Baltimore Ravens at **CLEVELAND BROWNS**

JUST THE FACTS

- Winners of two straight, the Baltimore Ravens (3-1) hit the road for the second week in a row when they face the Cleveland Browns (1-2-1) on Sunday, Oct. 7 at FirstEnergy Stadium. Baltimore currently sits atop the AFC North standings with 3-1 Cincinnati, while the Browns are tied with Pittsburgh (1-2-1).
- Last Sunday night (9/30), the Rayens' defense shut out the Steelers in the second half on the way to an impressive 26-14 win at Heinz Field. Baltimore limited Pittsburgh to 284 total yards (only 19 rushing), including just 47 in the second half. The Ravens exploded out of the gate, jumping to a 14-0, first-quarter lead on a pair of QB Joe Flacco TD passes to WR John Brown and RB Alex Collins. K Justin Tucker then converted 4 FGs in the second half to seal the victory. Flacco completed passes to 11 different players, finishing 28-of-42 for 363 yards (the most ever by a Raven vs. Pittsburgh) and a 109.5 QB rating. Brown caught 3 for a game-high 116 yards, including a 71-yard beauty.
- Last week's Pittsburgh game began a stretch that sees Baltimore play four of five games on the road. (This includes three-consecutive away tilts from Weeks 4-6: at Pittsburgh, at Cleveland and at Tennessee.)
- The Ravens own a 29-9 series lead over the Browns, including a 14-5 mark in Cleveland. Under John Harbaugh, Baltimore is 18-2 vs. the Browns, sporting a 9-1 road record. The Ravens have won fivestraight games vs. Cleveland and four in a row at FirstEnergy Stadium.
- In his 11th season at Baltimore's helm, Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a 107-72 overall record (10-5 postseason), posting the NFL's fourthmost total victories since his 2008 arrival. The Ravens have played in three AFC title games (2008, 2011 & 2012) under Harbaugh, while in 2012, he guided the franchise to its second Super Bowl victory.

HARBS SAYS

JOHN HARBAUGH ON THE RAVENS STRIVING TO IMPROVE:

"The thing about these guys is they're not going to get caught up in [what happened last week]. They didn't get caught up in the noise when everybody was saying how bad they were and that they couldn't do this or that. They're not going to get caught up in the noise when people start talking about how good they are. That's what I love about them. It's a mature group. They have a lot of faith in one another, a lot of trust in one another, and that's what makes for a potentially special football team. We aren't there at this point, but we have to get there."

INJURY UPDATE

DT Willie Henry (umbilical hernia) and first-round pick TE Hayden Hurst (foot) underwent surgery in late August and missed Weeks 1-4. (Hurst was limited in practice last week, however.) Rookie CB Anthony Averett (hamstring) has missed the past two games. Six players are on IR, including CB Maurice Canady (knee) and RB Kenneth Dixon (knee).

NOTE THE QUOTE

FOX SPORTS' COLIN COWHERD ON THE RAVENS:

"I've been saying it since the preseason: Baltimore is the best team in the NFL no one is paying attention to. ... My thing was, wait until Thanksgiving. This is going to be a Super Bowl-level team. ... Baltimore is always good defensively. They're incredibly sound there again this year, and by the way, sneaky good offensively."

NOTE OF THE WEEK

Ravens **WR John Brown** ranks third in the NFL in yards-per-catch average (22.5), posting 338 yards and 3 TDs on 15 receptions through four games. Brown has posted 5 catches of 25+ yards, tying Julio Jones for the NFL's fourth most.

NUMBERS TO RAVE ABOUT

2 — NFL teams (Baltimore & LA Rams) that rank in the NFL's Top 5 in both scoring offense and scoring defense. The Ravens are fifth and third (tied), respectively, while LA is second and fifth.

B — Passing TDs for **QB Joe Flacco** this year, tying (2009) for the most he has produced through the first four games of a season.

13 — Consecutive games the Ravens have scored at least 20 points, the NFL's longest active streak. (It also marks the longest such streak in franchise history.)

27.8 — Defensive third-down percentage for the Ravens this season, ranking No. 2 in the NFL (KC, 23.8).

29.8 — Points per game the Ravens have averaged dating back to Week 8 of 2017, ranking as the NFL's second most (LA Rams, 31.2).

+56 — Baltimore's scoring differential this season (123-65), ranking second best in the NFL (LAR, +73). In the second half alone, the Ravens have outscored foes 49-9.

1,252 — Passing yards for **QB Joe Flacco** this season, ranking as the second most through the first four games of his career. (In 2012, he posted 1,269 yards in the opening four weeks.)

Who inspires you? "My family. It's personal, so it's like every person in my family inspires me in different ways. I want to be a perfect example to my little sister [14] as

the only big brother. My father passed away, but his spirit lives on inside of me, continuing that legacy of us both being Kenneths. My mom — my love side, my caring side, my treating people right and family coming together comes from my mom's side. With me having a family one day, I aspire to do it at least the way my mom did it, as far as her love, smiling, clowning around, just her personality. Her personality drives me."

