**NEW ORLEANS SAINTS** VS. BALTIMORE RAVENS

#### JUST THE FACTS

- After playing three-consecutive road games, the Ravens (4-2) return home when they battle the Saints (4-1) at M&T Bank Stadium on Sunday (Oct. 21). Kickoff for this AFC-NFC clash is set for 4:05 p.m. on FOX. Baltimore, which has won three of its past four games, squares off against a Saints team that has won four-consecutive contests and is coming off a Week 6 bye.
- Last Sunday at Tennessee, the Rayens dominated the Titans in a 21-0 shutout at Nissan Stadium. Baltimore's "D," under first-year coordinator **Don Martindale**, set a team record with 11 sacks – 3 by OLB Za'Darius Smith and 2 from LB Patrick Onwuasor. Tennessee produced just 106 total yards, marking the second fewest ever allowed by a Ravens' defense. (This figure includes 51 net passing yards, which set a new single-game Baltimore record.) Eight different Ravens registered sacks, while on offense, QB Joe Flacco led an efficient outing, completing 25 of 37 passes for 238 yards, 1 TD and 1 INT. RB Alex Collins tallied 2 rushing TDs, while WR Michael Crabtree posted a game-high 93 receiving yards and 1 TD on 6 catches.
- The Ravens are 5-1 all time against New Orleans, winning threeconsecutive contests. Under John Harbaugh, Baltimore is 2-0 vs. the Saints. These teams last met in 2014, when the Ravens emerged with a 34-27 win at the Superdome on Monday Night Football.
- In his 11th season at Baltimore's helm, Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a 108-73 overall record (10-5 postseason), posting the NFL's fourthmost total victories since his 2008 arrival. The Ravens have played in three AFC title games (2008, 2011 & 2012) under Harbaugh, while in 2012, he guided the franchise to its second Super Bowl victory.

#### INJURY UPDATE



### **QUOTH THE RAVENS**

#### NFL NETWORK AND FOX SPORTS REPORTER PETER SCHRAGER ON BALTIMORE'S 2018 DEFENSE:

"I look at the Ravens' defense, and I don't know how teams are going to score points on them. They are so loaded, and if they are healthy this year, the Ravens are going to compete not only with the Steelers, but with every other team in the AFC. They might be a darkhorse to go to the Super Bowl. Their defense is that good this season."

#### S Tony Jefferson on defensive coordinator Don Martindale:

"'Wink' is doing an awesome job. He's already, for me, one of the better defensive coordinators I've been around. He has much respect; he commands a room. The guys in there – we take heed to what he says. We've got much respect for him and what he does for this defense."

### WNST's Luke Jones on the Ravens' Week 6 defensive performance at Tennessee:

"Playing defense in the NFL is a different animal than it was six or seven years ago, let alone trying to make comparisons to the 2000 Ravens. This is right up there among the best single-game defensive performances in team history."

### NBC Sports' Peter King naming Don Martindale his Week 6 Defensive Coach of the Week:

"When a unit records more sacks (11) than completions allowed (10), the leader gets an award. Those are the rules. Martindale's pass rushers got to Marcus Mariota every possible way — up the middle, around the edges, in the pocket, on bootlegs, you name it. The total set a new franchise record and was one short of the single-game NFL mark of 12. And it came with a familiar face watching: Titans defensive coordinator Dean Pees used to hold the same position in Baltimore."

### OLB Terrell Suggs on if his love for the game continues to drive him during his 16th NFL season

"Yeah, you could say that. I tell Coach every day, 'I chose nothing.' I was born, and this is what I am. I could play football at 4 a.m. It's just something I love to do. It's like a shooter shooting free throws, playing basketball or something like that. Football — it was never really difficult for me. It was everything to me."

### Defensive coordinator Don Martindale on the importance of DB/LB Anthony Levine Sr.:

"If the game is on the line, I want [Levine Sr.] in the game. That's the best compliment I can give him. If the game is on the line, I want him in the game. We want him in the game. When I say 'we,' his teammates want him in there, the coaching staff wants him in there, the head coach wants him in there, so that's the best compliment you could give a player. And, that's through his hard work and understanding the package, and he's been that way since I've been here."

### Special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on the value of WR/RS Chris Moore:

"He continues to play well on offense when given the chance. He's really a fine player, and anytime we give Chris the opportunity to do something, he usually comes through for us because he's so competitive, and he's in great shape, and he's very talented. Whatever we ask him to do, Chris usually comes through."

#### QB Joe Flacco on his connection with WR Willie Snead IV:

"He has a knack for seeing the game the way the quarterback does, and he makes his decisions quick, and he gets into open spots quickly. I think that's a wakeup to me when I'm standing back in the pocket, that, man, he's going to be ready, and he's going to make the right decisions. I can anticipate and can be confident to put this ball on him, because he's going to make the right decisions."

#### NFL.com's Gregg Rosenthal on the Ravens' defense:

"The defense is greater than the sum of its parts, with secondyear cornerback Marlon Humphrey making the leap, backed by a terrific safety tandem in Eric Weddle and Tony Jefferson. They may be the toughest team to pass on in football, and that was before cornerback Jimmy Smith returned from suspension."

