore of quarterbacks, who would you enshrine? "Joe Montana, Dan Marino, Johnny Unitas."

Have you ever been mistaken for someone else? "When the Olympics were on, guys in the building would joke around saying that I looked like Michael Phelps. When me and [former Ravens tight end] Dennis [Pitta] go out together, people think we're brothers."

Who is the best player you've ever competed against? "I didn't necessarily compete against him, because he was on offense, but the fact that I got to grow up watching him – and eventually got to play against him – was Brett Favre. I was able to play against him when he was with the Minnesota Vikings. We played a really good game against each other, but it would definitely be him."

What is one thing you're bad at but wish you were good at? "Singing or dancing. I know I can't sing – I don't really know if I can dance, but I definitely will never try. I wouldn't take singing lessons from [Justin] Tucker, because he would make fun of me the whole time."

What hobbies do you enjoy? "Really, just other sports. It's what I grew up doing, and a lot of my life revolves around that. At this point, it's really just golf, and being a husband and a father. That takes up most of my time these days. For golf, me and some teammates get to play together when we're here for a couple months in the offseason."

What do you enjoy about your involvement with Special Olympics? "I've been doing it since I was a rookie. It's great to be around the athletes; they have a great outlook. It's very rewarding. The great thing about the athletes is they wear their emotions on their sleeve and are very honest. You get a genuine reaction from them, and I like that."

OLB TERRELL SUGGS ON THE RAVENS' MINDSET HEADING INTO THE FINAL TWO GAMES:

"We kind of have to wear blinders. You have to run your own race. We can't be worried about what everybody else is doing. You have to take care of your own business. You take care of your own business, then you can see where you're at."

DT Brandon Williams on battling to reach the playoffs:

"It's on our mind, and it's definitely our goal. But at the same time, it's week-to-week, it's day-to-day, it's practice-to-practice. We have to get there first. We can't start talking about it and then just forget about everything else. We have two games to go, and we have to give it everything we've got. We're ready for these games, and it's a two-game season."

The Baltimore Sun's Childs Walker on QB Joe Flacco, who has 5 TDs, 1 INT and 275.3 passing YPG in the last three games:

"Don't look now, but quarterback Joe Flacco has played much better since the bye week. We spent so much of the early part of the season lamenting Flacco's decline that perhaps we haven't recognized his low-key renaissance since the bye week. Not that he's making anyone forget the [2012] playoffs, but he's cut way back on the crippling mistakes while increasing his yardage totals to respectable levels."

ESPN.com's Jamison Hensley on the Ravens' defense:

"The reason many teams don't want to see the Baltimore Ravens in the postseason is because of their defense. It's far from the most suffocating defense in the NFL, but it's the NFL's best big-play one, which makes the Ravens dangerous if they can make the playoffs."

RB Alex Collins on his mindset when Seattle released him following training camp this season:

"I'm just a really passionate person, and I put my all into it. I like to consider myself a hardnosed worker, not complain about much. I just put my head down, and I work hard. Whatever it is I'm told to do, I try to do that and more. I didn't change anything up, actually, when I got here. I stuck with the same routine that I've had since high school, since college, to get my mindset right. That's just a right place, right time, kind of thing. It was about coming here, just sticking with it, sticking with what I believe in, just working hard and facing adversity. You have to persevere through some things. A lot of people's roads to getting to where they want to be in their careers aren't easy. Everybody has to face a little bit of adversity – especially when you're passionate about something or you want to be great at something. You go back to what you know and what you believe in to get yourself through it. That's what I did."

CB Brandon Carr on rookie first-round draft pick CB Marlon Humphrey stepping into a starting role:

"He's going to be a dog in this league. He's fast, big, physical, strong. He has passion for the game. He's going to be awesome."

S Eric Weddle on S Tony Jefferson, who signed with Baltimore this past offseason:

"I love his personality, ambition, how sincere he is and that he's not a guy who thinks he's arrived – he's very willing to learn. He's confident and exudes that energy to everyone. When he got here, we instantly clicked. He's the little brother I never had. I see so much potential in him."

OLB Terrell Suggs on the Ravens' special teams:

"Sam [Koch] is the best punter in the league, but we've always known that. He can put the ball wherever we need him to, and our special teams coach, Jerry [Rosburg], he's making sure that our three phases, our kicker and our punter, stay the best in the league. Our [special] teams have been playing phenomenal. Everyone knows when you go on a run, your special teams is key. It's good to have Sam and [kicker] Justin [Tucker] on your team."