You were on the debate team at UCLA. How did that come about? "I was referred by a law professor. He went to UCLA, and he was on the debate team when he was younger. I had won a class debate that was nowhere near close to a topic that I like to talk about. I was 'for' the argument, and I emailed him right away and said, 'I really don't believe in this. I don't think I ever will.' And he said, 'Just give it some consideration. It's a debate.' He opened my mind up to a little bit of a different [idea], because it wasn't about if you were really for it or not, it was just, 'What were your points towards it?' I wound up crushing the debate. He was like, I want to invite you to the debate team. I tried out, and he said, 'I think it would be good for you. You will be doing media if you have a prosperous career, so I think it will help benefit you.' He said, 'I bet you'll be a sportscaster or commentator once you get done, because you can speak well.' That's what it was. I tried it out, and I did pretty well at it."

What's one of the most memorable debates you've had? "It's more interesting whenever you don't have much information about the topic, and you have a small amount of time to find information. You're finding facts and a way to voice that towards [your opponents]. Your object is to have stronger points than them. That's challenging but interesting, because it's like, 'How can I find something that I don't know about, but find great points to overcome what their point is? Who has stronger structure, a stronger foundation? It gets pretty interesting! You start yelling at each other, and it's fun."

What's your proudest accomplishment outside of football? "Winning the Academic & Student Services Success Award in college. It's for excelling well in the community, in your sport and in academics out of all of the athletes, boys and girls."

You majored in sociology. What was a particularly interesting class or assignment you had? "I had a paper published! It was a 'Grammar B' essay, and [UCLA] still uses it to this day. There were a couple, actually. A 'Grammar B' essay is basically something you write that's not in the form of an essay. It relates a thing to a concept. I wrote about an hourglass, and I wrote all the things I'm waiting for [up top], because when you think about it, it's an hourglass. The theme was time. It's waiting for time. At the bottom it says, 'I'm glad that you didn't get caught up in certain traps and certain stereotypes, whether that be because of a person, where you come from, where your family struggles or where you do well. They published it at UCLA as an example. It's a legit published essay."

A lot of people say, "Know your why." What is yours? "To shine my light as inspiration to the witness, the motives of my greatness."

QUOTH THE RAVENS



NFL.com's Nick Shook on the Ravens' Offense:

"The Ravens' receiving corps is experiencing a Great Awakening with Michael Crabtree and John Brown. It has made Baltimore's offense incredibly fun to watch, when combined with the running of Alex Collins (and potential of tight end Mark Andrews). The Ravens are a team that cannot be overlooked on a weekly basis. They're also a resilient bunch."

NBC's Cris Collinsworth on GM Ozzie Newsome's crafting of the 2018 Ravens:

"They're pretty good. I thought that as a receiver, [Newsome] understood that they had to be more dynamic. Joe Flacco had kind of gotten to be this checkdown guy, and they needed to be more explosive. So they got more explosive with [John] Brown adding some speed, with [Michael] Crabtree adding some playmaking. Drafting those two tight ends [Hayden Hurst and Mark Andrews] has already made a difference, and we're already seeing the difference that those guys have made. ... If you've got Ozzie running the show, you're not going to throw a gutter ball. There may be some ups and downs, but you're not going to throw a gutter ball."

NBC Sports' Peter King, naming K Justin Tucker his Special Teams Player of the Week for the second-consecutive week: "Heinz Field is, historically, a bit of a Bermuda Triangle for kickers. Except for one. Tucker was four-for-four in field goals Sunday night in the 26-14 victory over the Steelers. In fact, Tucker was the only person to score in the second half in this game. He hit on field goals of 47, 49, 28 and 31 yards after halftime. Now he has a streak of 17 straight at Heinz Field, and the most accurate field goal kicker of all time stretched his lead over Dan Bailey to almost two full percentage points. Tucker, number one, has made 90.2 percent of his kicks. Bailey, number two, is at 88.3 percent. That seems like a wow to me."

QB Joe Flacco on the Ravens' variety of offensive players:

"We have a lot of versatility at [the tight end] position, and we have a lot of versatility at our wide receiver group. I think our running backs do a great job of rotating in there, and they all do their things that they do really well. It is exciting that we have that. And our job is to go out there and continue to execute the way we've been executing. I think Marty [Mornhinweg] has been utilizing everybody, and guys have been executing pretty damn good. I think the line, those guys are really the key. They are the solid five guys that are out there every single play, and they have to play a physical game every single week. Keeping those guys healthy is a big deal, because those guys are playing awesome right now."

Steelers coach Mike Tomlin on G Marshal Yanda:

"I just have a lot of respect for him and his body of work and how he plays. I always have. It's obvious that he's the heartbeat of that unit and has been for a long time."

Former Cardinals coach Bruce Arians on WR John Brown:

"He can do it all. He might be small in stature, but he's strong, he's physical, he can make every catch. That's the one thing about 'Smoke,' he's one heck of a competitor. ... I'm so happy for him, because he's been through so much with all the diagnoses and things that have gone on with him the last two years. He was a superstar waiting to happen, and I'm just so happy, because he such a great young man. I couldn't wish it for anyone else any more than John Brown. 'Smoke' is one of my favorite players."

Steelers QB Ben Roethlisberger on LB C.J. Mosley:

"He's one of the best linebackers in the game. In terms of playmaking, obviously, when he's your signal caller, getting guys set up, his experience – he's just a phenomenal football player, maybe even better guy. I just think that when he's out there, he's a difference-maker."

Defensive coordinator Don Martindale on OLB Za'Darius Smith's progression into Year 4:

"He's always been a big, strong kid, and what has happened is, he's just starting to show what we thought when we drafted him. He's more focused this year, and he's really worked on his technique, and you're seeing the dividends pay off with that. I think it's awesome the way he's started out, because he's such a value to the defense, because he can rush inside and outside, as you all saw that."