### OLB Matthew Judon on what it was like as a defense to get 11 sacks against Tennessee:

"It's fun, man. We had fun out there. You see everyone going off, and you want to be a part of it as well, and I'm happy I'm a part of this defense. We work hard week-in and week-out, and we're a unit. We're all in for each other. So, it's very fun. It's very fun seeing that, and definitely when you have a performance like this, you're excited. You're really excited."

### The Baltimore Sun's Childs Walker on the Ravens' 21-0 win in Week 6 at Tennessee:

"This might not go down as their best or most important performance of the year. But it's hard to imagine a more potent distillation of the Ravens' self-image. When John Harbaugh dreams of football, his favorite visions must look something like this — comfort food for a soul raised on the pounding style of Michigan coach Bo Schembechler. The Ravens traveled to a difficult road venue and took their opponent's heart and legs with a 17-play touchdown drive in the first quarter and a 12-play touchdown drive to start the third. ... When they weren't grinding down the field on offense, they were chasing and battering Titans quarterback Marcus Mariota in an overwhelming display of team defense. It's hard to make history in a franchise defined by Ray Lewis and Ed Reed, but this was the first time the Ravens had ever sacked an opponent 11 times."

#### Steelers QB Ben Roethlisberger on ILB C.J. Mosley:

"He's one of the best linebackers in the game. In terms of playmaking, obviously, when he's your signal caller, getting guys set up, his experience ... He's just a phenomenal football player, maybe even better guy. I just think that when he's out there, he's a difference-maker."

#### **WEEK 6 GAME RECAP**

#### RAVENS 21, TITANS 0

Nissan Stadium • Nashville, TN • Sunday, Oct. 14

Playing their third-consecutive road game, the Ravens dominated the host Titans in a 21-0 shutout at Nissan Stadium. It was the first time the Titans were blanked at Nissan Stadium, which opened in 1999. Baltimore's defense, under first-year coordinator Don Martindale, set a team record with 11 sacks, 3 by OLB Za'Darius Smith. Of the 11, 6 were the most ever by a Ravens' team in the first half and tied the team mark for QB takedowns in a half overall. The Titans' offense produced just 106 yards, the second fewest ever allowed by a Ravens' defense, while the 51 net passing yards allowed by Baltimore set a team record. Tennessee, in fact, had just 9 plays on the Ravens' side of the 50-yard line, including only 1 in the second half. Almost as impressive was the Baltimore offense on its first two scoring drives. On the first possession of the game, QB Joe Flacco directed a 17-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a Flacco-to-WR Michael Crabtree 4-yard touchdown. On their second possession, the Ravens produced another TD drive (14-0), ending with a RB Alex Collins 13-yard TD scamper. After leading 14-0 at the half, the Ravens roared right back at the start of the third period. This time, Flacco led a 12-play series that ended with another Collins' TD (2-yard run) for the 21-0 advantage. The Ravens outgained the Titans 361 to 106 yards and punted 4 times. Baltimore's offense started the game with 7-consecutive third-down conversions and finished the game 12-of-17. Flacco was 25-of-37 for 238 yards with 1 TD and 1 interception (S Kevin Byard). WRs Willie Snead IV and Crabtree caught 7 (60 yards) and 6 (93 yards), respectively. The Ravens rushed 35 times for 123 yards, including a 22-yard sprint by backup QB Lamar Jackson. Tennessee's QB Marcus Mariota was 10-of-15 for 117 yards and rushed twice for 25 more. Baltimore's **LG Alex Lewis** left the game with a neck injury, was hospitalized for tests but then returned in time to travel back to Baltimore with the team.

### RAVENS / OPPONENT INFORMATION

#### TOP RAVENS-SAINTS CONNECTIONS

- Ravens **WR Willie Snead IV** played for the Saints from 2015-17, recording 149 catches for 1,971 yards and 7 TDs. Snead IV also spent part of 2014 on New Orleans' practice squad.
- Ravens Injured Reserve **CB Stanley Jean-Baptiste** was originally selected by the Saints in the second round (58th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft.
- Saints **TE Benjamin Watson** spent the 2016-17 seasons with the Ravens. After suffering an Achilles injury in 2016, Watson posted a team-leading 61 receptions for 522 yards and 4 TDs for Baltimore in 2017.
- Saints **K Wil Lutz** originally signed with the Ravens as a rookie free agent in 2016 and spent training camp learning under Ravens coaches and **K Justin Tucker**.
- New Orleans practice squad **LB Darnell Sankey** spent time on Baltimore's practice squad in 2017.
- Baltimore Midwest area scout **Dwuane Jones** spent 2005-15 within New Orleans' scouting department, joining as a Midwest area scout and later serving as northern regional scout.
- Saints LBs coach **Mike Nolan** served as the Ravens' defensive coordinator from 2002-04 (and was the WRs coach in '01).
- Ravens secondary coach **Chris Hewitt** signed with the Saints as a rookie free agent in 1997 and played in 39 games. He was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 12 of 1997 after blocking a punt that led to a crucial FG.

#### **LOCAL CONNECTIONS**

- The Ravens have several players who hail from Louisiana: DB/LB Anthony Levine Sr. (Abbeville), OLB Tim Williams (Baton Rouge) and LB Kenny Young (Boutte).
- Baltimore assistant special teams coach **Chris Horton** attended De La Salle HS in New Orleans, where he earned three varsity letters in football.
- New Orleans **T Rick Leonard** is from Middletown, MD, and attended Middletown HS. He was awarded Maryland Defensive Player of the Year as a high school senior.
- Saints area scout **Joey Vitt Jr.** was born in Towson, MD, and **T Jermon Bushrod** went to Towson University.