Steelers QB Ben Roethlisberger on his friend, S Eric Weddle, who leads the Ravens with 6 INTs:

"He has really come along in the second half of the season. He is really making more and more plays. I like to make fun of him, because obviously, he makes all the interceptions and stuff, but now he is starting to get sacks, too. You really have to know where he is all the time. I have played against another safety there in Baltimore for many years in Ed Reed that was a lot the same way, all over the football field."

TE Benjamin Watson on what he learned about the Ravens organization upon signing in 2016:

"This organization has a lot of fun. It is really loose here. Guys who came from here would tell me how the culture is and how this organization lets you be yourself. Being in here, it really is about players' personalities. Guys are able to be themselves, and that is something that coach [John] Harbaugh loves. He encourages guys to play with their personalities, too. If you are a guy that likes to talk – talk. If you are a guy that likes to joke – joke. It allows guys to play loose, and it allows guys to play to their fullest potential."

LB C.J. Mosley on individual accomplishments and working to establish himself as the next great Ravens MLB:

"I pride myself in being the inside linebacker and one of the captains on this team and on this defense. At the end of the day, you want to be known as one of the best linebackers in the league, but I am not really a big individual guy. As long as the team is winning, as long as the defense is doing good, I am happy with that."

TOP RAVENS-COLTS CONNECTIONS

PRO CONNECTIONS

• The Colts franchise originated in Baltimore in 1946. After going defunct for two years (1951-52), the Dallas Texans relocated to Maryland and became the new Baltimore Colts. The franchise remained in Baltimore until 1984, when it moved to Indianapolis.

• Colts head coach **Chuck Pagano** spent four seasons (2008-11) in Baltimore before joining Indy in 2012. Pagano was the Ravens' secondary coach from 2008-10 and defensive coordinator in 2011.

• Colts defensive coordinator **Ted Monachino** spent six seasons (2010-15) in Baltimore working with linebackers before joining Indianapolis as defensive coordinator in 2016. Additionally, Colts tight ends coach **Jim Hostler** served as the Ravens' WRs coach from 2008-13.

• Colts **LB John Simon** (IR) was selected by the Ravens in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, playing in seven games for Baltimore during the 2013 season.

• Colts **WR Kamar Aiken** played with the Ravens from 2014-16, emerging as Baltimore's leading receiver in 2015 (944 yards).

• Colts **CB Rashaan Melvin** played in the Ravens' secondary for parts of 2014 and 2015.

• Colts **C Anthony Fabiano** signed with the Ravens as a RFA in 2016, when he spent training camp in Baltimore.

• Colts practice squad **S Ronald Martin** spent Weeks 2-5 on the Ravens' 2017 practice squad. ... Ravens practice squad **LB Darnell Sankey** played in six games with the Colts earlier this season.

• Colts director of college scouting **T.J. McCreight** worked in the Ravens' personnel department from 1997-2004, serving as an East Coast area scout (1997-2002) and national scout (2003-04).

COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

• Ravens head coach **John Harbaugh** served as Indiana University's defensive backs coach/special teams coordinator in 1997. Also, Baltimore defensive line coach **Joe Cullen** served as the Hoosiers' defensive line coach (2002-03) and defensive coordinator (2004).

• Several Baltimore coaches held positions at Notre Dame: special teams coordinator/associate HC **Jerry Rosburg** (cornerbacks/special teams, 1999-2000); defensive coordinator **Dean Pees** (secondary, 1994); secondary coach **Chris Hewitt** (strength and conditioning assistant, 2003) and linebackers coach **Don Martindale** (defensive assistant, 1994-95).

• Ravens **T Ronnie Stanley** attended Notre Dame, where he played in 41 games and recorded 39-consecutive starts. Fellow teammate, practice squad **DE Kapron Lewis-Moore**, also played for the Irish.

• Colts assistant athletic trainer **Dave Walston** is a Maryland native and graduated from Salisbury State University. He previously served as head athletic trainer at Bowie State University (1988-90).

• Ravens **T James Hurst** hails from Plainfield, IN.

• Ravens West area scout **David Blackburn** was born in Indianapolis and was a standout CB at Depauw University.

• Indianapolis **CB Nate Hairston** is from Frederick, MD.

DECEMBER AT HOME

• The Ravens have won four-consecutive December home games, outscoring opponents 129-69.

• In team history, Baltimore is 35-15 when playing at home in December. Under head coach **John Harbaugh**, the Ravens are 15-7 at home in the year's 12th month.