OLB Terrell Suggs on rookie LB Kenny Young:

"I just like that he's a young dog. When you have a young dog that can run like he can run and just go, everything else can be corrected. We like you if you can just go and run and go make plays and go wreak havoc. Everything else can be coached. We like that kind of dog in him."

John Harbaugh on his confidence in RB Javorius Allen:

"He's grown as a player, especially on the third-down stuff. His pass protection is excellent. [He's] become a real factor. In fact, we're talking about how much better he can get as a receiver, in terms of shaking loose on some routes and keep growing in that area. He's become — I think quietly — one of the better players in football at his position."

Secondary coach Chris Hewitt on CB Marlon Humphrey:

"One thing that I can say about him is he's got every attribute that you need to be a top corner in this league. I don't expect anything less from him but to be a top corner."

TOP RAVENS-BROWNS CONNECTIONS

- Ravens GM/EVP and Hall of Fame TE **Ozzie Newsome** played 13 seasons in Cleveland. After his playing career, he then held positions as a scout, assistant to the head coach/offense/pro personnel, and director of pro personnel before moving to Baltimore as VP of player personnel in 1996.
- Baltimore special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg** was the ST coordinator for the Browns from 2001-06, while Ravens defensive line coach **Joe Cullen** held the same title in Cleveland for one season (2013).
- The Ravens' staff is comprised of many people who were invited to join the franchise when it moved from Cleveland: SVP of football administration **Pat Moriarty**, EVP of public & community relations **Kevin Byrne**, VP of football video operations **Jon Dubé**, SVP of operations **Bob Eller** and VP of IT **Bill Jankowski**.
- Ravens senior personnel assistant **George Kokinis** was the Browns' GM in 2009. Kokinis began his career with Cleveland as an operations intern (1991) and then as a scout (1992-95).
- Baltimore director of pro personnel **Vincent Newsome** played two seasons (1991-92) for the Browns before becoming a special assignment scout for the team from 1993-95.
- Baltimore secondary coach **Chris Hewitt** was a Browns intern in 2001 through the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship.
- Browns head coach **Hue Jackson** was the Ravens' quarterbacks coach for two seasons (2008-09), helping Baltimore advance to the playoffs both years.
- Browns senior offensive assistant **Al Saunders** served the same role for the Ravens from 2009-10.
- Ravens east area scout **Bobby Vega** spent 2005-18 within the Browns' scouting department, starting as a scouting assistant and working his way up to director.
- Browns **QB Tyrod Taylor** was drafted by the Ravens in the sixth round in 2011 and spent four years with the team. **DT Carl Daivs** was a Ravens' third-round pick in 2015 and played for the team through the '18 training camp. **DL Trevon Coley** spent the 2016 training camp with Baltimore.

RAVENS RADIO BROADCASTS

- The Ravens' 2018 radio team features **Gerry Sandusky**, with former Ravens standouts **OLB Jarret Johnson** and **TE Dennis Pitta** splitting half the games as analysts. 98 Rock's **Kirk McEwen** serves as the sideline reporter for home games, while former Ravens **RB Justin Forsett** is the away game sideline reporter.
- All games can be heard on 98Rock (97.9 FM), WBAL 1090 AM, baltimoreravens.com, the Ravens mobile app (when in Baltimore) and on 21 regional affiliates. These broadcasts spans three states Maryland, Pennsylvania and Delaware and Washington, D.C.
- Additionally, Tico Sports produces a Spanish radio broadcast. WEEK 4 RECAP: BAL. 26. PIT. 14

The Ravens' defense shut out the Steelers in the second half on the way to an impressive 26-14 win at Heinz Field last Sunday. (Through the season's first four games, Baltimore has not allowed a second-half touchdown.) The Ravens' defense, under first-year defensive coordinator Don Martindale, entered the contest as the NFL's top-rated and limited the hosts to 284 yards (only 19 rushing yards.) In six second-half possessions, Pittsburgh's offense was held to a pair of three-and-outs, 4 punts, an INT and a turnover on downs. The Rayens exploded out of the gate. leaping to a 14-0, first-quarter lead on a pair of QB Joe Flacco TD passes. The first came on the game's opening drive when WR John Brown caught a 33-yard TD dart. After S Tony Jefferson stole the ball from Steelers TE Vance McDonald at the Pittsburgh 31-yard line, Flacco soon hit RB Alex Collins with a 3-yard TD toss. Collins' fumble on the Steelers' 1-yard line stopped another potential scoring opportunity in the second quarter. A pair of K Chris Boswell field goals (34 and 39 yards) put the Steelers on the scoreboard at 14-6. Pittsburgh then scored its only TD of the night when QB Ben Roethlisberger found WR Antonio Brown in the end zone with a 26-yard TD strike. Roethlisberger's 2-point conversion to RB James Conner tied the game at 14 at the half. The Ravens' defense limited the Steelers to just 47 total yards in the last two quarters. Meanwhile, Baltimore K Justin Tucker converted four FGs, a 47-yarder in the third quarter and makes from 49, 28 and 31 in the final period. Flacco completed passes to 11 different teammates, finishing 28-of-42 for 363 yards and a 109.5 QB rating. Brown caught 3 for a game-high 116 yards. WR Willie Snead IV grabbed 6 for 56, and TE Maxx Williams snagged 5 for 51 yards. The Ravens totaled 451 yards to Pittsburgh's 284. Roethlisberger was 27-of-47 for 274 yards with 1 TD and an INT.