#### RAVENS RADIO BROADCASTS

- The Ravens' 2018 radio team features **Gerry Sandusky**, with former Ravens standouts **OLB Jarret Johnson** and **TE Dennis Pitta** splitting half the games as analysts. 98 Rock's **Kirk McEwen** serves as the sideline reporter for home games, while former Ravens **RB Justin Forsett** is the away game sideline reporter.

What makes a good teammate, and who on the team embodies that? "I think a good teammate is somebody who's always coming to work every day to practice, motivate guys to get the best out of them and to get

the best out of themselves. One teammate that comes to mind that I look up to is [Michael] Crabtree. I just try to model what he does and try to practice how he practices and move like he moves, because to me, I think he's a great receiver. That's somebody I aspire to be like."

What is your greatest accomplishment? "It was actually landing this contract with Baltimore. I guess my journey didn't start like everybody else's, and coming in as an undrafted guy that got cut twice, and the year I had last year being really bad, it didn't look good for me. I think coming out on this end is just a huge blessing. It comes back to all the hard work and just believing in yourself and committing yourself to family and your faith. If you believe that everything is going to work out for the best, and you don't waver in your faith, it always works out. I know Baltimore is going to give me every opportunity to be great, and I want to take advantage of everything that they give me."

When did it become real that you were going to be a Raven? "It's crazy, because it happened in April, and I was there in New Orleans for a week. The first week we were back, it was optional workouts, so I guess that their first week back is the last week that you can sign guys that are restricted free agents. My agent told me, 'Willie, you have to go work out with the Saints. You have to go, because if you don't, if we don't go to Baltimore, you're going to be in New Orleans.' So, I'm training the whole week, and Friday comes around, and I get the call: 'Ravens are going to offer you.' And it's last minute, the last hour. When I just heard that, I'm like, 'Wow.' The timing is always perfect with everything. When I got here, it just became real, and sometimes to myself, I'm like, 'Wow, I'm in the building with Ray Lewis and Ed Reed. They were here, and Joe Flacco is my quarterback.' When Joe won the Super Bowl, I was a freshman in college, and now he's my QB, and he looks to me to make plays. It's crazy."

What is something that you need to do every day? "I pray in the morning to get my mind together and get ready for the day. The other thing I have to do is I have to watch some kind of film every day. When I get to the facility, I have to sit down in my quiet zone, and I just have to watch film, just to prepare myself for the day and the team. When I was in New Orleans, Drew Brees was always watching film. He would be the first one in at 6 a.m., last one to leave at 7:30 p.m., and he was always watching film. That's something I took from Drew. You can never watch enough film to know your opponent. That's just something I try to do whether I'm here or at home. I didn't really like to watch film at first, but when you have a guy like Drew Brees in your building, the example of a Hall of Famer, you have no choice. If you want to be great, pick up those habits."

What is something that people would be surprised to know about you? "A lot of people don't know I am from Florida and moved six times in my life. I moved to Chicago when I was in second grade, I moved to San Diego when I was in fourth grade, I moved back to Florida when I was in the sixth grade, I moved to Michigan when I went into my 10th grade year, and then I went to college in Indiana. So, I've been everywhere. Then, I went to Cleveland and Carolina and New Orleans, and now I'm here. It's been awesome though. When you travel like that, I feel like you interact with a different group of people everywhere you go. I don't have a problem talking to people with different personalities, because I feel like I've seen it all."

What would you do if you weren't playing football? "I went to school for sports management, so that's all sales, ticketing and P.R. I'd probably be doing something in sports behind the scenes. If not, I'd probably be coaching. I don't know what level, to be honest. I like working with kids. My dad is a coach, and if I were to be a coach, I would want to be a play-caller, because my dad is a play-caller."

Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.

QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

#### THE HARBAUGH FILE

**John Harbaugh** has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 & 2014) of his 10 full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl title. Under "Harbs," the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012).

#### Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

- The Ravens are one of only eight teams (NE 9; GB 8; Pit. 7; Atl., Bal., Cin., Ind. & Sea. 6) to earn at least six postseason berths in the last 10 years. (Baltimore has won at least one game in each of those playoff campaigns.)
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since 2008 rank second only to New England's 13.
- "Harbs" is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim (formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.
- Harbaugh is the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh owns the third-most playoff wins (10, tied) by a coach in his first 10 seasons (since the 1970 merger).
- With the Ravens' 2014 playoff berth, Harbaugh became one of eight coaches in NFL history to make the postseason in six of their first seven seasons coaching.
- For coaches to make the playoffs in at least six of their first 10 years, "Harbs" is one of five active coaches to do so (Pete Carroll, Mike McCarthy, Andy Reid & Mike Tomlin).
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.

#### ROSBURG LEADS RAVENS SPECIALISTS

SEASONS RAVENS: 11TH NFL: 18TH Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg** has guided a stellar special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Below are several standout notes about the coach and his successful group of specialists.

#### SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned eight combined Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013 & 2016), LS Morgan Cox (2015 & 2016) and P Sam Koch (2015).