STANDOUTS VS. COLTS

WEEK 15 RECAP: RAVENS 27, BROWNS 10

The Ravens continued their quest for a seventh playoff appearance in 10 years when they won an important game at Cleveland, 27-10. **QB Joe Flacco** scored a TD and threw for another, while the defense, which leads the NFL in takeaways (33), stole the ball from the Browns four times. The Ravens opened the game with a 13-play drive that ended with a 31-yard **K Justin Tucker** FG for a 3-0 lead. After Cleveland stopped the Ravens at the 1-yard line on a fourth down early in the second quarter, the Browns traveled 96 yards in 5 plays, starting with a 59-yard run by RB Isaiah Crowell. The drive ended with RB Duke Johnson Jr.'s 12-yard TD scamper. Trailing 7-3, the Ravens erupted for TDs on back-to-back possessions. The first score came at the end of a balanced 11-play series, directed by Flacco, who made the TD on a 2-yard QB draw. Johnson Jr. then fumbled on a hit from **LB C.J. Mosley** that was recovered by **DB/LB Anthony Levine Sr.** at the Browns' 45. Three plays later, Flacco hit **TE Benjamin Watson** with a 33-yard TD, giving the Ravens a 17-7 advantage. A 45-yard FG by K Zane Gonzalez made the score 17-10 at the half. Baltimore increased the lead to 24-10 in the third quarter on a defensive TD. **OLB Za'Darius Smith** strip-sacked QB DeShone Kizer in the end zone, and **DT Brandon Williams** pounced on the fumble and scooted along the ground a half-yard to score the first TD of his career. The Ravens' final points came on a 43-yard Tucker FG. For the game, the Ravens produced 376 yards to 266 for the Browns, who were held to 0 yards in the game's opening quarter. Flacco was 26-of-42 for 288 yards, including 6 each to **WR Mike Wallace** (89 yards) and **RB Danny Woodhead** (31). **RB Javorius Allen** added 70 yards on 13 carries. Kizer completed 20 of 37 for just 146 yards, with WR Josh Gordon catching 5 for 47 yards. **WR Jeremy Maclin** (knee) and **DT Carl Davis** (shoulder) left the game and did not return.

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



**QB Joe Flacco - 2012
Super Bowl XLVII MVP**

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

THE HARBAUGH FILE

John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 & 2014) of his nine full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl title. Under his guidance, the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012).

Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

- The Ravens are one of seven teams with at least six playoff berths in the past nine seasons (2008-16): GB (8), NE (8), Bal. (6), Cin. (6), Ind. (6), Pit. (6) & Sea. (6).
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since 2008 rank second only to New England's 11.
- "Harbs" is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim (formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.
- Harbaugh is the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh owns the second-most playoff wins (10, tied) by a coach in his first nine seasons (since the 1970 merger).
- With the Ravens' 2014 playoff berth, Harbaugh became one of eight coaches in NFL history to make the postseason in six of their first seven seasons coaching.
- For coaches to make the playoffs in at least six of their first nine years, "Harbs" is one of five active coaches to do so (Pete Carroll, Mike McCarthy, Andy Reid & Mike Tomlin).
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.

Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg** has guided a stellar special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Below are several standout notes about the coach and his successful group of specialists:

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned eight combined Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST **Brendon Ayanbadejo** (2008), K **Billy Cundiff** (2010), RS **Jacoby Jones** (2012), K **Justin Tucker** (2013 & 2016), LS **Morgan Cox** (2015 & 2016) and P **Sam Koch** (2015).

PRIME KICKER & PUNTER

• Two-time Pro Bowl K **Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (197) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 90.0% career success mark, "Tuck" is the most accurate kicker in league history (197-of-219 on FGAs). Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, P **Sam Koch's** 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL that season, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages, both career highs and Ravens records.

RAVENS' BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl RS **Jacoby Jones** in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

2017: RAVENS RETURN GAMES SOARS IN WEEK 6 vs. CHICAGO

• In Week 6 vs. Chicago, for the first time in franchise history, the Ravens returned a kickoff and punt return for a TD in the same game. RB **Bobby Rainey Jr.** posted a 96-yard KOR-TD, while WR **Michael Campanaro** registered a 77-yard PR-TD. The Ravens are the first NFL team to have KOR and PR touchdowns in the same game since 2013, when Detroit and Kansas City each accomplished the feat on 12/8/13.