LB Ray Lewis - 2000 Super Bowl XXXV MVP

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

THE HARBAUGH FILE

John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 & 2014) of his 10 full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl title. Under "Harbs," the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012).

Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

- The Ravens are one of only eight teams (NE 9; GB 8; Pit. 7; Atl., Bal., Cin., Ind. & Sea. 6) to earn at least six postseason berths in the last 10 years. (Baltimore has won at least one game in each of those playoff campaigns.)
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since 2008 rank second only to New England's 13.
- "Harbs" is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim (formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.
- Harbaugh is the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh owns the third-most playoff wins (10, tied) by a coach in his first 10 seasons (since the 1970 merger).
- With the Ravens' 2014 playoff berth, Harbaugh became one of eight coaches in NFL history to make the postseason in six of their first seven seasons coaching.
- For coaches to make the playoffs in at least six of their first 10 years, "Harbs" is one of five active coaches to do so (Pete Carroll, Mike McCarthy, Andy Reid & Mike Tomlin).
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.

ROSBURG LEADS RAVENS SPECIALISTS

SEASONS RAVENS: 11TH NFL: 18TH Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg** has guided a stellar special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Below are several standout notes about the coach and his successful group of specialists.

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned eight combined Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013 & 2016), LS Morgan Cox (2015 & 2016) and P Sam Koch (2015).

PRIME KICKER & PUNTER

• Two-time Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (211) since entering the NFL in 2012. With a 90.2% career success mark, "Tuck" is the most accurate kicker in league history (211-of-234 on FGAs). Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch**'s 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL that season, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2017, Koch led the NFL in both punts inside the 10 (16) and inside the 20 (a franchise-record 40).

RAVENS' BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

2017: RAVENS RETURN GAMES SOARS IN WEEK 6 VS. CHICAGO

• In Week 6 vs. Chicago, for the first time in franchise history, the Ravens returned a kickoff and punt return for a TD in the same game. RB Bobby Rainey Jr. posted a 96-yard KOR-TD, while WR Michael Campanaro registered a 77-yard PR-TD. The Ravens became the first NFL team to have KOR and PR touchdowns in the same game since 2013, when Detroit and Kansas City each accomplished the feat on 12/8/13.

BALTIMORE BLOCK PARTY

Since 2014, the Ravens have produced the NFL's second-most blocked kicks (13, tied), including an NFL-high (tied) 4 in 2016.


DON "WINK" MARTINDALE & DEFENSIVE NOTES

"WINK" TO LEAD THE DEFENSE

On Jan. 9, 2018, the Ravens promoted **Don "Wink" Martindale** to defensive coordinator following the retirement of Dean Pees. Martindale, 54, is in his seventh year with the Ravens after serving as LBs coach from 2016-17 and ILBs coach from 2012-15. Under his guidance, **LB C.J. Mosley** has become one of the league's top defenders, earning three Pro Bowls.

The 2018 campaign marks Martindale's 14th season coaching in the NFL, where he has also spent time with Oakland (2004-08) and Denver (2009-10). In 2010, he served as the Broncos' defensive coordinator.

"'Wink' has earned the promotion to defensive coordinator," **John Harbaugh** stated. "His aggressive mentality will serve to take our defense to new levels. He is obviously respected by players, many of whom have already benefited from his direct coaching at the linebacker position. He knows the ins and outs of what we have been about on defense and has been an important contributor to our success on that side of the ball. This is an exciting day for Wink and his family, and also one for the Ravens."

MARTY MANS THE OFFENSE

Marty Mornhinweg was elevated to offensive coordinator on Oct. 10, 2016. A 24-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia Eagles (2004-12) and San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000).

FIVE PRO BOWLERS

• Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.



MARTY'S NFL COORDINATOR ROLES

1997-2000: 49ers - Offensive Coordinator/QBs Coach

- During this span, SF offense ranked third in total net yards (364.6 ypg), including third in rushing (131.4 ypg) and fifth in passing (233.2 ypg).

ASSISTANT COACHES

JERRY ROSBURG

SPECIAL TEAMS COORD. / ASSOC. HEAD COACH

In his 40th season coaching, Rosburg has guided an exceptional special teams group over his 10 years (2008-17) with the Ravens. Specifically in the past six full seasons (2012-17), the Ravens' ST units have consistently been acknowledged as one of the league's best. In the annual special teams report from senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin, Baltimore has ranked in the NFL's Top 5 for six-straight seasons (and is the only team to do so).

DON MARTINDALE DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

"Wink" was promoted to "D" coordinator on Jan. 9, 2018 after six years working with Baltimore's LBs. Originally joining the Ravens in 2012, during the past six seasons, Martindale has guided and helped grow a number of standout linebackers, most notably ILB C.J. Mosley. Martindale was the Broncos' "D" coordinator in 2010, and in 2009, coached all four LBs in the 3-4 scheme.

MARTY MORNHINWEG OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Mornhinweg is in his third year as offensive coordinator, originally assuming the role in Week 6 of 2016. A 34-year coaching veteran and former NFL head coach (Lions), he has an extensive background coordinating offenses and tutoring QBs. Throughout his NFL career, five QBs have earned Pro Bowl honors under his direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Jeff Garcia, Steve Young and Brett Favre.