#### PRIME KICKER & PUNTER

• Two-time Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (214) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 89.9% career success mark, "Tuck" is the most accurate kicker in league history (214-of-238 on FGAs). Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch**'s 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL that season, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2017, Koch led the NFL in both punts inside the 10 (16) and inside the 20 (a franchise-record 40).

#### RAVENS' BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

#### 2017: RAVENS RETURN GAMES SOARS IN WEEK 6 VS. CHICAGO

• In Week 6 vs. Chicago, for the first time in franchise history, the Ravens returned a kickoff and punt return for a TD in the same game. RB Bobby Rainey Jr. posted a 96-yard KOR-TD, while WR Michael Campanaro registered a 77-yard PR-TD. The Ravens became the first NFL team to have KOR and PR touchdowns in the same game since 2013, when Detroit and Kansas City each accomplished the feat on 12/8/13.

#### BALTIMORE BLOCK PARTY

Since 2014, the Ravens have produced the NFL's third-most blocked kicks (13), including an NFL-high (tied) 4 in 2016.


### DON "WINK" MARTINDALE & DEFENSIVE NOTES

#### "WINK" LEADS THE DEFENSE

On Jan. 9, 2018, the Ravens promoted **Don "Wink" Martindale** to defensive coordinator following the retirement of Dean Pees. Martindale, 54, is in his seventh year with the Ravens after serving as LBs coach from 2016-17 and ILBs coach from 2012-15. Under his guidance, **LB C.J. Mosley** has become one of the league's top defenders, earning three Pro Bowls.

The 2018 campaign marks Martindale's 14th season coaching in the NFL, where he has also spent time with Oakland (2004-08) and Denver (2009-10). In 2010, he served as the Broncos' defensive coordinator.

"'Wink' has earned the promotion to defensive coordinator," **John Harbaugh** stated. "His aggressive mentality will serve to take our defense to new levels. He is obviously respected by players, many of whom have already benefited from his direct coaching at the linebacker position. He knows the ins and outs of what we have been about on defense and has been an important contributor to our success on that side of the ball. This is an exciting day for Wink and his family, and also one for the Ravens."

**Don Martindale** joins a long line of great Ravens defensive coordinators, four of whom have gone on to become NFL head coaches: Marvin Lewis (1996-2001), Mike Nolan (2002-04), Rex Ryan (2005-08) and Chuck Pagano (2011).

Marty Mornhinweg was elevated to offensive coordinator on Oct. 10, 2016. A 24-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia Eagles (2004-12) and San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000).

#### FIVE PRO BOWLERS

• Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.

### **ASSISTANT COACHES**

#### **JERRY ROSBURG**

#### SPECIAL TEAMS COORD. / ASSOC. HEAD COACH

In his 40th season coaching, Rosburg has guided an exceptional special teams group over his 10 years (2008-17) with the Ravens. Specifically in the past six full seasons (2012-17), the Ravens' ST units have consistently been acknowledged as one of the league's best. In the annual special teams report from senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin, Baltimore has ranked in the NFL's Top 5 for six-straight seasons (and is the only team to do so).

### DON MARTINDALE DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

"Wink" was promoted to "D" coordinator on Jan. 9, 2018 after six years working with Baltimore's LBs. Originally joining the Ravens in 2012, during the past six seasons, Martindale has guided and helped grow a number of standout linebackers, most notably ILB C.J. Mosley. Martindale was the Broncos' "D" coordinator in 2010, and in 2009, coached all four LBs in the 3-4 scheme.

### MARTY MORNHINWEG OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Mornhinweg is in his third year as offensive coordinator, originally assuming the role in Week 6 of 2016. A 34-year coaching veteran and former NFL head coach (Lions), he has an extensive background coordinating offenses and tutoring QBs. Throughout his NFL career, five QBs have earned Pro Bowl honors under his direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Jeff Garcia, Steve Young and Brett Favre.

#### **GREG ROMAN**

#### ASSISTANT HEAD COACH / TIGHT ENDS COACH

Roman is in his second stint with the Ravens, re-joining the team in 2017. In the latter part of '17, Baltimore's offense made big strides, and following the season, he was promoted to assistant head coach/TEs coach. Since his first term in Baltimore (2006-07), he has been a successful NFL offensive coordinator both in San Francisco and Buffalo.

### RICHARD ANGULO

## Assistant Offensive Line Coach Angulo is in his fifth year with the Ravens and his second as the team's assistant

and his second as the team's assistant offensive line coach. In 2017, he helped coach an offensive line that allowed the league's seventh-fewest sacks (27, tied with Minnesota). From 2015-16, he served as Baltimore's tight ends coach after being promoted from his original position of offensive coaching intern (2014).

#### ANDY BISCHOFF

#### **OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT / TIGHT ENDS**

Bischoff is in his fourth year with the Ravens and continues his work with the TEs, while aiding "O" coordinator Marty Mornhinweg and assistant head coach Greg Roman, who also coaches the TEs.

### RANDY BROWN SPECIALISTS COACH

Brown works directly with the kicking group – K Justin Tucker, P Sam Koch (holder) and LS Morgan Cox – and has coached five Pro Bowlers in Baltimore: Koch (2015), Cox (2015 & 2016), Tucker (2013 & 2016), K Billy Cundiff (2010) and K Matt Stover (last kicked for Ravens in 2008).

