JUST THE FACTS

- Riding a six-game winning streak, the Baltimore Ravens (8-2) travel to battle the Los Angeles Rams (6-4) for a Monday Night Football showdown. Sitting atop the AFC North standings with a three-game lead over Pittsburgh, the Ravens are 8-2 for the third time (2006 & 2012) in franchise history. Baltimore's six-game winning streak is the NFL's longest active stretch. Los Angeles enters the contest fresh off a Sunday night, 17-7 home win over Chicago.
- The Ravens rank No. 1 in points per game (34.1) and rushing (203.8 ypg). Baltimore's attack stands No. 2 in total net yards per contest (428.6) and in third-down efficiency (49.1%). MVP candidate QB Lamar Jackson has accounted for 25 total TDs (19 passing & 6 rushing).
- Baltimore leads the regular season series with the Rams, 4-2. Under head coach John Harbaugh, the Ravens are 2-0.
- In last week's 41-7 win over Houston, the Ravens racked up 491 yards of offense, including 263 on the ground. Baltimore was led by Jackson, who threw 4 TDs and produced a 139.2 rating. The second-year standout added 86 rushing yards on 9 attempts, while RB Gus Edwards produced 112 on just 8 carries. Baltimore's defense was superb, registering a season-high 7 sacks and 2 takeaways (1 FR & 1 INT), all while limiting the Texans' attack to a season-low 232 yards.
- Under Coach Harbaugh, Baltimore owns the NFL's fifth-most total wins (122) since his 2008 Charm City arrival. The Ravens have appeared in three AFC title games (2008, 2011 & 2012) with "Harbs" at the helm, and in 2012, won Super Bowl XLVII.

JOHN HARBAUGH ON THE RAVENS' MINDSET ENTERING WEEK 12:

"We have a bunch of guys who keep it simple and keep it about football. As the stakes get bigger, your focus has to be narrower. We have to keep it nice and tight and locked in on what we have to get done one day at a time. I'm very confident these guys will do that. I know they understand it. They have a lot of faith. NUMBERS TO RAVE ABOUT

4 – Consecutive games the Ravens have won by at least 14 points: Seattle (+14), New England (+17), Cincinnati (+36) and Houston (+34).

6 – Receiving TDs by TE Mark Andrews, tying (Darren Fells & Austin Hooper) for the NFL's most among TEs. With 1 more TD catch, Andrews will tie the Ravens' single-season TE TD record of 7, shared by Dennis Pitta (2012) and Todd Heap (2005).

10-0 – The Ravens' record when QB Lamar Jackson rushes for at least 70 yards in a game. Baltimore is 12-2 when he reaches 60 rushing yards in a game, including 7-1 this season.

15 – An NFL-best rushes of 20+ yards by Baltimore, 8 of which have come from QB Lamar Jackson (tied, Nick Chubb for the NFL's most).

21 – Punts by P Sam Koch, marking the fewest among punters who have played in 10 games this season. Baltimore (33.6) is on pace to set the 16-game NFL single-season record for fewest punts (Houston Oilers – 34 in 1990).

23 – QB hits for OLB Matthew Judon, ranking as the NFL's second most. Baltimore stands No. 4 in the league with 71 QB hits.

775 – An NFL-high (by far) INT return yards (on 26 picks) by CB Marcus Peters since he entered the NFL in 2015. (Aqib Talib has the second most with 342.) Peters has also produced 3 INT-TDs this season (2 w/ Baltimore & 1 w/ the Rams).