GREG ROMAN

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH / TIGHT ENDS COACH

Roman is in his second stint with the Ravens, re-joining the team in 2017. In the latter part of '17, Baltimore's offense made big strides, and following the season, he was promoted to assistant head coach/TEs coach. Since his first term in Baltimore (2006-07), he has been a successful NFL offensive coordinator both in San Francisco and Buffalo.

RICHARD ANGULO ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Angulo is in his fifth year with the Ravens and his second as the team's assistant offensive line coach. In 2017, he helped coach an offensive line that allowed the league's seventh-fewest sacks (27, tied with Minnesota). From 2015-16, he served as Baltimore's tight ends coach after being promoted from his original position of offensive coaching intern (2014).

ANDY BISCHOFF OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT / TIGHT ENDS

Bischoff is in his fourth year with the Ravens and continues his work with the TEs, while aiding "O" coordinator Marty Mornhinweg and assistant head coach Greg Roman, who also coaches the TEs.

RANDY BROWN SPECIALISTS COACH

Brown works directly with the kicking group – K Justin Tucker, P Sam Koch (holder) and LS Morgan Cox – and has coached five Pro Bowlers in Baltimore: Koch (2015), Cox (2015 & 2016), Tucker (2013 & 2016), K Billy Cundiff (2010) and K Matt Stover (last kicked for Ravens in 2008).

JOE CULLEN

DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Cullen enters his third year as the Ravens' defensive line coach. He originally joined the team in 2016 following two seasons with the Buccaneers in the same role. A D-line specialist, he has 29 years of experience, including 11 in the NFL with five teams (Bal., TB, Cle., Jax. and Det.).

JOE D'ALESSANDRIS OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Pronounced *dell-ah-SAN-dress*, he is a 40-year coaching veteran who enters his second season as Baltimore's O-line coach. "Joe D" has extensive experience guiding and developing linemen, both in the collegiate ranks and pros. Since transitioning to the NFL in 2008, he's mentored players for the Chiefs, Bills, Chargers and Ravens.

BOBBY ENGRAM WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

Engram, who enjoyed a 14-year NFL playing career, is in his fifth season as the Ravens' WRs coach. In his third year (2016) guiding Baltimore's receivers, his group helped record the second-most net passing yards in team history (4,100), including a franchise-best 4,317 by QB Joe Flacco.

THOMAS HAMMOCK RUNNING BACKS COACH

Hammock is in his fifth year as the Ravens' RBs coach. In 2017, he helped guide RB Alex Collins to a breakout season, when the back tallied 973 rushing yards and 1,160 yards from scrimmage. Prior to joining the Ravens, he spent 11 years on the collegiate circuit, including three (2011-13) as Wisconsin's assistant HC/RBs/recruiting coordinator.

CHRIS HEWITT SECONDARY COACH

Hewitt enters his second season as the secondary coach after being promoted prior to the 2017 campaign. He previously served as the team's DBs coach from 2015-16 and the assistant secondary coach in 2014. In his seventh-overall year in Baltimore, he also spent two years (2012-13) helping guide the special teams unit led by Jerry Rosburg.

CHRIS HORTON ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS COACH

Horton is in his third year as the Ravens' assistant special teams coach, working directly with Jerry Rosburg. Horton has helped Baltimore's special teams units

perform outstandingly in the three years he's been involved. In the annual special teams report from senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin, Baltimore has ranked in the NFL's Top 5 for six-straight seasons.

STERLING LUCAS QUALITY CONTROL - DEFENSE

Lucas is in his third year with the Ravens after being promoted to a defensive quality control coach in January 2018, with responsibilities that include finding tips/tendencies on opponent offenses, self-scouting and working with the LBs.

MIKE MACDONALD LINEBACKERS COACH

Macdonald is in his first season as the team's LBs coach. In his fifth year with the Ravens, he previously spent time as the defensive backs coach (2017) and as a defensive assistant (2015-16). He originally joined Baltimore in 2014 as a coaching intern.

JAMES URBAN QUARTERBACKS COACH

Urban joined the Ravens in 2018. A 15-year NFL coaching veteran, he spent the past seven seasons with AFC North rival Cincinnati, coaching the WRs. He entered the NFL with the Eagles in 2004. After five seasons in two roles under Andy Reid, he was promoted to QBs coach his final two years (2009-10), coaching Pro Bowlers Donovan McNabb (2009) and Michael Vick (2010).

CRAIG VER STEEG SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Pronounced *ver-STEGG*, he is in his 11th year working with the Ravens. Ver Steeg, who owns 35 years of coaching experience, has an extensive background working with QBs, WRs and RBs. As one of John Harbaugh's original coaching hires (2008), he has assisted in game preparation, game and practice analysis and guiding players.

MATT WEISS

FOOTBALL STRATEGY COORD. / WRS


Weiss is in his 10th season with the Ravens after assisting with the QBs from 2016-17. Prior to joining the offense, he coached on defense in a variety of roles, including CBs, assistant LBs and quality control. In addition to his coaching duties, he's responsible for leading coaching staff analytics, advising John Harbaugh on game management and scripting situational practice periods.

DREW WILKINS

ASST. DEFENSIVE LINE / OLBS

Wilkins originally joined the Ravens in 2010 and was promoted to assistant D-line/OLBs coach in 2018. Wilkins, who spent three seasons (2014-16) as a defensive assistant, was responsible for weekly production of the defensive playbook, scouting reports, film breakdown and assisting with the development of the D-line in practice.