#### JOE CULLEN

#### **DEFENSIVE LINE COACH**

Cullen enters his third year as the Ravens' defensive line coach. He originally joined the team in 2016 following two seasons with the Buccaneers in the same role. A D-line specialist, he has 29 years of experience, including 11 in the NFL with five teams (Bal., TB, Cle., Jax. and Det.).

### JOE D'ALESSANDRIS OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Pronounced *dell-ah-SAN-dress*, he is a 40-year coaching veteran who enters his second season as Baltimore's O-line coach. "Joe D" has extensive experience guiding and developing linemen, both in the collegiate ranks and pros. Since transitioning to the NFL in 2008, he's mentored players for the Chiefs, Bills, Chargers and Ravens.

### BOBBY ENGRAM WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

Engram, who enjoyed a 14-year NFL playing career, is in his fifth season as the Ravens' WRs coach. In his third year (2016) guiding Baltimore's receivers, his group helped record the second-most net passing yards in team history (4,100), including a franchise-best 4,317 by QB Joe Flacco.

### THOMAS HAMMOCK RUNNING BACKS COACH

Hammock is in his fifth year as the Ravens' RBs coach. In 2017, he helped guide RB Alex Collins to a breakout season, when the back tallied 973 rushing yards and 1,160 yards from scrimmage. Prior to joining the Ravens, he spent 11 years on the collegiate circuit, including three (2011-13) as Wisconsin's assistant HC/RBs/recruiting coordinator.

### CHRIS HEWITT SECONDARY COACH

Hewitt enters his second season as the secondary coach after being promoted prior to the 2017 campaign. He previously served as the team's DBs coach from 2015-16 and the assistant secondary coach in 2014. In his seventh-overall year in Baltimore, he also spent two years (2012-13) helping guide the special teams unit led by Jerry Rosburg.

### CHRIS HORTON ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS COACH

Horton is in his third year as the Ravens' assistant special teams coach, working directly with Jerry Rosburg. Horton has helped Baltimore's special teams units

perform outstandingly in the three years he's been involved. In the annual special teams report from senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin, Baltimore has ranked in the NFL's Top 5 for six-straight seasons.

### STERLING LUCAS QUALITY CONTROL - DEFENSE

Lucas is in his third year with the Ravens after being promoted to a defensive quality control coach in January 2018, with responsibilities that include finding tips/tendencies on opponent offenses, self-scouting and working with the LBs.

### MIKE MACDONALD LINEBACKERS COACH

Macdonald is in his first season as the team's LBs coach. In his fifth year with the Ravens, he previously spent time as the defensive backs coach (2017) and as a defensive assistant (2015-16). He originally joined Baltimore in 2014 as a coaching intern.

### JAMES URBAN QUARTERBACKS COACH

Urban joined the Ravens in 2018. A 15-year NFL coaching veteran, he spent the past seven seasons with AFC North rival Cincinnati, coaching the WRs. He entered the NFL with the Eagles in 2004. After five seasons in two roles under Andy Reid, he was promoted to QBs coach his final two years (2009-10), coaching Pro Bowlers Donovan McNabb (2009) and Michael Vick (2010).

### CRAIG VER STEEG SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Pronounced *ver-STEGG*, he is in his 11th year working with the Ravens. Ver Steeg, who owns 35 years of coaching experience, has an extensive background working with QBs, WRs and RBs. As one of John Harbaugh's original coaching hires (2008), he has assisted in game preparation, game and practice analysis and guiding players.

#### **MATT WEISS**

#### FOOTBALL STRATEGY COORD. / WRS


Weiss is in his 10th season with the Ravens after assisting with the QBs from 2016-17. Prior to joining the offense, he coached on defense in a variety of roles, including CBs, assistant LBs and quality control. In addition to his coaching duties, he's responsible for leading coaching staff analytics, advising John Harbaugh on game management and scripting situational practice periods.

#### **DREW WILKINS**

#### **ASST. DEFENSIVE LINE / OLBS**

Wilkins originally joined the Ravens in 2010 and was promoted to assistant D-line/OLBs coach in 2018. Wilkins, who spent three seasons (2014-16) as a defensive assistant, was responsible for weekly production of the defensive playbook, scouting reports, film breakdown and assisting with the development of the D-line in practice.

#### THE FRANCHISE QUARTERBACK

QB Joe Flacco is the Ravens' all-time leading passer in every major category. Flacco, who led Baltimore to a Super Bowl XLVII victory in 2012 (and earned game MVP honors), is in his 11th NFL season. In Week 4 at Pittsburgh, he was 28-of-42 for 363 yards, 2 TDs and 0 INTs (109.5 rating). In six games this season, Flacco has completed 164 of 264 passes (62.1%) for 1,788 yards, 9 TDs and 4 INTs (87.1 rating).







In his 10th season (2015), P Sam Koch was finally named to his first Pro Bowl, as the standout punter's net average (42.9) ranked No. 2 in the NFL, while his gross average (46.7) was ninth. Koch also dominated the league in 2014, producing the No. 1 net (43.3) and No. 3 gross (47.4) averages.