DEAN PEES & DEFENSIVE NOTES

"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter 'S.' He's debuted a 'boomerang' punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a 'changeup' of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

A TREMENDOUS 2016

In 2016, All-Pro **K Justin Tucker** connected on 38 of 39 FGAs (lone miss was a block), posting the fifth-best percentage in NFL single-season history. In addition to making 35-straight FGs at one point (tied for fifth-best streak ever), here are several facts about his remarkable season, which is arguably the best ever by a kicker:

- ✓ Tucker's 38 FGs made ranked No. 1 in the NFL. He was also 27-of-27 on PATs. An NFL single-season record 24 of Tucker's 38 FGs made in 2016 came from 40 yards or beyond.
- ✓ Tucker's 10 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They tie (Blair Walsh, 2012) for the most in NFL history. (Tucker was a perfect 10-for-10 from 50 yards and out during the 2016 season.)
- ✓ Tucker's 141 points ranked second in the league only behind Atlanta's Matt Bryant (158).
- ✓ In Week 12 vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game. (These feats earned him AFC ST POW honors.)



JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 16 VS. COLTS

Opening statement: “Good to see everybody – appreciate you being here. Coming off a good victory, we are entering into a short week, so the schedule gets accelerated. We’ll be on a six-day schedule. The Colts had nine days [preparation] since last Thursday, so we have some catching up to do. That’s what we’re working on doing right now.”

How nice is it to have these last two games be at home? (David Ginsburg) “We’re looking forward to the next two games. We’re looking forward to our crowd. We’ve only had six [games] at home so far. We’ve had eight on the road already. You get eight and eight. These will be two of our home games, so they’re very valuable to us, as you said. We’re hoping we play our best football on the last two games of the season. We’re going to need to play our best football to accomplish what we’re trying to accomplish. We love for our crowd to be at their best, too. Be excited, and make it a really tough environment to play in for our opponents.”

OLB Terrell Suggs used the term “having blinders on,” and RB Javorius Allen was talking about how he didn’t even know who won and lost yesterday. Have you been pleased with the team’s focus, in terms of not waiting on other results? Everyone is curious about scenarios. Do you feel that your team has been pretty in-tune to just worrying about themselves these last couple weeks? (Jeff Zrebiec) “We played a tough game last Sunday night in Pittsburgh – obviously, a very hard-fought game, a very physical game. It was a little bit of a quick turnaround emotionally for us, and physically. Our guys got ready to go play another tough, physical, in-division road game at a place where we always have tough games against [the Browns]. I thought they did a really good job of that. To me, that’s what they did. They got focused on the game, on the task at hand, kept it about that, and that’s what we need to do again this week. We need to keep it about the challenge that’s in front of us and play our best football.”

Is it easier, in any way, because you don’t really have to pay attention too much [to playoff scenarios]? It’s in front of you. (Jerry Coleman) “That’s a good thing to think about, to consider. I’m not thinking about that – whether it’s easy or not. It doesn’t really matter.”

Not necessarily easier, but all you have to do is win. It doesn’t really matter what happens around you. Is that an easy sell for you as a coach? (David Ginsburg) “I’m just not even going there with the questions. We have to win the *next* game. That’s how we look at it. So all the other stuff, I think is great. You write about it and analyze it and think about it and discuss it, and it’s cool and fun – but not for us. That’s not what we’re thinking about. It doesn’t matter if it’s easy or hard or what would be better or what if this happens. That’s a distraction for us. Our thing is, ‘Man, we have to get in here Tuesday, and we have to get to work on the Colts, because we have some things that we need to understand about this team that we’re playing.’ We need to be prepared out there Sunday and play our best football. Execute, defend, understand what their formations mean, understand when their pressures are coming, where they’re coming from, understand their individual players and how to block them. All the other stuff? It doesn’t matter to us. We have work to do.”

Are you happy with the way you guys finished this season on the road? You were 4-4. Obviously, you would have liked to win every game on the road, but is going 4-4 the right formula to take care of business at home? (Jerry Coleman) “We just need to win the last game. We would’ve liked to have won the one before that. We want to go back and look at all the games. We would have liked to have won a couple more of those, but it’s water under the bridge now. All the other stuff is good after-the-season conversation. That’s it, really.”

Can you speak to the resiliency your team has shown and despite all these injuries ... There have been a lot around the whole league, and you have had your share, but are you proud of the way this team has regrouped? The offensive line and the defensive backfield [have dealt with injuries]. (David Ginsburg) “I do appreciate the character of our team and the resilience of our team and the mental toughness and the focus and the ability to get right at the task at hand and push aside the stuff that is not important and get right at what is important and deal with adversity when it happens, to your point, with the different injuries. You are right; it is all around the league. Every team deals with it to one degree or another. We dealt with it quite a bit early and then middle of season. Our guys handled it, and they kept fighting through it. The reports of our demise, I guess, were greatly exaggerated. But we have a long way to go, and it runs through M&T Bank Stadium on [Saturday].”