2017 TURNOVER DIFFERENTIAL

- In 2017, the Ravens' +17 turnover ratio ranked No. 1 in the NFL. Baltimore's 34 total takeaways (22 INTs & 12 FRs) also ranked No. 1 for the season.
- Baltimore's +14 turnover margin since Week 8 (final nine games) was the NFL's best mark (Chargers were second at +10).
- The Ravens' 22 interceptions ranked No. 1 in the NFL, with the Jaguars finishing second with 21.
- After registering a +4 turnover ratio in Week 1 at Cincy, the Ravens followed up that performance with a +3 outing vs. Cleveland. In each game, Baltimore produced 5 takeaways, marking the first time in franchise history the Ravens have boasted back-to-back games forcing 5 turnovers.

THE FRANCHISE QUARTERBACK

QB Joe Flacco is the Ravens' all-time leading passer in every major category. Flacco, who led Baltimore to a Super Bowl XLVII victory in 2012 (and earned game MVP honors), is in his 11th NFL season. Last week at Pittsburgh he was 28-of-42 for 363 yards, 2 TD and 0 INTs (109.5 rating). In four games this season, Flacco has completed 110 of 171 passes (64.3%) for 1,252 yards, 8 TDs and 2 INTs (96.9 rating).

Super Bowl XLVII MVP **QB Joe Flacco** was masterful during the Ravens' 2012 playoff run, completing 73 of 126 passes for 1,140 yards, 11 TDs and 0 INTs to produce a 117.2 passer rating. 



WR Michael Crabtree, a 10-year NFL veteran, signed with the Ravens as a free agent this past spring. Through four games, he has tallied a team-high (tied) 18 catches for 183 yards and 1 TD. Here are several career fast facts about the standout wideout:

- Crabtree has produced at least 8 receiving TDs in a season four times, including in each of the past three years (9 – 2015, 8 – 2016 & 8 – 2017).
- His 25 receiving TDs since 2015 (see chart above) tie for the NFL's fifth most.
- Crabtree and Steelers WR Antonio Brown are the only NFL players to post at least 8 TD catches in each of the past three full seasons.
- Crabtree has totaled at least 85 catches in a season three times, with a career-high 89 during the 2016 campaign (earned Pro Bowl alternate honors).
- He has twice surpassed 1,000 receiving yards, tallying a career-high 1,105 (on 85 receptions) in 2012.



He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter "S." He's debuted a "boomerang" punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a "changeup" of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

K Justin Tucker, the most accurate kicker of all time, has hit 211 of 234 FGAs to post a 90.2% mark. Tucker has connected on eight-consecutive FGAs of 50-plus yards dating back to 2017, while he is 18-of-20 on such kicks since the 2016 campaign.

In 2016, All-Pro **K Justin Tucker** connected on 38 of 39 FGAs (lone miss was a block), posting the fifth-best pct. in NFL single-season history. In addition to making 35-straight FGs at one point (tied for fifth-best streak ever), here are facts about his remarkable season, arguably the best ever by a kicker:

- ✓ Tucker's 38 FGs made ranked No. 1 in the NFL. He was also 27-of-27 on PATs. An NFL single-season record 24 of Tucker's 38 FGs made in 2016 came from 40 yards or beyond.
- ✓ Tucker's 10 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They tie (Blair Walsh, 2012) for the most in NFL history. (Tucker was a perfect 10-for-10 from 50 yards and out during the 2016 season.)
- ✓ Tucker's 141 points ranked second in the league only behind Atlanta's Matt Bryant (158).
- ✓ In Week 12 vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game. (These feats earned him AFC ST POW honors.)

JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 5 AT BROWNS

Opening statement: "Had a chance to get back late, as a number of you guys probably did, and got to work on this last game [at Pittsburgh] but then moved forward really quickly to Cleveland. Coaches have been here since early this morning, and our focus really does move to Cleveland now. [We have] a lot of work to do to get ready for them. Four games – regular season games – to look at now, different quarterback situations, all the things that they do schematically, which is quite a bit, so it's a big challenge to study them. They have great coaches, and it'll be an opportunity to go up there and play a division game in Cleveland and try to get a win, which is a big challenge. I'm sure their fans are going to be really loud, just like they were last week. We'll have to prepare for that. We're excited about it and looking forward to it."

After a game like yesterday, when really all three units performed well, do you pick one out or do you just check all of them off, offense, special teams, defense? (David Ginsburg) "It was a team win, no question. But then, I think within each phase, we look at the things we did well, the positives, and try to build on those, and we look at the things that we need to improve on as a unit, all three phases. And, each position coach looks at the things that they need to improve on in their group, and then we talk about each player. We want each player to have one, two, or three things that they're looking to really build on this week and get better at. We try to break it down that way every single week. Each player will have a plan for himself. Each coach will have a plan for his position group. Each side of the ball will have a plan for their side of the ball, and then as a team there will be things that we'll be looking at, trying to build on. So, that's kind of how we look at it."

Did CB Jimmy Smith come back today? And did you have the chance to speak to him? (Jamison Hensley) "Yes. I haven't spoken with Jimmy yet. I just haven't had a chance with what we're doing, but rumor has it, he's here. He got here at eight o'clock, I guess. He did not beat me in, for the record. (laughter) But, he was here, and he's been working out and those kinds of things. I'm expecting him to practice on Wednesday. Of course, we'll have to make sure he's physically ready to go, meet with the trainers and all those kinds of things and make sure he's ready physically."