#### ESPN.com's Kevin Seifert on Sam Koch's arsenal of punts:

"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter "S." He's debuted a "boomerang" punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a "changeup" of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

In 2016, All-Pro K Justin Tucker connected on 38 of 39 FGAs (lone miss was a block), posting the fifth-best pct. in NFL single-season history. In addition to making 35-straight FGs at one point (tied for fifth-best streak ever), here are facts about his remarkable season, arguably the best ever by a kicker:

- ✓ Tucker's 38 FGs made ranked No. 1 in the NFL. He was also 27-of-27 on PATs. An NFL single-season record 24 of Tucker's 38 FGs made in 2016 came from 40 yards or beyond.
- ✓ Tucker's 10 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They tie (Blair Walsh, 2012) for the most in NFL history. (Tucker was a perfect 10-for-10 from 50 yards and out during the 2016 season.)
- ✓ Tucker's 141 points ranked second in the league only behind Atlanta's Matt Bryant (158).
- ✓ In Week 12 vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game. (These feats earned him AFC ST POW honors.)



#### JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 7 VS. SAINTS

Opening statement: "OK, good to see everybody – appreciate you guys coming over. We went through the last game and pretty much cleaned that up as of early this afternoon. Now we're on to the Saints and preparing, obviously, for a very good football team that's had a bye, had a little extra time to prepare for us. It'll be our challenge, and we're looking forward to it. I just wanted to make one note before we get going. I hadn't had the chance to do this earlier, but I got a text, communicated with [former Orioles manager] Buck Showalter after the game last night. We've gotten to be good friends over the course of the last eight years – play golf, doing a lot of things together. I really, really admire him and respect him. I've learned so much from him over the years as a coach and a leader and relating to players and all the different things that come up. I just want to acknowledge that and what a great job he did in Baltimore and how amazing he's been for the fans, for sports fans in Baltimore, how much I've enjoyed watching his teams play and what a great job he's done for the Orioles. So, I just wanted to say that and put that out there, because he hit me last night about our team, and I always enjoyed talking to him."

Any update on G/T Alex Lewis? (Jamison Hensley) "Alex is in the building. [He] came back with us last night. It looks good. There's no serious injury there, in terms of [neurological-] type issues. He's possible for this week, as far as I know right now. So, we'll just have to see as the week progresses and they continue with the tests and see how he comes along. That could change at any time, but that's what we've been told at this time."

Is there a particular diagnosis? Was it neck trauma? (David Ginsburg) "I don't have that. I don't have the name of it right now. I'm sorry – I didn't get that."

When you look at the Saints and how they've been able to be an offensive power year after year, what are the keys to that? (Childs Walker) "The two keys to the Saints' long-term offensive success?" (Reporter: "Well, it doesn't have to be two keys. It can be however many you want.") "I have two keys then: Drew Brees and Sean Payton – those two guys. Sean is a great builder of offenses and schemer. He does a great job of building his offense one week to the next, changes it up, creates a lot of problems. Then of course, Drew Brees makes it all happen. Those are the two keys."

Is RB Gus Edwards the kind of guy that can play himself into the running back rotation? (Todd Karpovich) "Yes, sure. He's been doing that. To see him go out there – especially towards the end of the game when we needed those key yards to finish the game – he did a great job. He's a big guy. He runs behind his pads, and he's a tough tackle. So that was a plus for us."

How pleased were you to see the running game set the tone, chew clock and protect that lead? (Luke Jones) "It was important. We had great time of possession through the whole game. I think a lot of things went into that. We ran the ball a lot – towards the end of the game with more success obviously, and that's kind of what you're talking to. We had 16 defensive snaps in the second half, so that goes to the fact that we were getting three-and-outs and also to the fact that the offense was staying on the field. We had one really long drive, kept the ball, didn't score a lot of points, but we kept the ball a lot. We made a number of third-down conversions. I think we were, maybe, 12-of-17 on third-down conversions, and at one time I think we only missed one. A number of those were long — third-and-longs. Those two things probably went hand-in-hand."

Do you think those long possessions help the defense? (Garrett Downing) "That's the way football is; it's a complementary sport. It's complementary between all 11 guys on the field at one time. Everybody plays off each other. Symbiotic? Is that a good word? That's how it works. I think one phase can make the other phase better, and that's what you are always trying to achieve."

When you went back and looked at that opening drive on film, what stood out? Historically, there hadn't been a drive like that since you arrived here of that length and that nature. (Jerry Coleman) "The key thing in that drive were the third-down conversions. We had a couple big third-down conversions. Willie Snead had a number of them, 'Crab' [Michael Crabtree] had some in that drive right there. In that first drive, [Javorius] 'Buck' Allen had two huge plays that converted on third down. I thought that was the key."

You alluded to the lighter defensive workload yesterday. Could that have some long-range benefit, even this week? As you said, you're playing a team who is coming off a bye. Is that a benefit to you guys? (Childs Walker) "Well, the fewer snaps you can play on defense, it's usually going to be a good thing. Conversely, we had offensive linemen who were breaking out in hot sweats getting on the plane. They had over 80 snaps, our guys did. So that's a good thing, too, but it's tough on those guys. They're in good shape, but it's a positive, yes."

How pleased were you to see the distribution of sacks? It wasn't just one guy, but many. (David Ginsburg) "Very pleased. That's how we're built on defense. We're built that way. We bring a lot of pressure. We bring different people from different places. Everybody can blitz on our defense, so when you do that, you're going to have a lot of time, you're going to have all the rush lanes filled up, and it just kind of ends up being who gets there. Sometimes the guy with the best rush doesn't get the sack. That happened a lot of times last night.