NEW ERA 8

Here are several fast facts about the MVP-caliber play of QB Lamar Jackson:



- X Baltimore is 14-3 with Jackson as its starter. Since his first NFL start (Week 11 of 2018), Jackson's 14 regular season wins tie (Russell Wilson) for the most among NFL starting QBs.
- X Jackson is the only QB in NFL history to produce at least 2,000 passing yards and 700 rushing yards through a season's first 10 games. (He has 2,258 passing & 788 rushing yards in 2019.)
- X Jackson has been responsible for 25 total TDs this season (19 passing & 6 rushing). Only QB Russell Wilson (26) has more (23 passing & 3 rushing).
- X Here are Jackson's 2019 NFL passer rankings: QB Rating (106.3, No. 4); Yards Per Attempt (8.1, No. 6); Passing TDs (19, No. 4, tied) and Pass TD Percentage (6.8, No. 2).
- X Jackson has produced two perfect passer ratings this season (at Cin. & at Mia.), making him one of two QBs in NFL history (Ben Roethlisberger, 2007) to attain the pristine 158.3 mark twice in a single season.
- X In Week 11, Jackson (1,483) surpassed Cam Newton (1,447 yards) for the most rushing yards by a quarterback through the first two seasons of a career in NFL history.
- X Jackson's 788 rushing yards in 2019 are the most by a QB through the first 10 games of a season in NFL history. He is on pace to break Michael Vick's single-season QB rushing record (1,039) with a projected 1,261 clip.
- X Jackson's 6.85 ypc rush avg. in 2019 ranks No. 1 in the NFL. He has posted an NFL-high 216 rushing yards on third down.
- X Jackson has registered at least 60 rushing yards in seven-straight games, ranking as the most consecutive 60+ rushing outputs by a QB in NFL single-season history.
- X In 17 regular season starts (14-3 record), Jackson has thrown for 3,372 yards, 24 TDs and 8 INTs, with a 63.4 completion pct. He has also tallied 1,344 rushing yards and 10 TDs.
- X This season, the Ravens boast the NFL's No. 1 scoring attack (34.1 ppg), No. 1 rushing offense (203.8 ypg) and No. 2 overall offense (428.6 total ypg).

Franchise Connections

• The Ravens acquired **CB Marcus Peters** in a trade with the Rams on Oct. 15, in exchange for **LB Kenny Young** and a draft pick. Peters joined the Rams in 2018, totaling 4 INTs for 139 yards, 53 tackles and 11 PD in 21 games. Young was selected by the Ravens in the fourth round of the 2018 NFL Draft. He recorded 47 tackles (37 solo), 2.5 sacks, 1 PD and 1 FF in his rookie campaign in Baltimore.

• Los Angeles **S Eric Weddle** played three seasons (2016-18) for the Ravens, compiling 220 tackles (151 solo), 10 INTs, 24 PD, 3 sacks, 3 FFs and 1 FR. Weddle earned Pro Bowl honors each year.

• Rams **DB Darious Williams** began his career as an undrafted free agent with the Ravens in 2018 but did not appear in any games for Baltimore before being waived on Oct. 7, 2018.

• Ravens senior advisor to player engagement **O.J. Brigance** finished his seven-year NFL playing career with the Rams from 2001-02 and helped St. Louis to Super Bowl XXXVI.

• Baltimore senior player personnel executive **Vincent Newsome** spent eight seasons (1983-90) with the Los Angeles Rams as a safety. Newsome recorded 12 INTs in 110 games.

• Ravens assistant offensive line coach **Richard Angulo** was a seventh-round tight end draft choice of the St. Louis Rams in 2003.

• Los Angeles special teams coordinator **John Fassel** served as Baltimore's assistant special teams coach from 2005-07. He helped the Ravens to Top 10 finishes in punt and kickoff return average in 2006 and 2007.

• Rams assistant coordinator/offense **Jedd Fisch** spent four seasons in Baltimore (2004-07). He was the Ravens' assistant QBs coach in 2007 after serving as the assistant QBs/WRs coach from 2005-06 and offensive assistant in 2004.

• Los Angeles outside linebackers coach **Chris Shula** is the grandson of Hall of Fame head coach **Don Shula**, who coached the Baltimore Colts from 1963-69.

Local Connections

• Ravens special teams coach **Chris Horton** and WR/RS **De'Anthony Thomas** are both from Los Angeles. Horton also played DB at UCLA.