We know you gave P Sam Koch the game ball on Sunday. Being with your expertise in special teams, what kind of expertise does it take for a punter to consistently get it down to that 5-yard [line] range? (Jamison Hensley) “That is really a good point. Sam is probably more precise than certainly any punter I have seen – not just been around, but seen. They say the ball takes funny bounces for a reason. It is oblong, and it does. You can’t predict it, but I will tell you, Sam Koch seems like he has perfected that oblong somehow, some way, because it rarely takes off into the end zone. That is the measuring stick. We have all watched a lot of football, and we kind of know, ‘Man, how is he getting all these balls to bounce up and to bounce back?’ The precision, I would say, is at the highest level. Exactly how he does it? I have no idea. They have their techniques they work on. He would be the right guy to ask, but he probably won’t tell you. I can’t tell you, so I guess people aren’t going to know. (laughter) But it is amazing.”

How pleased are you with what WR Mike Wallace has done since the bye week? It is no secret the numbers were down the first half of the season, but it seems like he has been a consistent producer the past few weeks. (Luke Jones) “It speaks to that you don’t get caught up in all that stuff. You try not to get dragged into those conversations and those questions, because you realize that they really don’t mean too much. You just have to keep fighting through it. Some games, those opportunities happen. Sometimes, they don’t. There are a lot of different reasons, but a guy like Mike Wallace is always confident – as you know – and he always works hard. Opportunities are going to come his way, and he is going to make those plays. He had a couple really great catches for us. That one on the left sideline, where he battled off, there was a lot of contact there, and he came up with that catch. Joe [Flacco] made a great throw. We had what – four, five, six chunk passes that were really huge for us in the game; that really opened it up for our offense. That is what we need to do.”

WR/RS Chris Moore had some great plays on special teams, and the week before, he had the receiving touchdown. How proud are you of how he has emerged? (Jordan Schatz) “Chris Moore is a guy that we really do think is an emerging player, as you said. I feel like it is time for him to break out. When he didn’t make the one play on the deep in-route, I just went over and told him ... He said, ‘I know, I have to make this catch.’ Sometimes, it is like I want to say, ‘Do you realize how talented you are? Do you really, in your heart, understand how good you can be?’ He is going to be. He is going to be a special player, because of what you said. [His] special teams plays are borderline spectacular. When he gets the ball in his hands, you can see the talent and the speed. He plays as fast or faster than anyone we have when you calculate game speed. Yes, we are looking for big things from him, for sure. I would like for it to be [Saturday] afternoon, too. That would be great. You hear that, Chris [Moore]?” (laughter)

It seems like every week we are talking about RB Javorius “Buck” Allen. Yesterday, they had a really good defense, and he was able to find yards. How have you seen him get better? (Todd Karpovich) “Yes, that is a great point. ‘Buck’ Allen is an all-around consistent player, an all-around really good player – everything he does. [He] runs the ball, pass protection, catches the ball out of the backfield, always knows what to do, special teams, he is on the punt team, he is on the kickoff team, he is on the punt return team, he is on the kickoff return team. He is a four-phase guy in special teams – always gets the job done. He has really progressed into what we all hoped he was going to be when we drafted him. I say with him, too, it is not over yet. He continues to improve. I think his best football is still in front of him.”

When we talk to QB Joe Flacco, he will never say where he is, as far as health. From what you have heard, how much healthier is he now? He was dealing with that back issue in preseason, but how healthy is he now compared to earlier in the season? (Jamison Hensley) “I really don’t know. I probably wouldn’t give you the answer if I knew, but I really don’t know. How can you gauge that? I am sure he is healthier. How much? That is impossible to say, really, unless you are him, and he is not going to tell you, probably, as you said.”

Have you ever seen yardage measured with an index card? (Jerry Coleman) “I am going to stay away from that one. I like [NFL official] Gene Steratore a lot. I think he does a great job, does a great job.”

It was a wild scene on the plane last night. (Ravens senior VP of public and community relations Kevin Byrne) “Oh man, it was great. It was great.”