Sometimes the guys that flush the quarterback don't get the sack. He'll get credit for the pressures. We do a good job in this league now of charting all that stuff – that's good information to look at. But I thought we had a bunch of guys rushing the passer really well."

Was any of the pressure due to the fact that the defensive backs had everyone covered? (*David Ginsburg*) "That's a great point. We had really good coverage all day. There were a number of times where you stop the tape and say, 'Well, if you were the quarterback, where would you go with the ball?' And really, most of the time there was nowhere to go with the ball. So that's kind of the way ... Again, that symbiotic relationship – those things go hand-in-hand."

What was your evaluation of the way CB/RS Cyrus Jones played? (Ryan Mink) "Cyrus played well. I thought he stabilized us back there, was really solid. He did a good job – did a good job in coverage, made a big tackle in kickoff coverage. It was a big plus for us having Cyrus."

Not a huge game for WR John Brown and the tight ends. Do you think that's just the push-and-pull of the defenses reacting to what you guys have been doing well with recently? (Jonas Shaffer) "Yes, from a numbers standpoint, you don't worry about that too much from one game to the next. Certainly, if it goes a number of weeks, you start to wonder why that's happening. But looking at the tape, the tight ends played really well, 'Smoke' [John Brown] played really well — made a huge catch on that inside, that slot seam [route] to convert for us. He was tightly covered. I'm pretty sure he's going to have some big games in the future. I feel that way about the tight ends, too, especially. Mark Andrews had a couple big catches for us, conversion catches. We keep building on that."

Did you like the way that G James Hurst came in and played left guard when G Alex Lewis had to leave and T Orlando Brown Jr. at right tackle? (Jerry Coleman) "Well, we really went with [Bradley] Bozeman. Bozeman was the guy playing guard and James stayed at right tackle. We had Orlando ... What you might've seen is Orlando came in some extra offensive linemen-type situations. We have formations that move guys around. I thought 'Boze' played really well. He did a good job, was solid. He really stepped up and played solidly. Orlando was very physical in his snaps. So, both of those guys played well."

What are the challenges – you mentioned about the Saints offense, but specifically with QB Drew Brees – when you just think of QB Drew Brees? What are kind of the challenges that pop out for you? (Jamison Hensley) "His vision is unbelievable. His pocket awareness is the best, and he's very accurate. So, he can see, he can find the open receiver, and he gets guys in position. They scheme guys open. He knows what he's looking at pre-snap, and he knows what he's looking at post-snap. So, he's not going to miss an open guy very often, and he has a great feel for the rush. He'll take some sacks if he has to, but only if he has to. He throws; he'll hang in there and make some tight throws when he has pressure all around him. He has the numbers he has for a reason. He's every bit of what he's cracked up to be, and I have a lot of respect for him, have a lot of respect for the whole offense. They have some really good receivers. They have one from Ohio State who's not too shabby [Michael Thomas], among others. Offensive line is big, physical, playing really well – zone and gap-blocking-type combination, blocking offensive line. They're running the ball really well. They have two really good backs, very physical, both who are utilizing the passing game. You can't say enough about their offense that way."

I know you'll look at recent tape, but will you go back when you played them in 2014 and look at some things that you did well, that worked against QB Drew Brees? Or is that something that you won't do? (Jamison Hensley) "We do. That's always part of our breakdown, going back and looking at previous games, so that will be part of the analysis." (Reporter: "Is there anything you see when you previously played that you did well against him?) "I'm sure there is. Yes, I'm sure we'll take a look at that. I wouldn't be able to outline it now, Monday at 2:30 p.m., and I wouldn't outline it anyway, but I'm sure there are some things, yes."

Do you feel like you've gotten what you were looking for from WR Willie Snead, in terms of being a guy you can always go to for a tough catch on third down? (Childs Walker) "I'm really glad you asked that question, because I just think Willie had a great game, exactly what we were looking for, what we hoped he would be when we signed him. He came up with some huge catches, some third-down catches. How about the third-and-18 to start the second half to keep that drive alive when we were backed up? Just one of many. He's on the ground, he makes the catch, he's getting pushed back to the ground, stepped all over, and he just gets up and gives the first down signal right there in the guy's face. That's the kind of competitor he is. He's all ball, all the time. And, I think he was a big factor in the game."

Are you surprised by his attitude at all, seeing his nastiness and the way he played yesterday? (Mike Preston) "No, not at all! It's a good question. Ball State guy, Mid-American Conference guy. That's what you get from that conference, man! (laughter) You get a hard shell, and that's the way he played in New Orleans. That's who he is. I have to elaborate. This is a guy that's been doubted his whole career – high school, college and the NFL – so I'm fine if they keep doubting him."