But he conceivably could play as early as next week? (*Jerry Coleman*) "Yes, if he's in shape, and if he practices well and looks like he can go. We'll just have to evaluate that in practice."

How close was TE Hayden Hurst to playing, and what went in to the decision on that last night? (Jerry Coleman) "It was really more ... It came down to [that] I don't think the docs and the trainers were comfortable with just the one week back. I'd have probably been more comfortable than they were, but it was smart. We'll just have to see how he does this week. Obviously, he has a good chance to play, but he has to get through full practices and be ready to go."

With RB Alex Collins' fumble, is it becoming troublesome? It's the second one this season. You went back to him after he fumbled. Is that a troublesome area you're seeing with him? (Todd Karpovich) "One thing about Alex is his style lends itself to that a little bit, and I think that's been kind of an issue through his entire career, because he's such an elusive guy. And, he tries so hard to make big plays all the time, and it's why he gets yards. It's one of the reasons. He runs very hard, but sometimes you expose the football when you do that. Yes, fumbling is always troublesome, and it's just ... You can't have it, and it's not worth it. So, he'll focus on it. One thing I know about Alex is he'll make it his job No. 1 to hold on to the football, and he knows that's the expectation."

Obviously, CB Jimmy Smith is an accomplished player, but the secondary has been playing well. What goes into the decision of who to start, who to play and certain packages once he gets back? (*Aaron Kasinitz*) "It'll be what gives us the best chance to put the best group of guys out there. It's a really good problem to have. I thought Brandon Carr played just tremendously well, as did Marlon Humphrey, as did Tavon [Young]. All the corners played exceptionally well. There was not a lot of room for Ben [Roethlisberger] to throw. I think that the pressure was there, and he was getting the ball out on time and in rhythm, but there just weren't a lot of windows in there. And, when he had room in zone coverage underneath, he completed them and they got a few yards. But pushing the ball downfield, especially in the second half, was really due to really good coverage. And, whenever we played 'man,' I think you had to give these three corners credit. They played tight man-to-man coverage. It's another ... It's a good problem to have, the fact that we'll have another really good player playing corner, and we'll have the chance to put another guy out there that can cover people. I think who starts and all that is one thing, but really, they're all going to play, and they're going to play a lot, and that's good for the Ravens."



Kind of drawing on the experience from last year with CB Jimmy Smith, since he wasn't 100 percent, it kind of forced you into that rotation. It seemed to work out well last year. (Luke Jones) "Yes, I just think it's going to be great to have all those guys that are good cover players. It's tough to complete balls on those guys. We can play any coverage we want – man, zone, different types of man and zone, pressure – the way we want, and it gives us a lot of options on defense."

Even with ILB C.J. Mosley back, is S Eric Weddle going to continue with the defensive calls? (*Jerry Coleman*) "I don't know. We haven't talked about that yet. There was a little question this week with C.J. coming back for the first game and whether he'd be able to make it through or not. So, that was part of our thinking. If Eric has his say, he'll probably want to keep the [green] dot. I know how he thinks, so we'll just have to make that [decision] as the week goes on."

I can appreciate you wanting to move on to Cleveland, but what does this mean to the team? You beat Pittsburgh there; you had lost three straight to them. Maybe even just as a confidence boost, what do you think it meant beating them at Heinz Field? (David Ginsburg) "It's a big deal. You guys made me admit it last night, but it's a big deal. It's a big deal because it's ... The road runs through Pittsburgh the last couple years to win the division. You could start with that. You have to win division games to win the division; that's the next thing. And, it's the Steelers. And as you said, we haven't beaten them three games in a row, and three years in a row there, we haven't beaten them. To go up there and win means a lot to us, and we're ... I do think there's some confidence that goes with that, but these guys weren't lacking. Our guys didn't need a shot in the arm, confidence-wise. They needed a win. We needed a win. We needed to be 3-1. That's what we really needed. So, all the other stuff that goes with it, that's positive, but it wasn't like we were lacking confidence. Now, we just have to go try to get the next win. That really is what the focus is inside the team, but I do understand where you're coming from on it, and I do think it's exciting. I think for the fans, especially, like we talked about, I think the fans ... I've heard that the fans are having a great day today. My wife said she's out and about. Everybody is talking about the game, and everybody is fired up and happy, even the people that went to bed at halftime. (laughter) Look what you missed! But, to see the Baltimore fans fired up, that's good, and we want to build on that. Our players get excited about that. Our coaches are excited about that, and you have to earn that. So, we earned a little piece of that in Pittsburgh last night, but we need to earn a bigger piece in Cleveland this next game."

WR John Brown is a fast guy – but obviously, not all fast guys seem to have a knack for getting open the way he does. Is there something about him that helps him separate from defenders? (Clifton Brown) "Yes, he's a talented guy and he does get open – that's one of the things you look for. How guys get open – to your point – is different. Everybody gets open in different ways. Antonio Brown is different than John Brown is different from Michael Crabtree or [JuJu] Smith-Schuster or whoever it might be. Just every player is different. He's really smooth, really fast – almost a little sneaky smooth, fast. He's maybe even a little faster than he looks, I think, when you get out there and you get close to him. You've watched practice up close; you know that. Then he tracks the ball really well and he's made catches. We just have to keep building on the precision of the passing game. There's still a lot of work we can do. We can get a lot better. I think Joe [Flacco] said it last night, and the fact that he's a little perturbed with the fact that we didn't do better ... Boy, you want to hear that as a coach. I want our guys to be hungry, to be great, and that takes work. These guys are willing to work, and let's go to work this week and get better."