(Reporter, Jim Forner: “I told them to stop the plane so I could keep the signal!”) “I got off the plane ... What Kevin [Byrne] is talking about is ... I didn’t even know we had WiFi, and we could get it. All of a sudden, everyone is watching it, so I figured out how to finally get it on [the plane’s TV]. We had the New England-Pittsburgh game that everyone is watching on the plane. Guys are yelling and screaming. We all got into it; coaches got into it. I could not believe a couple of calls. I’m screaming, ‘How could you do that?’ It was like being in your basement; it was like being in your ‘man cave’ with all your best friends looking at



a football game. Everyone is yelling, everyone is screaming, rooting for different teams. Most of us probably, you know who we were probably rooting against. But that is just human nature. I got off the plane, and I thought that Pittsburgh won. It looked like it was a catch, and [the TV signal] went out. See, New England scored, and then the video went out. Then, [the Steelers] are at the 10-yard line. We are like, 'How did they get down there so fast? Was it a kick return? What happened?' Nobody knew. But they were, and then, bam, it was a touchdown. Then, it [the signal] went out again. Then, I got off the plane. I am driving home, flipping through the radio and got NFL Network for a minute. I heard the Tennessee game – the end of that – which was cool. Then, they explained what happened in the Pittsburgh game. [They said], 'A catch. No catch. Nobody knows what a catch is!' Which is probably true. Pittsburgh ended up not winning. It is just crazy. It is the NFL, which is why people love it. We were in one of those games just a week before, so we know how it goes."

Off of that catch, are you able to use that as a teaching moment? It has bitten a couple of teams. You do not want it to bite your own team. Are you able to use that as a coaching moment to your pass catchers? Do you say, "Here is what you need to do when you are falling to the ground."? **Do you use that as a teaching moment? (Sarah Ellison)** "That is probably a really good point. What we do is ... That is one of many examples of that. We have 'Plays of the Week' every Friday, where we show those kind of plays to our team and talk about it, whether it is rules or techniques and things like that and try to learn from every other situation around the league every week. It is really valuable. It is a really valuable tool, and we usually use the TV copies, because they give you the best views."

Any other injury updates? You talked about MRIs for WR Jeremy Maclin and DT Carl Davis? (Jamison Hensley) "Nothing serious with those guys, in a sense that they would be out for the season. I think that's quite a statement, given the fact that there's not a lot of season left – up to six games. We expect both of those guys back as soon as possible. I think both of those guys will do everything they can to get back this week, [with] varying degrees of likelihood. It kind of depends on how they come along the next couple of days and how they progress. Anywhere from maybe more likely that it wouldn't be this week and maybe the week after, but you never know. It could be this week with both these guys or either one of those guys. We'll just see how they progress. They wouldn't have to practice to play in the game at this stage. They'll go to work, and they'll do everything they can to be ready for Sunday, I'm sure."

How happy were you for OLB Za'Darius Smith – a guy who has worked really hard to make that kind of impact play and to come up with a strip-sack in a clutch moment? How pleased were you to see that from him? (Ryan Mink) "I was pleased to see it for all of us, but I was happy for him, too. That's kind of how you look at it as a coach. You like to see guys succeed and [see] where the hard work is put in to make a play like that. It was a quick throw [by DeShone Kizer], and he just had a tremendous out-in-and-out move. He kind of faked it – he was going to go to a power move, bull-rushed the tackle back, and he slipped outside and got around clean before the quarterback could even think he could be there. That's why the strip-sack happened. It was just a great play. Za'Darius has become, quietly or not, maybe not in Baltimore as much, but nationally, a really good pass rusher – one of the better pass rushers in football, an ascending pass rusher. I, personally, love his work ethic, love his attitude, love being around him every day, the kind of guy he is. We want to see more of that."

I know you're just now getting into film on Indianapolis, but when you look at their defense with head coach Chuck Pagano there, does it remind you of what you guys do a lot? (Garrett Downing) "You look at every defense, and you try to categorize in terms of what the structure is and how to organize. Within that, there are a lot of little details about how they adjust, what they do, different formations and motions and things like that – what they like to play in different situations. Most of the basic, general stuff is similar; there are only so many fronts that you can play. It's all the little additions that people put on them and the way they do stuff. They do a lot of things that we are familiar with, that we've done here in the past. They do some things differently, too. Chuck and [defensive coordinator] Ted Monachino have put their own spin on the system. So you just try to take it for what it is and teach your guys what they're going to be presented with on Sunday."

Did RB Alex Collins get through the game OK? (Jeff Zrebiec) "Mhhmm." *(nodding head)*