You're coming off a three-straight-road-game stretch, which doesn't happen too often in the NFL. You won two out of those three. How much are you looking forward to now playing four of your next five at home, and just your overall thoughts on where you are as a football team right now in these first six weeks? (Luke Jones) "We're in a good place. Not as good as we could be, but you can't look back and lament that. You just have to move forward, and we're happy to be where we're at, and we have to make the most of it. It's like Terrell Suggs said in the locker room last night: It doesn't ... Winning a game like that on the road doesn't mean nearly as much if you can't follow



it up. You have to back it up with another win, and what you need to do in the NFL is stack wins. You need to find a way to get on a roll, and you do that by getting better every single day, all the things we always talk about, and going out there and playing good, winning football on Sunday. That's all our focus needs to be, because if we can stack a win on top of that win, then it really starts to mean something. But, a huge challenge, whether you're on the road or home, playing against the Saints. I'm glad we're going to be at home. I'm excited that our fans will get a chance to see us and be a part of it. We had great support. For those of you who were at the [Tennessee] game, you probably know this. There were a ton of Ravens fans there, especially at the end when we'd come down, and they're all around the ring in the field. It was pretty cool to see. So, thanks to the Ravens fans for being loud and being a part of it yesterday." (Reporter: "Do you need directions back to M&T Bank Stadium?") (laughter) "I've been there a few times, been there a few times, but it's been awhile, there's no question."

Did you get the feeling that the defense was really, even as you guys pretty much had a win, wanted that shutout badly, and do you think there's a sense of pride that they have not having given up a touchdown in the second half yet this year? (David Ginsburg) "Sure, absolutely. It's definitely something that they're aware of, but not talked about. During the game, same thing. The thing I like about our guys is no matter the circumstance, they're going to scrap and fight and claw every single play. And, the other team sometimes makes some plays and gets you on your heels at times, and you have to keep fighting, keep them out of the end zone. Line up for the next snap, line up for the next series. I think that same mentality applies when you're playing really well, and you haven't given up a point, to when you have given up some points. So, just take that same mindset play-to-play, into every play and every game, and that's what our guys do. It's reflected in every game like that, too. They gave 'Wink' [Martindale] the Gatorade bath. I told Wink to make sure he didn't get any shivers or cold or anything after that and take care of himself."

When you go back and look at a game like that, is it hard – maybe it isn't, as a coach – to look for corrections and look for things to point out as negatives. There were some penalties and things of that nature that you could point out, but was that difficult? (Jerry Coleman) "No, it's really easy as a coach, to your point. It's what you ... It's never as good as you think, it's never as bad as you think, and when you go back and you watch a game like that, sometimes you're a little bit surprised by what you see, in terms of, there are more negatives than you remembered seeing. You get in there, and you go to work. And that's it. There's a poem: 'Meet triumph and disaster and treat those two imposters just the same.' Anybody know what I'm talking about? 'The Unforgiving Minute?' [The poem 'If,' by] Rudyard Kipling? You guys are journalists! You should know these things. (laughter) But check that one out. To me, that's the approach. So yes, you look for every single thing that needs to be corrected, and you try to chase perfection."

OLB Matthew Judon, when you went back and saw what happened with the unnecessary roughness penalty, that looked like one of the few mistakes that were made yesterday, and it's happened before with him. (Jerry Coleman) "Yes, absolutely, that's something that has to be cleaned up, no doubt. It was unnecessary roughness, very unnecessary. He knows that."

I know it's a non-issue with how well QB Joe Flacco has played so far, but what do you make of the high number of batted balls he's had at the line of scrimmage? (Jonas Shaffer) "Too many. I know we lead the league in batted balls. I think we have 11 now, and that's something that's a problem, because those are opportunities. A lot of times, those guys are open, and those are chances to complete passes. That's something that we've been working on the last couple of weeks. We still haven't it cleaned up the way we want to, and we're not happy about it. We need to clean that up."

Along those lines, for a guy who is that tall, is that why it shouldn't be happening? (Jerry Coleman) "Those guys that are in front of him are pretty tall, too, but Drew Brees, I don't think, has a batted pass yet this year, to make that contrast. So it's probably not as much about that as it is about other issues. It's always a team effort. Anything like that is always a team effort, and we have to get better at it."

You mentioned with G/C Bradley Bozeman, you liked what you saw. Do you get a better read on a young player when he actually is thrown into a situation like that rather than just practicing? Does it make any difference as you're evaluating a young player and how he's progressing? (Cliff Brown) "Does it make a difference, the fact that you see him in a game? Yes, yes. You see him in practice, you feel good about him. Football is a practice sport, so people often say, 'Give the guy a chance,' and players will say, 'Give me a chance,' and we'll say, 'You get a chance, every day at practice.' So, until you start doing well in practice, we're not going to put you into one of our 16 games and let you go in there and show us that you're the exact same player who is not good enough in practice. But, once you're good enough in practice on a consistent basis, you gain some confidence from the coaches to put you in there in a game and see if you can do it. Then, that becomes the next step. To see him and Gus [Edwards] and Orlando [Brown Jr.] and those guys do well is a good step."

Along those lines, what does OLB Tyus Bowser need to show to sort of get back on track? (Childs Walker) "Tyus is doing well. It was more of a numbers thing yesterday. We got Tim [Williams] back, and it just didn't work out numbers-wise. We have so many outside linebackers, it's kind of hard to decide who you're going to sit down. Some of that stuff has kind of come down to special teams and who plays a bigger role. Probably in the fine line of special teams, the inside 'backers probably win out sometimes over the outside 'backers, and that's the numbers that are getting Tyus, or got Tyus, off the 46-man [roster] this week. So, he can continue to build on the special teams, but he practiced really well last week on special teams. He practiced well on defense, and Tyus is a really good player, so it's a good problem to have. But, you have to be one of the ... When you get everybody healthy, it gets pretty competitive, as far as who's out there on Sunday."