• A number of other Baltimore coaches and players hail from California: assistant offensive line coach **Richard Angulo** (Santa Ana), **G/C Patrick Mekari** (Westlake Village), **ILB Patrick Onwuasor** (Inglewood), **CB Marcus Peters** (Oakland), **DB Jordan Richards** (Folsom), **CB Jimmy Smith** (Colton) and senior assistant/running backs coach **Craig Ver Steeg** (Redondo Beach).

• Mekari (Cal-Berkley) and Richards (Stanford) also played collegiately in California.

• Ravens offensive coordinator **Greg Roman** (Stanford; 2009-10), Horton (UCLA; 2012-13), running backs coach **Matt Weiss** (Stanford; 2005-08) and Ver Steeg (USC; 1984-85) coached on the collegiate level in California.

• Rams **T Rob Havenstein** hails from Mount Airy, MD, while northeast area scout **John Zernhelt** played on the offensive line for the University of Maryland (1974-77) and later coached the Terrapins' offensive line from 1987-91.

WEEK 11 VS. TEXANS

RAVENS 41, TEXANS 7

M&T Bank Stadium • Nov. 17, 2019 • Week 11

In a showdown of AFC division leaders, the Ravens dominated the Texans, drubbing the visitors 41-7 at M&T Bank Stadium last Sunday. It was the sixth-consecutive victory for Baltimore, the current longest in the NFL. After starting the contest 1-for-6 for 12 yards, QB Lamar Jackson exploded to a spectacular 139.2 QB rating for the game. The second-year standout threw 4 TD passes, completing 13-straight passes after his slow start, and rushed for 86 yards on just 9 carries (9.6 avg.). Jackson finished 17-of-24 for 222 yards and no INTs. While the game was billed as an offensive showcase featuring two of the league's top young QBs, the game was scoreless in the first quarter. The Ravens then jumped to a 14-0 halftime lead on a pair of Jackson TD passes. The first was a 15-yard strike to WR Seth Roberts, and the second was an 18-yarder to TE Mark Andrews. The Ravens extended the lead to 21-0 on the opening drive of the third quarter when Jackson found a streaking RB Mark Ingram II for a 25-yard TD. A pair of K Justin Tucker FGs (34 and 46 yards) gave the Ravens a 27-0 lead entering the final quarter. Ingram II scored his second TD of the day when Jackson hit him with a 12-yard dart and impressive run to give Baltimore a 34-0 advantage with 9:50 left. Houston finally got on the scoreboard when RB Carlos Hyde sprinted 41 yards to the end zone. But that run was topped 3 minutes later when Ravens' RB Gus Edwards galloped 63 yards for the game's final TD. Impressively, the Ravens produced 7 sacks, 6 against the elusive QB Deshaun Watson. OLBs Matthew Judon and Tyus Bowser each garnered 2 sacks, while Judon added a forced fumble. Watson was 18-of-29 for just 169 yards. His favorite target was WR DeAndre Hopkins, who caught 7 for 80 yards. For the Ravens, Edwards rushed for 112 yards (8 carries), and Ingram II added 48 – plus 3 catches for 37 more yards. The Ravens' defense allowed only 232 yards, the second fewest of the season (200 to Miami in the opener).

PLAYOFF PERFORMERS



In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

HARBAUGH FAST FACTS

John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in seven (2008-12, 2014 & 2018) of his 11 full seasons, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl title. Under "Harbs," the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012).

Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

- The Ravens are one of only six teams (NE – 10; GB – 8; Bal., Ind., Pit. & Sea. – 7) to earn at least seven postseason berths in the last 11 years. (Baltimore has won at least one game in six of those seven playoff campaigns.)
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since 2008 rank second only to New England's 16.
- "Harbs" is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim (formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.
- Harbaugh is the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh owns the fourth-most playoff wins (10, tied) by a coach in his first 11 seasons all time. (See chart at left.)
- With the Ravens' 2014 playoff berth, Harbaugh became one of eight coaches in NFL history to make the postseason in six of their first seven seasons coaching.
- Of coaches to make the playoffs in at least seven of their first 11 years, "Harbs" is one of four active coaches to do so (Pete Carroll - 8, Andy Reid - 8 & Mike Tomlin - 8).
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.