What were you seeing when QB Joe Flacco overthrew WR Michael Crabtree and the score could have been 21-0 if he caught it? (Jerry Coleman) "Which play was that? I'm trying to think." (Reporter: "The one on the right sideline. It was early in the game.") "Oh — when Joe was pushed away in the pocket? Yes. It was sort of a double-move. It wasn't called a double-move; it was more of a scramble play. They were just trying to figure it out, and Crabtree took off because Joe was pushing out of the pocket. Joe was off-balance, and obviously if he hadn't let up quite as much ... I don't think that was such a precision thing, because it wasn't really part of the way the play was designed. But, dang, it would've been great if he hit him, you know? That would've been big. To that point, we have extended plays. We have made plays on scramble drill, and we do want to keep building on that."

You talked about in the offseason of the offensive coaches going into the laboratory and coming up with all this creative stuff. How rewarding has it been to see it pay off, and how much do you still have left? (Ryan Mink) "I've been told we have a lot left, a lot left. (laughter) For all of our opponents out there, we want them to know that – there's a lot of stuff. I think it's more fundamental football and really, you plug principles and concepts into formations and personnel. That's what they've



done a good job of, so I'm really excited about that, just like you guys are, and to see where we go. In the end, it comes back to blocking and tackling and throwing and catching and executing football – that's what we really need to work on. Anything that we can do to create an open guy or put a guy in position to make a play is really the coach's job, and that's what we're trying to do. I do think our coaches are doing a great job of that [on] all three phases. I'm really proud of the guys for that. We're just starting – it's four games in. It's just the beginning. It's one week at a time."

When CB Jimmy Smith comes back, do you use him as a teaching point to the other guys? Do you address why he was suspended, or is that something you've already taken care of? (Aaron Kasinitz) "We've taken care of it. The guys know; it's not something that you have to make a big deal out of. We do seminars with the guys. There's all types of league-mandated things that we do. We talk to the guys about those kinds of issues or whatever issues can get you suspended or disciplined. They're well-versed in all that. So no, we don't make too big a deal out of it. We just move on."

Using RB Alex Collins' fumbling as an example, is that something where in practice you'll go over ball security a little bit more. You'll see in movies where the guy is holding the football, walking around everywhere like in class. Do you do anything like that? (Jamison Hensley) "We actually do. I have made guys walk around the meeting [for] the day with a football. Maybe I'll do that with Alex. I'll see a guy walking, punch the ball out and stuff – but it's more in practice. One of the things we do is we have our defense challenge the offense. The defense doesn't want to see the ball on the ground either, so they'll be very aggressive in trying to punch the ball out in practice. It'll be a good reminder for them. But again, Alex is a trustworthy guy, and I fully expect him to clean that up really quick."

In the second half, you had two players record their first-career catches: RB De'Lance Turner and WR/RS Tim White. What made confident to put those guys in that offense? (*Aaron Kasinitz*) "That's a good question. It really wasn't so much about confidence as it's so much about we were rotating players and they need to get on the field. Somebody was tired, somebody was nicked up a little bit. We have a personnel group that had to go on the field. Each of those guys is the next man up in that situation, and Marty [Mornhinweg, offensive coordinator] just called his play. It wasn't like we were saying, 'OK, this is their time! Let's get them their first-career catch.' It was more just the flow of the game. When you're one of the 46 players up, that's how you [operate]. You're a starter – at any point in time, you just have to go in there and play and perform, and that's how it happens. Once the play gets made, you kind of realize [that] it's kind of momentous, because it's their first play, and hopefully somebody grabs the ball and gives it to them so they can keep it. That was just part of the flow of the game."

With TE Hayden Hurst potentially coming back, how challenging is it going to be to get your tight ends the appropriate amount of snaps? Everybody has really contributed – especially last tonight. (Jeff Zrebiec) "Not just that, but who's going to be active and not active? Ozzie [Newsome] and I were talking about it on the bus last night from the stadium to the plane, [about] what our options are in terms of the 53-man [roster], the 46-man [roster] and then, as you say, the playing time stuff. So, the coaches in the next 24 hours will be putting together gameplans on all three phases. We'll talk about that a little more tomorrow morning and then see how those guys fit in and then try to make some decisions that way. We have some tough decisions to make – but those are good problems to have. When you're not going to be able to activate a really good, productive player, as hard as that is – especially on the player – it's probably a good thing for you team. It means you've got some depth and you're healthy."

Is DT Willie Henry getting close to a point where he can become a factor? (Jeff Zrebiec) "Yes, he is. He'll be at practice this week, and we'll see how he does. I'm expecting him to practice this week."

Is this how you envisioned the four games of how the new passing game would go? (Jamison Hensley) "Well, yes, you have a vision for precision and what you want it to look like – that's what teaching is. That's what our dad taught us. Teaching is taking a picture in your head, an idea, and putting it in the other person's mind – being of one mind. That's what we try to do. We've been chasing that since the first day they got back in the offseason. It was certainly to be excellent and to be great – but we're not there yet. The fact that we have the pieces, though, the tools – that's exciting. The work is what needs to be applied to it. The fact that our guys see it that way to is a really good thing."