RAVENS OFFENSIVE NOTES

ROMAN ELEVATED TO O.C.

Following the 2018 season, the Ravens named Greg Roman their offensive coordinator. Roman is a 21-year NFL coaching veteran who spent 2018 as the team's assistant head coach/TEs coach. He re-joined the Ravens in 2017 as a senior offensive assistant/TEs coach after his first stint with the team as an assistant O-line coach from 2006-07.

Previously, Roman was a successful "O" coordinator with the Buffalo Bills (2015-16) and San Francisco 49ers (2011-14). With each team, Roman worked with QBs who totaled their highest single-season passer ratings under his guidance: Tyrod Taylor (Bills – 99.4 in 2015), Colin Kaepernick (49ers – 98.3 in 2012) and Alex Smith (49ers – 104.1 in 2012).



WINK IS THE D.C.

In his first year (2018) as Baltimore's D.C., Don "Wink" Martindale led the Ravens' unit to a No. 1-overall ranking, allowing an NFL-best 292.9 yards per game. Baltimore also permitted the league's second-fewest points per game (17.9), just behind Chicago's 17.7. For his coaching efforts, Martindale was recognized by *SI/MMQB* as the Assistant Coach of the Year and was the AP NFL runner-up (then-Bears' DC Vic Fangio) for the same award.

The 2019 campaign marks Martindale's 15th season in the NFL, where he has also spent time with Oakland (2004-08) and Denver (2009-10). In 2010, he was Denver's D.C.

Following the retirement of longtime ST coordinator Jerry Rosburg, Chris Horton took over as the Ravens' special teams coach in 2019. Horton served as Rosburg's assistant for the past three seasons and now leads Baltimore's standout ST battery.

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned eight combined Pro Bowl honors during the John Harbaugh Era (since 2008): ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013 & 2016), LS Morgan Cox (2015 & 2016) and P Sam Koch (2015).

PRIME KICKER & PUNTER

• Two-time Pro Bowl K Justin Tucker, who the Ravens signed as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (256) since entering the NFL in 2012. With a 90.5% career success mark, "Tuck" is the most accurate kicker in league history (256-of-283 on FGAs). Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, P Sam Koch's 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL that season, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2017, Koch led the NFL in both punts inside the 10 (16) and the 20 (a franchise-record 40).

2018: ANOTHER RAVENS RETURN MAN SCORES BIG

• In 2018's Week 12 win vs. Oakland, Baltimore CB/RS Cyrus Jones posted a 70-yard punt return TD, marking the Ravens' first PR-TD since 10/15/17, when Michael Campanaro had a 77-yarder vs. Chicago. Dating back to 2011, six different Ravens have returned punts for touchdowns: Campanaro, Kaelin Clay, Tandon Doss, C. Jones, Jacoby Jones and Lardarius Webb.

RAVENS' BIG RETURNS IN JONES' MAGICAL SEASON

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

Eric DeCosta's loyalty, love and pride for the Baltimore Ravens are unmatched. A pillar of the organization's well laid foundation, DeCosta has been with the franchise since Day One, first beginning as an intern during the inaugural 1996 season and then ascending to the personnel department's chief decision-maker in 2019.

Prior to being named executive vice president and general manager this past January – succeeding the legendary Ozzie Newsome – DeCosta, 48, received GM interview offers annually from multiple teams in recent years. However, he never seriously considered leaving Baltimore. Simply put, Eric's respect for – and thorough understanding of – the Ravens' culture aligned perfectly with his pursuit of a dream job.



THE WIZARDRY OF OZ

Ozzie Newsome's legacy is unlike any the game has seen. Known throughout all of sports as a premier leader, Newsome is a Hall of Fame player, the architect of Baltimore's 2000 and 2012 Super Bowl championship teams and an elite evaluator who became the NFL's first African American GM. In 2019, his longtime top lieutenant, Eric DeCosta, took over as the Ravens' EVP & GM. However, Newsome maintains a significant role within the organization as its executive VP.

LAMAR JACKSON NOTES

THE YEAR OF LAMAR

- X Jackson is the only QB in NFL history to produce at least 2,000 passing yards and 700 rushing yards through a season's first 10 games. (He has 2,258 passing & 788 rushing yards in 2019.)
- X Jackson has been responsible for 25 total TDs this season (19 passing & 6 rushing). Only QB Russell Wilson (26) has more (23 passing & 3 rushing).
- X Here are Jackson's 2019 NFL passer rankings: QB Rating (106.3, No. 4); Yards Per Attempt (8.1, No. 6); Passing TDs (19, No. 4, tied) and Pass TD Percentage (6.8, No. 2).
- X Jackson has produced two perfect passer ratings this season (at Cin. & at Mia.), making him one of two QBs in NFL history (Ben Roethlisberger, 2007) to attain the pristine 158.3 mark twice in a single season.
- X In Week 11, Jackson (1,483) surpassed Cam Newton (1,447 yards) for the most rushing yards by a quarterback through the first two seasons of a career in NFL history.
- X Jackson's 788 rushing yards in 2019 are the most by a QB through the first 10 games of a season in NFL history. He is on pace to break Michael Vick's single-season QB rushing record (1,039) with a projected 1,261 clip.
- X Jackson's 6.85 ypc rush avg. in 2019 ranks No. 1 in the NFL. He has posted an NFL-high 216 rushing yards on third down.
- X Jackson has registered at least 60 rushing yards in seven-straight games, ranking as the most consecutive 60+ rushing outputs by a QB in NFL single-season history.
- X In Week 6's victory over Cincinnati, Jackson became the first player ever to pass for 200 yards (236) and rush for 150 yards (152) in a regular season game. (Colin Kaepernick also accomplished this feat in a 2013 playoff game.)
- X In Week 2's win over Arizona, Jackson became the only player in NFL history to throw for at least 250 yards and rush for at least 120 yards in a regular season game.
- X Michael Vick (8), Russell Wilson (4) and Jackson (4) own the most "double-triples" (at least 100 rushing and passing yards in the same game) in league history.
- X With 4 TD passes vs. Houston in Week 11, Jackson became the only QB in Ravens single-season history with at least 4 TD passes in multiple games. (He had 5 in Week 1 at Miami.)

2016: PERHAPS THE BEST SEASON EVER


- In 2016, All-Pro K Justin Tucker connected on 38 of 39 FGAs (lone miss was a block), posting the fifth-best pct. in NFL single-season history. In addition to making 35-straight FGs at one point (tied for fifth-best streak ever), here are facts about his remarkable season, arguably the best ever by a kicker:
- Tucker's 38 FGs made ranked No. 1 in the NFL. He was also 27-of-27 on PATs. An NFL single-season record 24 of Tucker's 38 FGs made in 2016 came from 40 yards or beyond.
- Tucker's 10 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They tie (Blair Walsh, 2012) for the most in NFL history. (Tucker was a perfect 10-for-10 from 50 yards and out during the 2016 season.)
- Tucker's 141 points ranked second in the league only behind Atlanta's Matt Bryant (158).
- In Week 12 of 2016 vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game. (These feats earned him AFC ST POW honors.)

"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter 'S.' He's debuted a 'boomerang' punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return. ... Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

P Sam Koch owns a 45.3 career gross average and 39.5 career net, both marks that rank first in Ravens history. In 2014, he posted a career-high and team-record 47.4-yard gross (matched again in 2018) and 43.3-yard net average.


